FOREWORD

Purpose of this book is to trace the history of the Newfoundland Post Office through the use of illustrating the various markings used. Also included will be a general outline of the particular office in regards to location by bay and map reference, population, opening and closing, postmasters and general information. Various references will appear in the appendices regarding movement of the mail by the coastal boats and distribution by rail.

Please take note that this entire undertaking is devoted to the post offices of towns and outports only. There will be NO St. John's markings. A very brief outline of the Labrador offices is to be expected.

This is an ongoing project and basically is a WORKBOOK. I expect all of those empty spaces to be filled with YOUR copious notes and graphics AND later relayed to Malcolm Back

Also take note that throughout the book there may be strikes shown, mostly split ring, with Canadian stamps showing Post-Confederation dates. These will be used to illustrate unknown (to me) non proof postmarks. Unknown proofs and strikes may exist in other people's collections. When stated, this means unknown to me.

The isolation of the average Newfoundland outport was to the extent that St. John's and the rest of the world hardly existed in the minds of the people. Their only connection to that outside world were the coastal boats and for the fortunate few, the railway.

The relative scarcity of postmarks from these outports is due to many factors. The size of the community and open period determined the amount of mail dispatched. The amount of covers that survived and how many were left after the diligent philatelists of the world were finished with their scissors and saucer of water was, perhaps the greatest tragedy. The remains (with the postmark) were conveniently consigned to the woodstove. Many inhabitants were illiterate and required the aid of the local Minister/Priest or school teacher (when one was available) to answer any correspondence. Most had no cash money whatsoever, even the 3 or 5 cents required for a postage stamp. The lion's share of the outgoing mail was from the merchant to the bigger merchants of St. John's. One advantage of that was the remaining covers are heavily slanted towards Corner Cards.

Confusion reigns supreme over the naming of Newfoundland outports. From 1904 until 1931, no fewer than 121 locations, most with post offices, changed their names. This, coupled with a few names that have two or more locations can lead to much searching through the various reference sources.

Two questions that have had me baffled since my study of Newfoundland town cancels are:

In 1931, at least half or possibly more post offices closed on the same year. The 1931 Year Book and Almanac does not substantiate this. Was this due to the previous research not being carried any further OR was it due to fiscal restraint on behalf of the government, which went bankrupt shortly before?

Exactly how much of the Newfoundland Post Office records were destroyed by the Canada Post Office after being turned over after Confederation?

MAIL DISTRIBUTION

Except for Buchans and Millertown, the interior of Newfoundland was completely uninhabited; few roads. Settlements were on the coast or the railway line. The coastal boats moved the mail efficiently but could not function during the winter months and a courier system was in use for this period. A typical year schedule for these boats was May 01 to December 31. All mail boats had an onboard postal clerk and various T.P.O. handstamps are seen. The following is a description of the coastal boat routes. All schedules are from 1931 Year Book and Almanac.

FOGO DISTRICT

S.S. HOME from St. John's to Fogo Island and Change Islands once a week. Mail clerk was E. J. Dominy.

WHITE BAY

S.S. EARL OF DEVON from Lewisporte to Flowers Cove. Fortnightly trips calling at: Exploits, Little Bay Islands, Nippers Harbor, La Scie, Harbor Round, Pacquet, Woodstock, Mings Bight, Coachmans Cove, Fleur de Lys, Horse Islands, Wild Cove, Seal Cove, Bear Cove, Western Arm, Westport, Browns Arm, Hampden, Sops Arm, Jacksons Arm, Coney Arm, Little Harbor Deep, Great Harbor Deep, Williamsport, Hooping Harbor, Canada Harbor, Englee, Conche, Crouse, St. Juliens, Fischot Islands, Ireland Bight, Goose Cove, St. Anthony, Great Brehat, Griquet, Quirpon, Ship Cove, Raleigh, Cooks Harbor, Green Island Cove, Sandy Cove, Savage Cove and Flowers Cove.

Mails close at Lewisporte on alternate Tuesdays. The mail clerk was H. S. Hillier.

