



Slogans 5560 -MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS EARLY and 2412 - DEPOSEZ VOS COLIS DE NOEL DE BONNE HEURE

This slogan, followed by its bilingual version a year later, was first issued in 1922 and appears to be the earliest Canadian slogan to have a reference to Christmas.

As with most slogans first issued in the 1920-25 period, the early use is not well documented, so data from that period depends on CPSGB reports for usage and strikes actually seen for die identification, leaving some significant gaps. However, from 1926, the classification can be almost fully detailed by use and die and it is hoped that members can supply information to fill in the early omissions.

The slogans had annual usage, with dies issued in mid November of each year, normally returned shortly after Christmas for random re-issue in the following year. It is not clear just how many dies were in use during the earlier years, but by 1927 at least it is probable that issue of one bilingual and eight English dies had been completed. The English dies were all in the same format, with an attractive design and some ornamentation, making them easily separable. A ninth English die, in a more simple three line format, is recorded for TORONTO in 1964 and 1966 and was probably issued in 1964.

The Catalogue states English use by 30 offices. Documentation confirms 30 offices, but there are reports of ST. JOHN in 1925 and PICTON in 1934, The period of English use is given as 1922-41, 1948, 1954-60, 1962-64 and 1966-67. There is confirmed use in 1922-34 and an unconfirmed report of 1935 use by a single office. 1936-38 use appears unlikely, but KAMLOOPS had confirmed use in 1939 and 1941, with 1940 probable, the only office with use at that time. There is also confirmed use, again by KAMLOOPS only, in 1944-48. The only later use was a revival of the slogan at TORONTO, confirmed in 1954-60, 1962-64 and 1966, so the additional reported use there in 1967 is probable.

The catalogue report of bilingual use, by only three offices in 1924-28, 1930 and 1933, seems incorrect. There appears to have been only one bilingual die, introduced in 1923 and thereafter rotated annually between TROIS RIVIERES, MONTREAL and SHERBROOKE until 1930. There does not appear to have been 1931 use, but the die was then issued consecutively to HULL, THETFORD MINES and ST. JEROME in 1932-34.

The following are the best present estimates of use by years, with a die designation in parenthesis if known. The additional use confirmation and die data reports required are indicated.

English usage

1922 usage - Confirmed for MONTREAL (6), TORONTO (1) and WINNIPEG (2) only, but also reported for HALIFAX, UTTAWA and REGINA, suggesting six dies in use. The MONTREAL use is English, since the bilingual die was not issued until 1923. Reports needed for any offices other than the three confirmed.

Slogans 5560 -MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS EARLY and 2412 - DEPOSEZ VOS COLIS DE NOEL DE BONNE HEURE

1923 usage - Confirmed for BRANDON, EDMONTON (5), HALIFAX (4), OTTAWA (3), and TORONTO (6), also reported for CORNWALL, VANCOUVER and WINNIPEG. Since the eventual number of dies was 8, the three reported offices are possible, but the 1924 usage suggests that there were still only six dies at that time, with the 7th and 8th not issued until 1925 or 1926, so two of the three reported 1923 offices as suspect. Report needed for BRANDON die and confirmation of any of the reported offices.

1924 usage - Confirmed for EDMONTON, OTTAWA, TORONTO (4), VANCOUVER (5) and WINNIPEG (3), also reported for SASKATOON, suggesting as mentioned above that there were still only six dies in use. Reports needed for EDMONTON and OTTAWA dies, confirmation of SASKATOON and reports of a 7th or 8th office that might verify the 1923 reports.

1925 usage — Confirmed for CALGARY, HAMILTON (8), OIIAWA (4), REGINA (5), TORONTO (2), VANCOUVER (6) and WINNIPEG (3), also reported for ST. JOHN, indicating that at least the 7th and probably the 8th die had issue in this year. Reports needed for CALGARY die and confirmation of ST JOHNs.

1926 usage - Confirmed for SASKATOON (7), VANCOUVER (6) and WINNIPEG (3) only and no other offices are reported, although it is probable that 8 dies were then available. However, 1926 saw considerable expansion of the use of the related slogan 5537, which had been introduced in OTTAWA only in 1925. 5537 may therefore have been favoured by many major offices over 5560 from 1926 on and certainly the post 1926 use of 5560 is generally from smaller offices. Reports needed for confirmation of any other offices.

1927 usage - Use of 7 dies is confirmed for HALIFAX (6), LETHBRIDGE (5), MOOSE JAW (3), OWEN SOUND (8), PETERBPROUGH (1), PRINCE RUPERT (7) and WINDSOR (4), most of them smaller offices that had not used the slogan before. Die 2, which had been seen since 1922, has not been seen in 1927, but may well have been used by an as yet unreported office.

