NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAGE METERS 1928 - 1949

Using adhesive postage stamps created inefficiencies with the growing volume of mail being handled in mailrooms of Newfoundland businesses. To expedite the processing of mail and to help solve employee pilfering of postage stamps, Newfoundland authorized the use of four different postage meter machines for merchants and the GPO during the period of 1928 – 1949.

Type 1 - Universal Midget - page 1 - 5

Type 2 - Neo-post - page 6-29

Type 3 - Pitney-Bowes model H5 - page 30-34

Type 4 - Pitney-Bowes model R - page 35-48

Newfoundland meter covers are scarce because they represent less than 15% of the total mail volume. Those with clean impressions and readable meter numbers are harder again for the collector to find.

Type 1: Universal Midget

The Universal Postal Frankers of London, England produced the first meters for Newfoundland in 1928. The Midget model was a basic hand cranked machine with three fixed denominations, 1, 2 and 3 cents, and later a 4 cent would replace the 2 cent in meter #6. The die is similar to Great Britain's design with Royal Crown and Cypher *GvR* or *GvIR* at center. Value figure at bottom center with "No" at left and meter number at right with or without town mark impressions in red ink.


There were three Midget type meters that were sold outright to local merchants who were responsible for servicing their own machines.

Meter #6, Bowring Brother Limited: 1st cover, paying 1 cent local per 1oz + 2 cents per extra oz. rate 1942; 2nd, paying 2 cent local rate in 1937; 3rd, 3 cent inland rate in 1932 with advertising; and 4th, 4 cent inland in 1944 as consequence of rate increase on Dec 6 1932.

Type 2: Neo-post

The Roneo Neopost Co. Ltd of London, England manufactured and sold the second type meter starting in 1929. The machines were available in fixed and six limited values, 1-5, 10, or 20 cents. These machines had the capability to print or not to print the town hub to allow combination of values to be used or permit use outside of St. John's. The die design was based on the 1921 Pictorial 2 cent stamp that featured Twin Hills, Tors Cove. The majority of meters used poor smudgy red ink but for extra cost superior green ink impressions could be purchased. Like type 1 meter, type 2 also had the ability to print advertising slogans for businesses to promote their goods and services. The meter numbers designated for Neopost meter businesses were 2-4 and 7-32 with number 10 being unknown. Some of these meter numbers were shared with more than one business.







Type 3: Pitney-Bowes H5

In 1947, The Pitney Bowes Meter Company of Stamford, Connecticut, U.S.A. supplied the last two type meter machines to Newfoundland. The first model was the H5, a limited value machine with rotary die of five denominations of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, or 10 cents. The design has the Royal Crown & Cypher over Newfoundland with value table in the center of the box. A scroll design at the bottom contains a stag caribou and the meter number. The town mark is enclosed in a double circle with the M/D/Y inside circle hub. There was only six known meter numbers used with this H5 machine 35500-4 and 355013.








The "R" model by Pitney Bowes was the last new meter machine used in Newfoundland before Confederation in 1949. This multi value device had levers on top of machine to allow for use of any denominations of postage from 1 cent to maximum of \$9.99. This was a major improvement from the fixed values of the previous meter machines. As well as being able to print postage with postmark and advertising slogan, this was the only meter machine used in Newfoundland that could print postage on meter tape. The semi-automated R model could print, seal and stack 220 envelopes a minute, offering an efficient modern mailroom to any business small or large. The indicia shows Newfoundland across the top with Royal Crown and Cypher, value box and town mark all in a single unit.

There were two types of date stamps used, M/D/Y (month in letters) or D/M/Y (month in roman numerals). The meters are numbered 180000 - 180017 plus 180023, with 180012 and 180015 being unknown. Pitney Bowes meters were only leased to companies unlike meter types 1 and 2. The impressions from types 3 and 4 were clean and clear due to the regular service performed by Pitney Bowes.


