THE SEEDS FOR A STORY: AN ENGINEER IN ITALY--By Bill Pekonen

A group of correspondence was acquired several years ago. The letters were addressed to a Mrs. H.H. (Ida) Peever, 335 Morly Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba. The letters were written to his mother by her son whose name was Howard Green. Preliminary research indicates Ida Peever had previously been married to a man with the Green surname. It is possible that Howard had one or more siblings.

This small group was interesting because it contained a Field Service Post Card; an Airgraph Letter; an Airgraph Christmas Card; and two different Air Letter forms. Several of these contain the abbreviation "SPR" believed to be short for Sapper [specifically in the Engineers. Ed.] or Private. It is unusual for a small group like this to appear on the market. It very likely appears that other correspondence to and from this same source may exist elsewhere.

The Field Post Office markings are also part of the story. Perhaps one

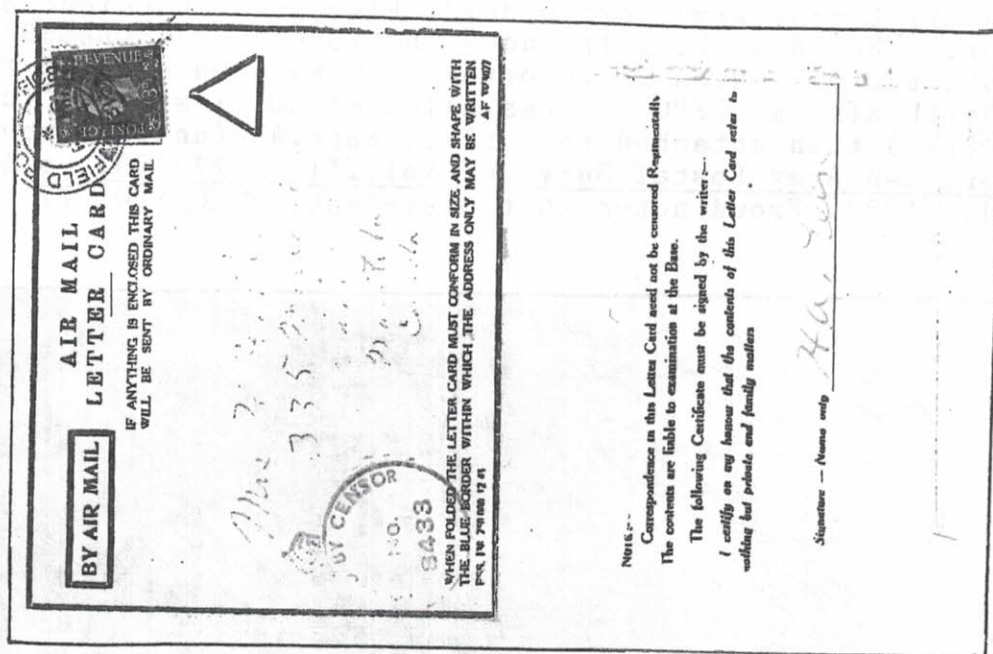
13 JAN/44 Air Letter Army Form W.3077. Blue gray in colour on flimsy air-mail paper. A boxed marking includes the wording "RELEASED/BY BASE/ CENSOR 23". FPO 577 which is reported to have been used by the British Army in North Africa. [FPO 577 was allotted to First Army in N. Africa until (6/8/43) then attached to 5 DIV., Sept.43-(until March 44?), History of British Army Postal Service, Vol.III, 1927-1963, p.424, E.B. Proud, Ed., 1982. Proud notes that post-Sept. 1943, FPO 577 was in Italy. Ed.]

It is unclear whether FPO 313 was also used in North Africa or did Sapper Green go to North Africa for a short assignment and then return to Italy? [As noted above, 1 CDN INF DIV. Supply Point (FPO 313) was located in Italy. Do other members have pieces of this correspondence?Ed.]

DRIVER WILLARD BORDEN, "E" BATTERY, R.C.F.A. AND HOCKEY PLAYER OFF TO THE ANGLO-BOER WAR--By Hal Kellett

[Hal kindly passed these two items from the Committee of the Antigonish Hockey Club, ca. January 1900 as items of related interest. Although not postal-related, I hope that members may be kind in allowing their inclusion. They, along with examples of period patriotic covers and cards, portray the patriotism, kindness, and thoughtfulness of Canadians at this time in Canadian military history.

502, Driver Willard Borden, "E" Battery, Royal Canadian Field Artillery, enlisted at Sydney, Nova Scotia on 30 December 1899. He was twenty-two years of age, a clerk, Presbyterian, and single. He was born in Springhill Junction, NS and his next-of-kin was Mrs. Edwin Borden of Pugwash, NS. He was described on his Agreement for Military Service in South Africa as "short, junky, 5'3", 150lbs., dark complexion, black hair, brown eyes, sanguine temperament, and good general health".

Borden was discharged on 9 January 1901. He was entitled to the Queen's South Africa medal with three clasps: Cape Colony, Orange Free State, and Transvaal.