1928 usage - All 8 dies are confirmed as used by the 7 offices with 1927 use, HALIFAX (5), LETHBRIDGE (7), MOOSE JAW (1), OWEN SOUND (4), PETERBOROUGH (8), PRINCE RUPERT (6), WINDSOR (3), and the addition of KAMLOOPS (2), supporting the probability that there was an 8th office in 1927.

1929 usage + All 8 dies are confirmed as used by the 7 offices with 1927-28 use, HALIFAX (6), LETHBRIDGE (5), MOOSE JAW (8), OWEN SOUND (3), PETERBOROUGH (2) PRINCE RUPERT (1), WINDSOR (4), but with VICTORIA (7) now replacing KAMLOOPS.

1930 usage - All 8 dies are confirmed as used by 6 of the 7 offices with 1927-29 use, HALIFAX (6), LETHBRIDGE(7), MOOSE JAW (5), OWEN SOUND (3), PETERBOROUGH (2), PRINCE RUPERT (1), plus VICTURIA (8) use retained and WINNIPEG (4) replacing WINDSOR.

Slogans 5560 -MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS EARLY and 2412 - DEPOSEZ VOS COLIS DE NOEL DE BONNE HEURE

- 1931 usage Important changes in using offices. Confirmed for CHARLOTTETOWN (5), CORNWALL (6), FURT FRANCES (1), FREDERICTON (4), ST. CATHERINES (7), SARNIA (8) and VICTORIA (2) and reported for WINDSOR, indicating use of all 8 dies, but largely from offices without prior use, Report needed of WINDSOR use, probably from die 3.
- 1932 usage Confirmed for EDMONTON (1), FREDERICTON (4), MOOSE JAW (3), SARNIA (2), SASKATOON (8) and VICTORIA (7) and CORNWALL reported. Report needed confirming CORNWALL and any eighth office that may exist.
- 1933 usage Confirmed for 7 offices, BRANDON (3), CALGARY (1), FORT FRANCES (7), FORT WILLIAM (4), KAMLOOPS (8), SARNIA (5) and WINNIPEG (6), again making an 8th possible, though die 2 is not recorded after 1932 and possibly retired by 1933. Report needed of any additional office.
- 1934 usage Confirmed for BRANDON (7), KAMLOOPS (1), NORTH BATTLEFORD (8) and PICTON, also reported for FORT FRANCES. Report needed confirming FORT FRANCES use and PICTON die. Other offices may exist, but it is possible that several dies had been retired by this date.
- 1935 usage No use confirmed, but NORTH BATTLEFORD reported as retaining its 1934 die usage. Confirmation of the single reported office needed.
- 1936-38 usage None confirmed or reported.
- 1939 usage Only KAMLOOPS is confirmed and no others reported. From this year, all further use is from a single office only, first KAMLOOPS, then TORONTO, both using the last surviving die 8.
- 1940 usage None confirmed or reported, though reports are needed of possible KAMLOOPS use, as there was in 1939 and 1941.
- 1941 usage KAMLOOPS confirmed, with the same surving die 8 as in 1939.
- 1942-43 usage None confirmed or reported.
- 1944-48 usage Additional KAMLOOPS use is either confirmed or reported, again from the same survivinguie 8 as used there in 1939 and 1941.
- 1949-53 usage None confirmed or reported.
- 1954-67 usage Confirmed for TORONTO 1954-60, 1962-64 and 1968, reported there in 1967. 1963 use was still from the same surving die 8 earlier used in KAMLOOPS, but 1964 is from a new 3 line die, also used in 1966 and probably in 1967. Reports needed to confirm TORONTO in 1961, 1965 and 1967.





The Canadian "CUSTOMS DUTY PAID" and "CUSTOMS DUTY FREE" Special Service Markings

These postal markings in the form of machine slogan postmarks are of a handfull of "special service" markings which are listed separately in the Proulx catalog. This article will attempt to explain their use and illustrate the different types which have come to the attention of the author.




FIGURE 1. <u>CUSTOMS DUTY PAID</u> Montreal, Quebec Oct. 21, 1938 Struck in purple on Shell Oil Co. advertising post card mailed from Italy. The card was not postmarked properly in Italy, thus the Customs Duty Paid marking falls on the Italian stamp.

My first exposure to these very interesting markings, and a subsequent explanation for their use, came almost simultaneously at a BNAPS convention early in my slogan collecting days. While ravaging the cover boxes of the dealers at hand I came across a post card with a strike of the CUSTOMS DUTY PAID marking, struck in purple from Montreal, The card originated from Italy and bore a Genoa machine slogan "VISITATE L'ITALIA", visit Italy. I found the card to be interesting and thus acquired it. (Figure 1.)

