

French or English First?


It has been noted that newly issued post cards have stamp die headings in both English and French. Sometimes, however, the French is first; other times it is English. This difference seems to relate to where the cards are expected to sell in the highest quantities.

This difference was noted on the Zamboni cards, but it prompted me to look back over other new issue cards. I went back to 1999 and noted the differences noted below.









PORT PAYÉ/POSTAGE PAID on Montreal Canadiens Zamboni

Half-circle "cancel" Eng 1st & Fr 1st

POSTAGE PAID/PORT PAYÉ on Toronto Maple Leafs Zamboni

This language difference occurs in three places: under the stamp, in the half-circle "cancel," and title (if there is one) on the view side. If the text under the stamp is French first, the cancel illustration on the picture side can be either English first and French second, or the reverse.

Note that the 1999 French first/English second card also has Port Payé/Postage Paid in the stamp.

The following four cards are Quebec tourist attractions which one might expect to have French under the stamp, but the language under the stamp is English, as is the half circle "cancel" illustration on front. So perhaps the change to French under the stamp for cards issued with a Quebec theme did not begin until 2004.

One new view and a card with a rather unexpected bar-code change have been reported.

PCF-T3H (borderless, die IIIc, all with underlay U1)

CNT 002 revised (again (or earlier?)

No PCF in logo, and the top-centre bar code remains 73418 34384, **but** the bottom-left code now is back to 64392 00443 rather than 64392 00409. So now we have three varieties:

PCF in logo

bar code 64392 004**43** at lower left + bar code 73418 34384 (centred mid-top) no PCF in logo

bar code 64392 004**09** at lower left + bar code 73418 34384 (centred mid-top) bar code 64392 004**43** at lower left + bar code 73418 34384 (centred mid-top)



So far, this card has been found only in a post office (and it *is* listed on the post-office order system even though it has every usual characteristic of a card only released at retail

CANADIAN PACIFIC EARNINGS & EXPENSES STATEMENTS ~ Part II

Early in 1899, the unstamped letter sheet usages came to an end, as discussed in Part I (PSN Vol 26, No.5, March 2015). They were replaced by post cards – first, with unstamped cards showing the same views already in use for the Company's first issue green views on postal stationery cards, and later by use on the railway view postal stationery cards themselves.

E: E&E Statements on Unstamped Post Cards with Views

The illustrations below show the unstamped view cards identified to date. Two unused figure numbers (Fig. 15 and Fig. 20) have been left for monthly statements not yet found. Three figure numbers show two views (Fig. 8-1 and 8-2, 14-1 and 14-2, and 21-1 and 21-2) because two views have been found for those monthly statements.




Fig. 9: Dec 1899 (as CPR 4)




Fig. 13: Apr 1900 (as CPR 5)





Fig. 14-1: May 1900 (as CPR 5)


Fig. 17: Aug 1900 (as CPR 9)

It is immediately apparent that sepia was used consistently until near the end, when red, blue and green appear.

It also appears that views were used one at a time. Where two views are known for one statement, they still suggest this. The two views found for the Nov 28, 1899 statement for October show the view used the previous month and the view used the subsequent month. The two views found for the May 28, 1900 statement for April show in one case the view used the previous month (the following month has not yet been found).

The views change over time matching the changes on the CPR First Issue green railway view cards. The Chateau Frontenac view 3b is replaced in the above illustrations over time by 4 and then 4b. Place Viger 8 is replaced by 8a, Fraser Canon 5 by 5a, and Glacier House 7 by 7a.

As the last two illustrations show (Figs. 22 & 23), the Jan. 28, 1901 statement for December 1900 appears on both an unstamped card and on a railway view postal stationery card – this appears to represent the changeover statement. I have never found a later use on an unstamped card (or an earlier railway view card with an E&E statement).

QUESTION: The last unstamped formula letter sheet I have recorded (shown in Part I of this article) has the Feb. 28, 1899 statement for January. The first unstamped view card shown above has the April 28, 1899 statement for March. Can anyone report an unstamped card use prior to this April 28, 1899 statement?

QUESTION: Can anyone report either of the two missing statements – June 1900 for May, or Nov. 1900 for October?

QUESTION: Can anyone report an unstamped card with a different view for that statement than the one shown in this article?

F: The Railway View Postal Stationery Cards

Railway view postal stationery cards came into use by March 1898, and served many company purposes. The January 1901 statement for December 1900 marked the beginning of their use for Earnings & Expenses statements, and this continued at least through the May 1925 statement for April – a span of 24 years and 4 months. This represents 292 monthly statements – a daunting collecting challenge, particularly since many statements occur on more than one of the successive postal stationery cards used for the views (and of course can occur on every view on any particular postal stationery card).

One curious anomaly should be noted. Two statements during this period – the December 1908 statement for November, and the February 1912 statement for January – have been found on 1¢ Edward cards without railway views.

Some answers to CANADIAN PACIFIC E&E STATEMENTS ~ Part I

A: The Early Postal Stationery Card Usages

I am able to report one addition to the early postal stationery usage for E&E statements, this one on P4 (as Fig. 1 in the last issue of PSNotes), for March 1885 (as shown in Fig. 2 in our last issue).




Fig. 26: March 1885 statement on P4, mailed on April 30, 1885 from Montreal to the UK.

It is quite natural to expect that both P4 and P5 would have been used at this time for each statement, one for domestic stockholders, and one for those abroad. Fig. 1 showed a domestic usage for the March 1885 statement, and this one is used abroad. Note that while the statements are the same (See Fig. 1 Vol. 26, No. 5) the form itself has some differences.

D. The Unstamped Letter Sheet Usages – Second Period

I am also able to show the missing November 1898 unstamped letter sheet usage for October. This one is missing the stamp, but is cancelled with a Dec. 1898 Fontainebleau, France receiver.




Fig. 27: Unstamped letter sheet usage for E&E statement – the November 28, 1898 statement for October.