Presumably he was welcomed back by the Antigonish Hockey Club and continued playing with the "hockey boys of Antigonish". Do members have any

On behalf of the citizens of the Town of Antigonish we ask you, on your departure for the seat of war in South Africa, to accept the accompanying gift, in order that your trip to the Cape may be made as comfortable as possible.

We regret to lose you as a fellow townsman, but trust, that when the war is over, you will return in health and strength, and again take up your abode with us.

We will watch your career as a soldier of the Queen, and we have no doubt that you will do your duty bravely, and bring credit upon the Province and town from which you go forth.

The Town Council has decided to place \$1000. Insurance upon your life, payable to your mother, in case of death.

With fervent wishes for your advancement in your new profession of arms, and for your escape from the perils of the sea, and of battle,

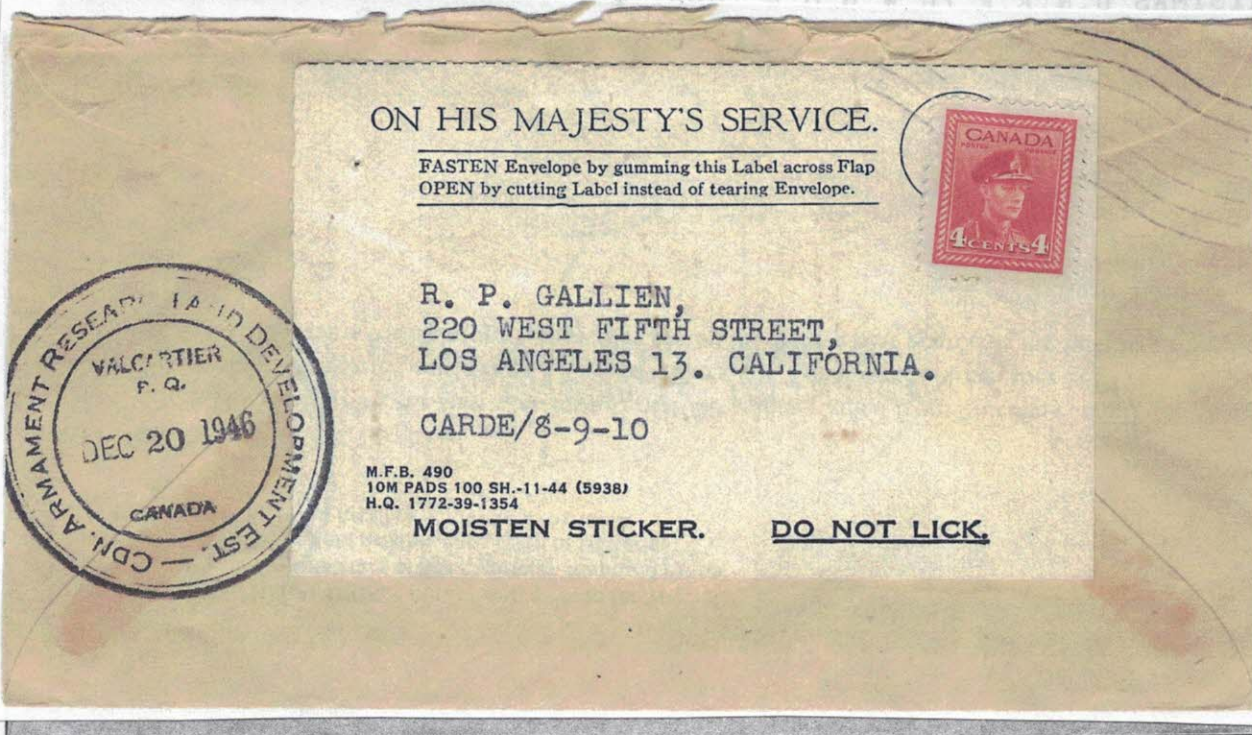

CANADIAN ARMAMENT RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ESTABLISHMENT, VALCARTIER, QUEBEC, 1946

The National Research Council (NRC) was established in 1916 as the Honourary Advisory Council for Scientific and Industrial Research. In 1925 the NRC was based on a British recommendation to establish military laboratories in Canada but priorities soon turned to more domestic and civilian projects. However, when Major-General Andrew G.L. McNaught-

ton became President, the NRC labs were employed in more areas of military research (from medicine and food packaging to weaponry and synthetic fuel research projects). By the start of the Second World War, the NRC was engaged in radar, aviation medicine, gas mask innovation, and military metallurgical experiments and production. McNaughton left to assume operational command within the Canadian Army and Chalmers Jack Mackenzie became acting President and President in 1944.

After the fall of France in June 1940, the NRC established biological and chemical warfare laboratories. Several specialized centres were also established in various locations such as the Defence Research Establishment Atlantic (DREA) by the Royal Canadian Navy in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

The Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment (CARDE) was founded in 1945 and located at Valcartier, Quebec. It examined a wide range of military vehicle, armament and weapon systems, command and intelligence communications and technology. Today the Defence Research and Development Canada (DRDC), Valcartier Research Centre, just outside CFB Valcartier, still supports the operational needs of the Canadian Armed Forces with additional expertise in Cyber Security, Geospatial Exploitation, Reconnaissance, and Electro-Optic Warfare.