Later as the days of the convention passed I took a journey through the exhibits and was surprised to see an almost identical card in a revenue exhibit by former BNAPS president Ed Whiting. From his exhibit I learned that advertising material from outside Canada, usually sent at third class rate, was subject to a duty tax upon entering Canada.

Upon closer examination of the card I acquired, what appeared to be a handwritten message on a typical greeting card turned out to be a printed message asking its recipient to use the services of a local Shell service station. Thus this "greeting card" became an advertising message and became subject to a duty tax.




FIGURE 2A. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID TORONTO City designation in killer grid, a different die than Fig. 2.

Further inquiry with Ed Whiting revealed that the duty charges on such material could be prepaid individually on each piece, (Figure 2.) or prepaid as an entire mailing to one geographic area.

An alternative to this scenario would be that the duty would be unpaid by the sender, and paid by the recipient; but then, that wouldn't be a very good advertising strategy, would it?

The second marking, CUSTOMS DUTY FREE, was apparently applied to third class mail, such as samples, that was judged to be other than advertising material. The criteria for such evaluation is unknown to this author. However, mail from stamp dealers is known to bear this marking.

The purpose of this article has been to illustrate the various examples of these markings known to the author. No attempt has been made to document, in the usual fashion, all known cities of use with the appropriate dates.




FIGURE 2. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID TORONTO with city designation in killer grid, perhaps to eliminate the need for using the dater dial. A backstamp on a #10 size Readers Digest advertising cover from the U.S., a Dec. 5, 1942 meter impression on front.




FIGURE 3. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID TORONTO, with city designation in killer grid, struck on advertising material from the U.S. over a $1\frac{1}{2}$ cent 1938 Prexy issue, precancelled Akron, Ohio.




FIGURE 4. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID MONTREAL QUEBEC, with city and provincial designation in grid and with dater dial, dated May 12, 1960 on an advertising postcard from San Marino.




FIGURE 5. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID, April 27 (1937) used from Montreal on a cover from Germany.




FIGURE 6. CUSTOMS DUTY PAID, Winnipeg, Man. A peculiar use of the Customs Duty Paid marking on an internal cover.




FIGURE 7. CUSTOMS DUTY FREE LONDON with city designation in killer grid on a cover from Germany, 1932.




FIGURE 8. CUSTOMS DUTY FREE, a backstamp on a First Flight Cover from France.




FIGURE 11. DOUANE CANADA CUSTOMS FRANC DE DROITS DUTY FREE, Quebec, October 20, 1952, a cut-out strike.




FIGURE 12. CUSTOMS DUTY FREE, Kitchener, Ontario, Canada, (1955) on a ship cover marked "S.S. EMPRESS OF SCOTLAND".

RELATED AIRMAIL SLOGANS OF 1938-48

In issue No. 7 these slogans were introduced with detailed classifications of 125, AIRMAIL SAFE SURE SPEEDY and 132, AIRMAIL SPEEDS BUSINESS. They are now followed by similar classification of 3945, GIVE WINGS TO YOUR MAIL.

SLOGAN 3945, GIVE WINGS TO YOUR MAIL


Initiated by the issue of three dies in early February of 1939. These three dies were constantly interchanged, although at various intervals, between not less than 45 confirmed using offices and possibly one other reported, but not yet confirmed. In April of 1939 a fourth die was added, probably of a different machine type than the original three, and until 1947 was interchanged only between four offices that never used the first three dies. From late 1947 its use was switched to three different offices, one of which had used dies 2 and 3 in 1939-40. Including die 4, total use was from 51 confirmed and one reported offices.

The four dies, as illustrated, are reasonably separable. Dies 1 and 2 are quite similar, but if the dash to the left of TO is clear, it can be seen that on die 1 it is reasonably centered over the U of YOUR, while on die 2 it is noticably shifted left. Die 3, in addition to minor differences in letter shapes and positions, is missing a dash to the right of TO. Die 4 can be immediately recognized because TO is flanked by stylized wings, rather than dashes.

Interchange of dies 1 to 3 was very frequent and regular in 1939-40 and somwhat less frequent, but still regular, in 1941. Thereafter usage apppears to have been for longer periods, more irregularly and by fewer offices.

A number of offices used the slogan in several different years, and especially in 1939-40 some used it more than once in a given year, either with the same or different dies, depending on the random re-issues. Collections of this slogan, and indeed of all the related slogans of this group, will better illustrate the continuity of issue if mounted by die, office and periods of use, rather than by office alone.

