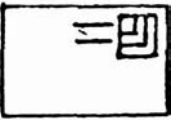

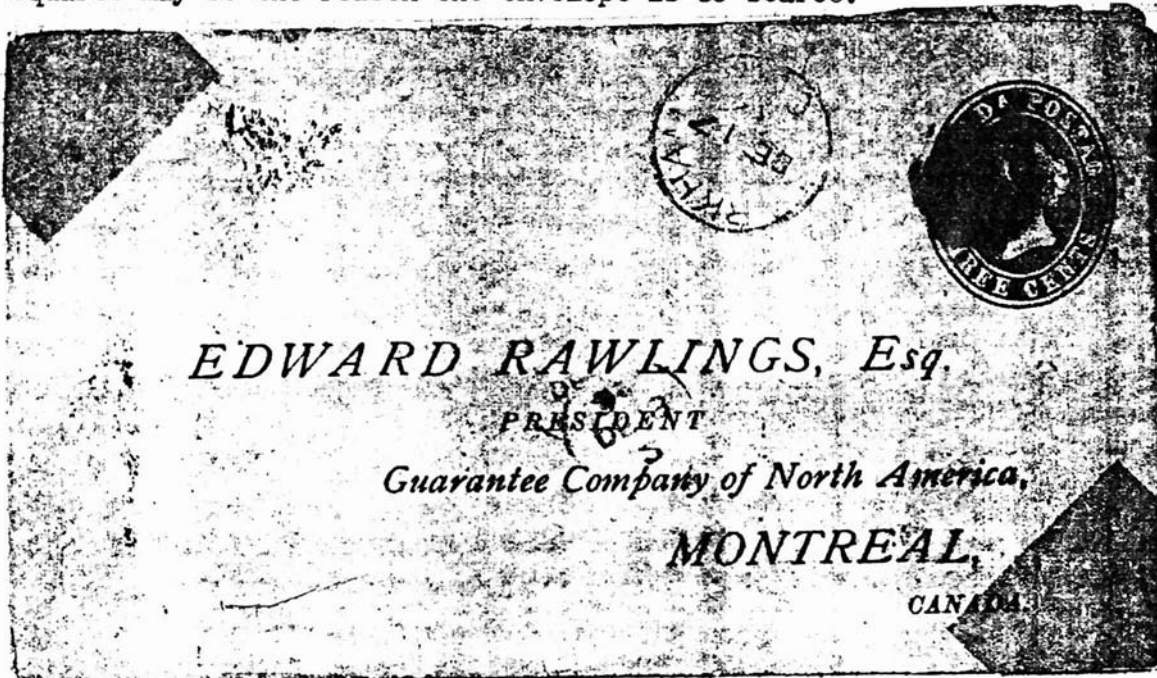

BNAPEX '82

The Study Group held a meeting during BNAPEX '82 at Virginia Beach. Earle Covert brought along enlarged photographic prints illustrating the two varieties of die I of the 2¢ Admiral Issue (PSN Vol. 1, pg. 3). Photographs taken by Don Fraser clearly showed that there were also at least two distinct varieties of the die I of the 1¢ Admiral Issue. Extended discussion after the Study Group meeting indicated that further investigation of these dies is necessary.

An assortment of QE II envelope varieties was shown, and Horace Harrison brought along a large number of cut squares of Webb EN8a which he had purchased recently. Only a very few entires of this envelope are known, and the large number of cut squares may be the reason the envelope is so scarce.

Two known copies were used as return envelopes to this address.

A draft of a letter for Topics was circulated which expressed the concern of the Study Group with the atrocious listing of postal stationery in the 1983 Scott Canadian Specialized Catalogue. It was generally agreed that the letter should be published, although there were arguments both for strengthening and weakening the wording. The letter has appeared in the Nov.-Dec. issue of Topics.

ERPs

This list completes the George V postal cards and the George VI postal bands and wrappers. Listings for about half of the George VI envelopes are also included. A large number of additions have been received and it seems that just about everyone who checks can revise at least a couple of dates. Reports of ERPs should include photocopies of both sides of the stationery item. Handwritten dates on stationery should agree with the postmark but are not, in themselves, sufficient proof of date of use. Dates printed in the text of postal cards are of interest if there is no ERP for an item or if the text date clearly requires that the item was used prior to the previously reported ERP.

POSTAL CARDS USED BY DOMINION EXPRESS COMPANY - AN UPDATE

In Vol. 1, #3 of Postal Stationery Notes (page 22) a preliminary list of postal cards used by Dominion Express Company was given. The publication of this list generated considerable interest and correspondence. Steven Whitcombe sent along a very detailed listing which included items in the collections of several other study group members. Herb Marrion and several other collectors also reported items of interest. I have now compiled a new list which is much larger than the original. I have kept it as simple as possible and minor varieties occurring on the back of cards have not been listed separately.

The cards are listed by Webb Catalogue number. Numbers are then assigned to cards that differ in some way from one-another in the printing on the front of the cards. Cards with different FORM numbers or which have completely different messages on the backs are denoted by A,B,C ... . Where only small differences have been noted in the printing on the back of a particular item, the number of known varieties is reported in parentheses.

TAGGING VARIETY ?

Two copies of the current 30¢ #8 envelope have been found with a tagging bar which is 14.5mm long instead of the usual 20mm. Is this variety generally distributed or was it merely the result of a short-term problem with the plate applying the tag bar?