ST. GEORGES DISTRICT

THE RAILWAY

The railway was the fastest and most efficient way of sending the mail. There were two cross country trains per day from St. John's to Port Aux Basques. Both trains carried a mail car. The following were railway mail clerks during the 1920s/1930s: W.P. Squires, Abram Parsons, Alex. Williams, Stan. Adams, John Baird, P.J. Hickey, Gus Norberg, Giles Smith, J.J. Fowler, J. Curtis, W. J. Hogarth, Tobias LeDrew, John Legge, John A. Butt, Chas. Cramm, Jas. J. Davis, Howard Cutler, Eleazar Hicks, Justin McCarthy, James French and Herbert Angel.

The following post offices would have been on the main line at one time or other. Donovans, Paradise, Topsail, Manuels, Foxtrap, Kelligrews, Upper Gullies, Seal Cove (Harbor Main), Woodfords, Holyrood, Harbor Main, Chapels Cove, Avondale, Brigus Junction, Mahers Siding, Whitbourne, Placentia Junction, Rantem Station, Arnolds Cove Station, Goobies Siding, Northern Bight, Clarenville, Port Blandford, Terra Nova, Alexander Bay Station, Gambo, Benton, Glenwood, Notre Dame Junction, Norris Arm, Bishops Falls, Grand Falls, Windsor, Badger, Millertown Junction, Quarry, Gaff Topsail, Howley, Main Dam, Grand Lake, Deer Lake, Little Harbor, Pinns Brook, Pasadena, South Brook, Humbermouth, Corner Brook, Curling, Petries, Spruce Brook, Harrys Brook, Stephenville Crossing, Main River, Nardinnis, St. Georges, Robinsons Station, Cartyville, Crabbes Station/Crabbes East, St. Fintans, Codroy Pond, South Branch, Doyles, Tompkins, St. Andrews, Cape Ray, Port aux Basques.

THE VARIOUS TYPES OF TOWN DATE STAMPS

The evolution of the steel devices closely parallelled that of Canada, with two notable exceptions. This would be understandable as all of Newfoundland's split ring and CDS daters were made by the firm of Pritchard and Andrews who, also manufactured the supply for the Canada Post Office.

The development of the rubber instruments, differed from their mainland counterparts. These came from another company. Whether produced locally or abroad, the manufacturer(s) remain unknown.

THE STEEL DEVICES


The first series were manufactured from brass and made in England. All strikes remain in the GPO proof book. In design, they were identical to those in use in the other North American "colonies." The exception being no colony name on the bottom. They were issued in pairs, with one having "PAID" on the bottom of the double ring. All were 25 mm in diameter with gothic typeface in a double split ring format. The order was placed for the following towns: Bay Bulls, Beloram, Brigus, Burin, Carbonear, Fogo, Ferryland, Garnish, Greenspond, Harbor Britain, Harbor Grace, Hearts Content, Holyrood, Isle Of Valen, Kings Cove, New Perlican, Oderin, Placentia, Salmonier, St. Marys, St. Johns (Newfoundland), Trepassey, Trinity and Twillingate. The following are known only by proof strikes and may have not been placed into service: Beloram, Bonavista, Hearts Content, Holyrood, Isle Of Valen, New Perlican, Oderin, St. Marys, Salmonier and Trepassey. Both Bonavista and New Perlican have recently been "rediscovered."



• THE "FANCY" DEVICES

Very little is known concerning these marks other than they do exist. The period of use was from the late 1860s to the early 1870s. Most of these had an ornament in the lower part. The majority of known strikes are usually on stamps only. Six locations are known to have used the "Fancies": Betts Cove, Channell, Ferryland, Fortune, La Poile and Placentia. One other device, that of Rose Blanche, consisted of a double circle and very much resembled the concurrent postmark of St. Pierre and Miquelon.





• THE DUPLEXES

Only one Pritchard and Andrews Type "A" duplex was used in St. John's during the early 1900s and thus has no bearing on this study unless used as a backstamp. During the same period, 1900-1910, other duplexes were issued to some of the outports. This instrument resembled the Canadian Type "B" with an oval obliterator. But, it was definitely not of P&A manufacture. Newfoundland is spelled out in full and there is a three line date indicia as well as a comma after the placename. The manufacturer is unknown, however, I have seen similar style date stamps used from the Boston Mass. area in the same general time frame. This would indicate that they were from American suppliers. Eleven locations plus one more suspect used this style of duplex: Avondale, Campbellton, Corner Brook, Hodges Cove, Lance Cove, Loon Bay, Norris Arm, Norris Point, St. Shotts, Tizzards Harbor and Traytown. Recently, a suspicious looking partial strike from Lushes Bight also indicates that another has been "discovered". With the possible exception of Corner Brook, most strikes of the others are poor or light.