The following listings by die identification are based much more on seeing Proof Book receipt illustrations than on seeing actual usage. Since receipt strikes have frequently reproduced poorly. it is very possible that some identification errors exist, especially between dies 1 and 2 if the left dashes are unclear. The unconfirmed reported use is from the CPSGB listings in Maple Leaves.





PROTECT THE BIRDS AND HELP THE CROPS

SLOGAN 7250-A

This rather quaint slogan was first used in 1922 and had intermittent use to 1931, largely by HAMILTON, but also by seven other offices during the period. Three dies, easily seperable by letter size and position, were issued in 1922 and continued in rotating use between the various offices, frequently being shared by two of them in the earlier years.

Usage was approximately seasonal, usually beginning in March-MAY of the year and normally ending in JULY, although somewhat extended in 1929.

1922 usage

The earliest issue appears as being of die 1 to HAMILTON, probably in late April or early May of 1922. The usage was relatively short, being recorded MAY 7-JUN 15 and documentation indicates that this die was then sent to GUELPH on JUN 25. The GUELPH usage has not been recorded and its length not established, but was probably for only a month or two.

Die 2 was issued to VANCOUVER MAY 25, recprded to at least JUN 22 and probably used until shortly thereafter. Die 3 was issued to VICTORIA on JUN 2, recorded only JUN 9, but probably used through July.

The catalogue also reports WINNIPEG use in 1922, possible as a re-issue of one of the dies in July-August, but not confirmed by documentation or recorded use.

1923 usage

Die 3 was issued to MONTREAL on MAY 15, then sent to VICTORIA JUN 25, though the catalogue does not list 1923 use. Die 1 was issued to HAMILTON on MAY 23. The catalogue again lists WINNIPEG use in this year and since die 2 was available, the usage is very possible, but not documented. There is also a reliable report of TORONTO 1923 use, although not listed in the catalogue. Since there is a pattern of sending dies to a second office within the year, the TORONTO use is very possible from either die 1 or 2,

1924 usage

Die 3 was issued to TORONTO on MAR 21 and re-issued to HAMILTON on MAY 5. Die 1 has been recorded at MONTREAL early in the year, MAR 25-APR 18 and was re-issued to OTTAWA on MAY 19, with recorded use until at least JUN 24. Die 2 was issued to WINNIPEG on MAR 26, then sent to VICTORIA on MAY 5, recorded to at least MAY 20 and probably later. The catalogue does not list the VICTORIA usage, but it has been recorded.

1925 usage

Die 1 was issued to HAMILTON on APR 29, returned JUN 2. Die 2 was issued to VICTORIA on JUL 2, no return date indicated. There is no record of issue of die 3 after 1924 and it may have been retired by 1925. The catalogue reports HAMILTON and VICTORIA usage only.

Slogan 7520-A, continued

1926-27, 1929 and 1931 usage

Most use from 1926 was by HAMILTON only. Die 1 was issued there on MAY 13.26, returned JUL 21. Die 2 was used MAY 3.27, returned JUL 6. No use is reported for 1928, but was resumed by HAMILTON in 1929 with issue of die 2 on MAY 8, returned SEP 7 and also the issue of die 1 to VICTORIA on MAY 21, returned NOV 26, an unusually long period to retain the die. There was again no use in 1930, but HAMILTON resumed use for the final time in 1931 with the issue of die 2 on MAY 7, returned very shortly on MAY 27.

The HAMILTON usage is in accord with the catalogue for this period, but the catalogue omits the recorded VICTORIA use in 1929.

English slogan 6465 - OBSERVE SUNDAY and bilingual versions 6465-A, English over French and 6475, French over English

The catalogue correctly indicates 6465-A as being first issued in 1929, but states that 6465 had earlier use from 1928, probably based on a CPSGB report of use in that year by three offices. Documentation does not support this and it is considered incorrect. Documented earliest use of either slogan was of 6465-A at six Province of Quebec offices in April of 1929, followed in Oct-Nov of 1929 by English use from 16 offices.

Initial 1929 issue of 6465-A consisted of 7 dies of a large two line slogan, without a grid, one each to CHICOUTIMI, HULL, QUEBEC, SHERBROOKE and TROIS RIVIERES and two for use by MONTREAL in 1929 only.

The 1929 issue of 6465 consisted of 16 dies of smaller 2-line slogans, with grid, issued to CALGARY, CHARLOTTETOWN, EDMONTON, FREDERICTON, HALIFAX, HAMILTON, LONDON, MOOSE JAW, OTTAWA, REGINA, ST. JOHN, SASKATOON, TORONTO, VANCOUVER, VICTORIA and WINNIPEG.

