
INDEX FOR VOLUME 3


A REPLY CARD ESSAY

For many years an essay for a Canadian Victorian era reply card has been known. The reply portion of this item was pictured in Holmes' Catalogue (e.g., pg. 307 of the eleventh edition), and the picture from Holmes' was reproduced in the Webb Catalogue. In the Webb Catalogue the essay was given the number P-E2. Recently, the item has resurfaced. In the catalogue of a major Toronto auction house, a photograph of the message half was shown. Now, thanks to Bill Walton, we are able to show, on the next two pages, both sides of the card in detail. The picture of the message half has been slightly enlarged.

THE OFFICIAL PICTORIAL CARDS - MORE VARIETIES

Eric Middleton seems to have opened a new area of study with his comments in the last issue of PSN (pg. 42). He noted the existence of setting varieties on the Official Pictorial Post Card #55. Quickly Jim Webb reported that he had found two copies of type A and three copies of type B in his stock. Then Geoff Walburn reported varieties on five more cards numbers 54, 351, 353, 401 and 456. Your editor was able to confirm varieties on #456 from his own collection, and his pair seems to be the same as that found by Geoff Walburn. There seem to be small constant differences in the views, primarily flaws, and it might be worth study to see if these flaws can be found to correspond with the setting differences. It should be noted that the differences in the settings on card #401 are very small, and may not be significant.

CHANGES PLANNED FOR POSTAL STATIONERY IN THE 1986 SCOTT SPECIALIZED

After my review on the 1985 Scott Specialized Catalogue (Canadian version) in the last PSN, I received the following comments from Jim Webb:

"Re: your remarks on Scotts. Unitrade has asked me to re-write the Stationery section and for the 1986 edition I will do the regular envelopes, wrappers & post bands, and <u>regular</u> post cards only. Will see how this goes and possibly expand to aerogrammes and letter cards in future years."

This indeed sounds encouraging, and we can only hope Unitrade follows through and a reworked stationery section is actually incorporated in next year's edition.

It is with deep regret that we report the death of member Fred Johnson on November 10, 1984. Fred was an enthusiastic collector of modern Canadian stationery, and was particularly interested in the 8¢ Alaska Highway envelopes and forms as well as the story behind the pictorial prestamped cards of the early 1970's. He wrote several interesting articles on these topics for "Postal Stationery".

STATIONERY AT PIPEX

Study Group member Jack Robb is on the organizing committee of PIPEX'85 in Vancouver. He has expressed an interest in seeing a good number of BNA stationery exhibits at the show. Plans call for a seminar on Canadian Centennial Issue postal cards, and, if sufficient entries are received, a special award (Marcus White award) for the best stationery exhibit. Entry forms are available from Jack Robb, 2985 East 41st Ave., Vancouver, B.C. V5R 2X7. Entry forms must be submitted before April 1. This is a good show for members to try out their exhibits before BNAPEX this fall.
