EDITOR'S MESSAGE





It's up to you!


Postmasters were using unofficially precancelled stamps on mail as early as 1875, as is witnessed by this cover. The 3 cent small queen being cancelled prior to being affixed to the envelope using pen and ink. Earlier uses of precancellation have been seen at auction franked with the first cents issue.




The earliest and only known use of a Montreal 21 roller forerunner on cover.




The back of the forerunner cover shows the Coleville receiver dated NOV 1 1888.



3 cent Jubilee on a large part of a wrapper used to mail merchandize for the ROBERT SIMPSON CO. of Toronto.



Block of 18 1 cent small queens on large part of wrapper, User unknown.



Use of the 5 cent Edward precancel on cover is very scarce. This use paid the rate to mail the GOODWINS Catalogue (?) of Montreal to a customer in Ontario. The next page shows the back of this cover.




Ten 10 cent numerals paying for the delivery of 100 pounds (of newspapers?) Rate: 1 cent per pound.