The first usage of bilingual 6475 was not until 1959.

From 1930, annual re-issues of the two slogans were both at the same time in the spring, though from the 1940's bilinguals tended to be put in use slightly earlier than the English versions. Dies were normally returned after use and subsequent re-issues appear to have been made randomly, so that dies used by an office often differ from year to year.

In subsequent years additional dies of each slogan were issued in groups, all with the same wording, but in different formats from the originals and from one another. There were eventually four formats of 6465 and two each f 6465-A and 6475. The eight formats are illustrated in Appendix A,

Formats can be easily separated, but the eventual total of 30 dies of 6465 and 10 of 6465-A include such similarities that, in spite of considerable effort to establish separate identification of each so that rotation over the many years of use can be determined, it has not been feasible. The basis for such a determination depends on seeing actual or proof book receipt strikes of each office's use in each year. Receipt strikes exist for 1929 until 1952, but are too often so unclear, or in some cases missing, as to make accurate identification very difficult or impossible.

For the late use in the 1950-60's period, there are no receipt strikes and identification can only be made for strikes actually seen. It therefore has been reluctantly decided that, rather than wait until ebough material can be examined to permit a detailed listing with die rotation, it is better to now show as comprehensive a usage by office, without reference to die or format, as can presently be established.

Usage of slogan 6465

Assisted by receipt strikes, even if somewhat incomplete and unclear, plus the not entirely reliable CPSGB usage reports to 1957, 6465 annual use by offices can be quite completely listed until the mid-1950's. Later use is based only on intermittent reports and sightings, but these suggest that some offices may have had continuous use from 1951 until as late as 1969, though these patterns still require substantial confirmation.

English slogan 6465 - OBSERVE SUNDAY and bilingual versions 6465-A, English over French and 6475, French over English

Usage of slogan 6465 continued

A total of 30 dies were issued in four formats. Format A, 16 dies issued in 1929, format B six dies issued in 1932, format C, four dies issued in 1935 and format D, four dies issued in 1936.

Catalogue lists use in 32 offices, 1928-38, 1942, 1944-46, 1948-49 and 1951-69. but only 29 are confirmed. 1928 earliest appears incorrect, but use from 1929 to 1950 is confirmed, except for 1949. 1951-69 listing is also confirmed, Gaps in annual use, as opposed to more consistent bilingual use, may in part be the result of the influx of war related slogans in the early 1940's. The confirmed usage is therefore 1929-38, 1942, 1944-46, 1948, and 1951-69.

Usage of slogan 6465-A

Use was from 10 dies in two formats, format A had 7 dies issued in 1929, reading OBSERVE SUNDAY OBSERVEZ LE DIMANCHE in two lines, without grid. Format B had 3 dies issued in 1932, The wording in four lines, with grid.

Catalogue states used in 15 offices, 1929-69 and 1972, but only 14 offices are confirmed, though with SHAWINIGAN FALLS daters used both with and without FALLS, this could be considered 15 offices. Listed use is confirmed for 1929-65, without gaps, but 1966-69 is not known or reported and 1972 is probably confused with WILLOWDALE 1972 use of slogan 6475.

Use appears as in each year 1929-65, without gaps known in the 6465 usage. There are no reports of use beyond 1965, though 6465 use extended to 1969.

Usage of slogan 6475

The catalogue lists only 3 using offices, MONTREAL in 1959, ST. HYACINTHE in 1965 and WILLOWDALE in 1972, but some further use is known and there were at least two formats, a two line and a four line, both reading OBSERVEZ LE DIMANCHE OBSERVE SUNDAY. The two line format is recorded for MONTREAL in 1959, RIMOUSKI in 1962 and 1964 and SHAWINIGAN in 1963, all probably concurrent with 6465-A. This suggests unrecorded use in 1960-61.

The four line format is known at ST. HYACINTHE, GRANBY and DRUMMONDVILLE in 1965, suggesting more than one die, though strikes are very similar. Reported 1972 WILLOWDALE has not been seen and the format is not known.

The author is much indebted to member Jean-Guy Dalpe for help offered from his specialized collection of Quebec Province material, which was so valuable for slogans having as extensive bilingual use as 6465-A and 6475.

Using offices of 6465 and 6465-A are listed alphabetically in Appendix B, indicating probable USE periods as determined from confirmation, reports and usage patterns. Appendix C is a probable usage chart of 6465 and 6465-A, with "C" indicating use confirmed by sighting or documentation, "R" indicating use reported, normally by CPSGB, but not confirmed, and "P" indicating unconfirmed or reported use that appears probable from known usage patterns.