THE SPLIT RINGS

All Newfoundland's split ring devices made by Pritchard andAndrews and many are in the P&A proof books. A separate proof list also exists in the Colin Bayley collection. The manufacture of this type for Canada was discontinued circa 1933/1934 but continued for Newfoundland up to 1947. Many locations used more than one split ring over the period of time that the office was open. This is borne out by the proof books as well as over 70 others that I have seen. Note that many used the "Bay" designation in one or another.





Often there would be a significant difference in short forms, e.g. HR. for Harbour or apostrophe placement etc., as is shown in two different from Richards Harbour. Also, as is shown in nearly all split rings from the same place, the lengths of arc of the split ring.



Newfoundland never had counties, only broad based districts for political purposes. The following two examples are: Belburns St. B Dis for St. Barbe District and Cappahayden Fy Dis for Ferryland District.





Another problem was the number of post offices bearing the same name. Seal Cove was a favourite, with four offices having that name. The routing dilemma was solved once more with the bay designations. Seal Cove HR. MAIN was in Conception Bay while Seal Cove HER. Bay was in Hermitage Bay and Seal Cove WB was in White Bay. Simple isn't it?








There were also the inevitable spelling errors, such as RameO for RameA.





THE CIRCULAR DATE STAMPS

It would appear that all of Newfoundland's CDS hammers were also made by Pritchard and Andrews, including the Corner Brook double circles. There are 50 NEWF'D CDS in the proof books. All CDS were identical in style to their Canadian counterparts. The bottom of the circle read NEWF'D as in the split rings. Post-Confederation CDS read NFLD on the bottom.



Corner Brook double circle (actually a split ring within a double circle) remains unique. There may have been three separate hammers. It is not known if the letters A, B and C were fixed or interchangeable. The "A" hammer is definitely different from the other two, with narrower spacing between the two circles and longer lengths of arc. The C hammer is a proof strike. All three have been found used on cover, including one with no letter at all.



THE ROLLERS

All rollers were of the horizontal eight bar P&A style but with NEWF'D after the place name. There are nine locations listed in NSSC. I have seen five more not on that list. It is possible that many if not all locations receiving a NEWF'D CDS hammer also got a roller. Quirpon is in that category.



THE RUBBER DEVICES

Rubber devices that were used in Newfoundland were similar in style to some lesser known date stampers of Canada. The three main types were: a double lined Oval, a rectangular Box and a double lined circle. During the 1920s and 1930s they were sometimes in use more frequently than their split ring counterparts and are frequently seen in coloured ink.

• THE DOUBLE LINE OVALS

This style comes in three main types. The earliest had the place name on top and Newfoundland on the bottom. These were in use circa 1900 to 1905.

A second type appeared later and was in use from about 1905 until 1920. This marking had POST OFFICE on the top and location followed by a comma on the bottom.



The third and commonly seen type was the Postal Telegraphs Oval. These show up from many locations that also had a telegraph connection. In the majority of cases, the telegraph operator was also the Postmaster and the rubber instrument was used concurrently with the steel date stamp. These markings are frequently in colour. On top was POSTAL TELEGRAPHS and on the bottom, location, a comma and NFLD. The location name is found in either Gothic or Serif typeface. A few differed, in that the top read H.M. CUSTOMS.



A few locations used this type with a serrated outer rim as shown.



THE BOX CANCELS

All box cancels had similar wording with POST OFFICE NEWFOUNDLAND on the top and location on the bottom. This type of marking was in use basically throughout the 1930s. There were two distinct forms used by a number of the larger offices and a very few locations had both types in use. The first was the Dotted Line rim.



The second was the Wavy Line rim.