GEORGIAN FIRST DAY COVERS - COMPARISON WITH POST OFFICE RECORDS

As we have been discussing earliest reported postmarks, it should be noted that there are a number of pieces of postal stationery for which "FIRST DAY COVERS" have been prepared. Some are probably what they purport to be, but some were merely mailed on the first day the new item was noted by a particular collector. One set of covers, however, might be expected to reflect dates close to the true first day of issue (though, as I will discuss later, it can be debated that they are really not FDC's). These covers were prepared by T. R. Legault who held senior positions in the Post Office during the period the covers were postmarked. A summary of the dates on the Legault covers was prepared by Allan M. Thatcher and this was published in Postal Stationery Vol.5, No.3, pg.47 (1958). The covers described by Mr. Thatcher were addressed to Mr. Legault. I have three covers postmarked on the same dates, with Ottawa postmarks, backstamped "Postage Stamp Division / Fin. Br. P. O. Dept." ; and addressed to a Mr. A. F. Brophy of Montreal. It would appear that Mr. Legault may have prepared more than one cover of at least some issues.

Two years ago, while visiting the Postal Museum, I had the opportunity to examine Post Office file 13-13-6. In this file were a series of dated one line memoranda from T. R. Legault (Accountant in Charge) to H. E. Atwater (Financial Superintendent). A typical message of a memo was, for example, 'The new 2¢ advertising cards 8-on were sent to the depots today.' . The memos covered the last two George V postal card issues and the initial George VI stationery items (as well as some non-stationery items). A comparison of the Legault "First Day Cover" dates and the dated memoranda for the three series of postal cards is given in Table 1.

- c) The date Oct. 1, 1935 is listed in the Post Office file for a bilingual business reply card of the 1935 issue. No such card has been catalogued. There may be some confusion here with the  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ card P61c, and the Post Office file should be rechecked.
- d) A discrepancy. Again the problem is with a  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ card. Are these dates reflecting the two distinct heading types which occur on these  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ cards (i.e. P56, 56a and P61, 61e)? Does anyone have a Legault FDC for any of these  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ cards so this can be rechecked?
- e) The Post Office file is unclear, referring to a "1¢ reply post card - English". The date agrees with the P66d Legault FDC. The "2¢ reply card - English" (i.e. the the 1¢ + 1¢) was noted May 26, 1938.
- f) An apparent case of an error in the list of "First Day Covers". If anyone has a copy of the Legault FDC, it should be rechecked. The card postmarked April 25, 1938 is most probably the rouletted card. Another possibility is that the April 25, 1938 3-on cards were not rouletted, but this is less likely.

It can be concluded that for most of the postal card Legault FDC's the dates are the dates supplies were first shipped to the main postal supply depots. There are discrepancies with the  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ and 1¢ +  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ cards and the FDC dates for these are less likely to be real first day of issue cards. Does anyone have other cards marked FDC for these issues?

The Post Office memos and the dates for the Legault FDC's are in agreement for the envelopes EN48, 48a, 50, 50a, 53 and 53a. The memos indicate that the 1¢ postal bands and the newspaper wrappers (W20 and W20e (or d)) were sent to the depots on June 7, 1938 and June 15, 1938 respectively.

It may well have been that the various items were not actually sold to the general public for several days (or months) after the preparation of the FDC's by Legault. Items sent to the depots were not necessarily sold the same day they were received, nor received the same day they were sent from Ottawa. Also, if available, older stock may have been used up before the new stock was sold. On the other hand, it is unlikely that postmarked covers predating most of the Legault FDC's will be found.

I wish to express my appreciation to the staff of the National Postal Museum who were most helpful during my visit.

VICTORIAN MAPLE LEAF ISSUE POSTAL CARDS

In this issue the 1¢ and 1¢ + 1¢ cards were printed by typography. An engraved die was used to print the 2¢ U.P.U. cards. It is worth noting that the two dies differ. The typographed cards have more veining in the leaves, solid lines in the face and neck shading and a very ornate veil. The engraved cards have broken shading lines in the face and especially in the neck. Also, the veil is much plainer.

COPIES OF EN77b FOUND

Recently several hundred unused copies were found of the scarce surcharged envelope Webb EN77b (Higgins and Gage - as B83, but on B76 not B80). Jim Webb is now selling copies at a price substantially below his 1978 catalogue valuation of \$35.00.

UPDATE ON THE QE II CAMEO ISSUE 3¢ #10 ENVELOPE WITH POINTED FLAP

This envelope was discussed in Postal Stationery Notes - Vol. 1, No. 2 (Page 8) and in Vol. 1 No. 4 (page 30). Recently in an F. E. Eaton auction in Vancouver three lots were described containing a total of fifty copies of EN8ld. Two of our Vancouver area members, Tom Flynn and Jack Robb were able to provide descriptions of the envelopes in this sale. Apparently there were a total of fifty-six unused copies. All had a 36mm postal inspection message. Approximately twenty-five of these had a handstamped return address "511-543 Granville Street/ Vancouver 2, B.C.". (Note: the used copy reported on page 30 of PSN for 511-548 should also have read 511-543). At least two copies were addressed (but not mailed) to Vancouver addresses. This brings to eighty-seven the number of unused copies of EN8ld known, and all have the 36mm message.

In addition one further used copy has been reported, this with the 41½mm message. It bears the return address of the South Shore Stamp Club/ Club Philatelique de la Rive Sud/ Casier 33 Box/ St. Lambert, Que. The postmark is Feb. 18, 1966.
