Royal Family 1897 - 1901

The Cabot issue was not intended to be a permanent one, and as soon as the issue had been delivered, the American Bank Note Company began preparing a regular issue consisting of 6 values portraying various members of the Royal Family. Beginning in December 1897 with the issues of the 1¢ red and 2¢ orange and, with the exception of the 3¢ orange re-issued for War Tax purposes in 1918, the last values issued were the 5¢ blue in June 1899 and the 4¢ violet in October 1901.

The Stamps::

½¢ Child Edward VIII - 1¢ Queen Victoria - 2¢ Edward VII - 3¢ Queen Alexandra - 4¢ Duchess of York - 5¢ Duke of York. All stamps were engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Co., New York in sheets of either 100 or 200 subjects, perforated 12 x 12, on un-watermarked paper. Diagrams of the various sheet layouts are shown throughout this exhibit.

1/2¢ Newspaper Rate

In October 1887, to encourage access to reading material, the G. P. O. introduced a 1/2¢ rate on "printed matter literature". This rate appears to have been discontinued in 1900 as no evidence is found in guides after 1899. This is the **ONLY** intended and proper single usage for this stamp.

The Trade Review began publication on Sept. 14, 1892.

Rare, possibly unique.

On 16th May 1918 an amendment to the "Revenue Act, 1905" was passed and the public was notified that "On and after 17th May 1918 every prepaid letter and letter packet posted in Newfoundland shall, in addition to the postage payable thereon, under the Provision of the Post Office Act of 1891, and Acts in amendment thereafter, be charged with an EXTRA POSTAGE OF ONE CENT - thus a one-ounce letter will be three cents and a two-ounce letter five cents etc.

On and after June 1st 1918, all letters originating in Newfoundland and not bearing the extra postage will be charged two cents additional on delivery.

In the case of letters from Labrador, the double tax will not be enforced in Newfoundland until the arrival and distribution of the first mail by steamer from the coast"

Current stocks of 3¢ stamps were inadequate. To secure the stamps in time, the Newfoundland G. P. O. went to the American Bank Note Co. who still had the plates for the 3¢ orange of 1898 in their possession.

The 1852 Statues of Newfoundland. 15 Victoria. Cap XIII. Passed 14 June 1852 partly reads...

"- be enacted that in every case in which any Seaman in Her Majesties Navy, Serjeant, Corporal, Drummer, Trumpeter, Fifer, or Private Soldier in Her Majesties Service shall be entitled to send or receive letters on the payment of a certain sum, and no more, in place of all British Postage thereon, the payment of such small sum shall likewise free such letter from all Colonial Postage thereon...

At this time the 1st class postage rate to Great Britain was 5¢ per ½ oz.

H. M. S. Rambler was an Algerine-class gun vessel of the Royal Navy launched on 26 January 1880. She was commissioned as a survey vessel in 1884. *Rambler* conducted extensive surveys in the Red Sea and Far East, and from 1886 served on the China Station. For a few months between October 1889 and April 1890 she conducted a survey in Western Australian waters. She re-commissioned on 1 February 1889 at Hong Kong. In 1897 and 1898 she surveyed the Strait of Belle isle and the Labrador Coast in the Atlantic. Between November 1899 and June 1890 *Rambler* contributed men to a naval brigade during the *Boer War*. She was sold on 23 January 1907.

Red Bay is a fishing village and former site of several Basque whaling stations on the southern coast of Labrador.





An 1898 cover endorsed "From P.W.B. Fitz, C.C." (Chief Carpenter) "H. M. S. Rambler Red Bay, Labrador" countersigned "CEM" (C. E. Munro) "Commanding Officer", bearing two singles 1¢ green Victoria to Middlesex, U. K. Red Bay, Labrador by coastal steamer "Coastal T. P. O. North Sp 13, 98 to St. John's (Sp 18), hence via Liverpool/Ship (Sp 29), London (Sp 30) and Paddington W (Sp 30), forwarded to Shepherds Bush.

War Tax

On 16th May 1918 an amendment to the "Revenue Act, 1905" was passed and the public was notified that "On and after 17th May 1918 every prepaid letter and letter packet posted in Newfoundland shall, in addition to the postage payable thereon, under the Provision of the Post Office Act of 1891, and Acts in amendment thereafter, be charged with an EXTRA POSTAGE OF ONE CENT - thus a one-ounce letter will be three cents and a two-ounce letter five cents etc.





Both were delivered on the same day by the same letter carrier. Addressed to Paris and forwarded to the "Chateau de Gouberville" near St. Pierre Eglise, the postcard shows markings in England due to being registered.

Born March 6, 1862 in Allendorf, Germany. In May 1899, E. R. Krippner took up residence in St. John's. Newfoundland and immediately sought philatelic clients by advertising under the pseudonym of Reichardt in local newspapers.

Krippner's patriotic artistic designed covers, pre-franked with Newfoundland Royal Family definitive issue stamps attracted patriotic clients. He applied his artwork by hand using coloured India inks, fine artist brushes and pens. These were protected with a varnish, which also enhanced the colours. To date, 57 postally used "Patriotic" covers have been recorded. These were all produced whilst he was residing and working in Newfoundland, between May 1899 and sometime in 1904.

E. R. Krippner relocated to Winnipeg in July 1904, leaving again sometime between 1916 and 1923 for the United States of America where he died on January 29, 1942.