• THE LARGE DOUBLE CIRCLES

This rubber device was used in a very large number of locations from 1940 up to and after Confederation in 1949. There are minor differences in overall diameter, probably due to rubber stretch. The major differences are in the typefaces used. There is Gothic upper case and Italics in both upper and lower case. The bottom now reads NFLD in lieu of NEWF'D. Shown below are a few examples of the various typefaces in use.

THE STRAIGHT LINES


Some covers and pieces will be seen with only a straight line handstamp with or without a date. The time period can only be guessed at by noting the stamp. It is possible that these devices were used for facing slips or correspondence with the GPO in St. John's.





THE REGISTRATION BOXES

During the earlier years the ubiquitous Canadian style Oval R was in use at the smaller offices. A named, wavy line box was used at St. John's, Harbour Grace and Holyrood and possibly the larger towns.



Most locations used a nude R box with the registration ledger number. This example from Heart's Delight.



The more diligent Postmasters would always ensure (in particular if this was official correspondence) that their office name was included in manuscript or with the straight line device.





THE REGISTERED GUMMED LABELS

System of Registered gummed labels was introduced July 1938 and were sent out to 48 of the larger offices. These labels appeared in two different series; the second series went through at least two different printings for some offices. The first series was a plain white label with location name in serif upper case, an R and ledger number. This issue came in sheet form and were perforated on four sides.



The second series had a blue border with location name in gothic, an R and ledger number. There were more than one printing as the same town is seen with NFLD and without. These issues came in coil form, being perforated at top and bottom.



In Newfoundland Specialized Stamp Catalogue is a page labelled as 1938 REGISTRATION GUMMED LABELS (JULY 14 *) * DATE OF ISSUE TO THESE OFFICES, issued to others when needed. Information* from 1938 postal guide. NSSC provides a list of these post offices. The 48 larger offices receiving the first series are marked with an asterisk on this list.

Registered format envelopes were issued in 1938 to coincide with the gummed labels. These were available in four different sizes. Example shown of the gummed label affixed to a Registered format envelope.



THE RAILWAY TICKET DEVICE STAMPS

At many smaller locations on the railway lines, the ticket agent was also the Postmaster (and could be the telegraph operator as well.) Having access to so many stamping devices an occasional mistake was inevitable. The community of Princeton on the Bonavista line was notorious for use of the "square one".

Illustrated are two of the several types:

N. RAILWAY and NF. RY.

First postmaster was Charles Duffy. PM in 1931 was Mrs. J.J. Bruce. Official records state that the office at Abrahams Cove was transferred to Campbells Creek (next office over) where, Mrs. Joseph McDonald was PM, on November 04 1941. Early distribution would have been by train at Stephenville Crossing via Port Au Port. Given the length of time the office was open, there may have been two split rings and possibly a double circle device. No strikes have been seen and no proofs are recorded. Nearest post office after closing was Campbell's Creek. In 1949, this location remained in the system as a telephone office only with connection to Port Au Port. After Confederation, this office reopened from 1964 to August 17 1970. A CDS strike is known from this period.



Mon. Wed. Fri. 4:00 PM. Given the length of open time, there may have been two split rings and possibly a double circle. Illustrated are proof strike and same device in use. Nearest post office would have been Western Bay. After Confederation this office reopened from July 20 1962 until August 6 1970.

Admirals Beach reopened during the Post-Confederation period from May 02 1960 to September 30 1969. A CDS strike and a MOON Y 002 seen.

There is some confusion between this office and another with an identical name located a mere 10 miles away. The other office is listed as Fermeuse, Admirals Cove so they will be listed that way in this book. The first Postmaster is unknown. The PM in 1931 was John Carew. The distribution was by courier from St. Johns via Cape Broyle. In 1949 this location was in the system as a telephone office only with connection to Cape Broyle as the nearest post office. No known proofs or strikes have been seen. Admirals Cove reopened Post-Confederation from April 13 1951 to August 04 1970. A CDS and a Registration box seen.


Previously named LIMEVILLE due to large Limestone quarries in the vicinity. A strange situation exists here. Limeville was never recorded as a post office name, however there is a split ring proof of that name dated Feb. 1914. There is a further split ring proof named Aguathuna St. G. dated Nov. 1914. This would lead me to believe that the Limeville St. G. device was in use for nine months. The postmaster in 1931 was Jean K. Walsh who, was also telegraph operator. Distribution was daily via trains 1 and 2 from Stephenville Crossing via Port Au Port. Aguathuna was also a money order office.





Two split rings are known. These would be very difficult to separate except for the typeface.





A dotted line Box cancel is known.



In all of my sources of reference material there is absolutely nothing regarding this office save John Butt's original heading. In reading the entry Garden Cove in the (Encyclopedia of Newfoundland and Labrador) the light came on! Not knowing where the "Arch" fits in, Garden Cove is located at the very head of Placentia Bay. In 1931, Garden Cove was still in the system with phone connection only to Sound Island. Distribution was by S.S. Argyle from Placentia on Fridays via Sound Island. Also, on Tuesdays by motorboat from Arnold's Cove via Sound Island. Garden Cove reopened on October 23 1953 and remains open. Many Post Confederation devices known: CDS, MOON 5 digit, MOON Y-3 digit, Registration Box and others. No proofs or strikes seen.

ARGENTIA

Distributing Office Same

In earlier years this was the homeport of the coastal boats S.S. Portia and S.S. Glencoe. All mail bound for the entire South Coast to Port Aux Basques left from here after arriving from St. John's on the Placentia railway. In later years it became the civilian post office of the American naval base.

First Postmaster was Mrs. J. McGratt. The PM in 1931 was J.J. McGratt, possibly the same or a child of Mrs. J. The PM and TO on December 01 1937 was D. Ryan. At this time, the office was removed from the railway station to a separate building. Mail was daily by the Placentia railway. Argentia was also a telegraph station.

One thing that you will notice as we progress through this book is the frequency of Postmasters being a family affair. Distribution was by railway daily Trs. 1 and 2 via Arnold's Cove Station. From the illustrations of the split rings, two of them being proofs, it looks like this place had three different ones.

The first split ring is not known and I believe it never existed. Avondale was one of the very few locations to have received the Duplex hammers and they were sent out in 1899. A split ring proof (misspelled) and a mail bag seal were proofed in 1910. Remarkably, this misspelled device continued in use to at least 1943. Once more, confusion reigns supreme. My reference material tells me that Avondale was called Cats Cove



The original Badger was the railway station which closed July 1921 and Badger Brook, the settlement, became Badger. First Postmaster was T. O'Neal (Badger the station.) PM in 1931 (Badger the town) was Bertram Payne who was also telegraph operator. PM and TO in 1937 was Peter Alexander. Distribution was daily by Trs. 1 and 2. During the earlier years, Badger was an important place for the forest industry. After closing in 1992, the community was further served by two Retail Offices, the latter remains open today.

Baie Verte was a sleepy little outport until Asbestos was discovered near there. It is now probably the largest town in Northern Newfoundland after St. Anthony. First Postmaster was H.M. Herbert. PM in 1931 was not listed. This office had a closed period, likely 1931 as it is listed as opening on January 01 1938. PM on January 01 1938 was Miss Marie Batstone. Earlier distribution was bi-weekly Wednesdays (except Winter months) by S.S. Prospero from St. John's via Coachman's Cove. Winter service was by courier from Burlington emanating from Springdale. The Winter mail routes for the White Bay area and indeed all of Northern Newfoundland were very arduous and time consuming. Sometimes it would take upward of two months or more to reach St. John's. ST. BARBE was included in split ring no.1 because ALL of Northern Newfoundland was at one time included in the St. Barbe District.

The only thing that is known is it opened as a way office in 1872 with William Petipas as waykeeper. It was upgraded to post office status in 1879 with William Bagg as Postmaster in 1882 and E. A. Bagg in 1900. Bay Islands is listed as being St. Georges District. In 1872 that would have been correct as the Humber District did not come into being until later. The problem here is with this location and the one to follow called Bay OF Islands. I have a post card marked Bay Islands dated Dec. 24 1899 with a return address of Rev. Arthur Waghorne Bay OF Islands. Rev. Waghorne is known to have lived in Curling aka Birchy Cove. In 1872 there was very little settlement around the shores of Bay Of Islands with Curling being the largest. During the later years of this office,1898, the mail would have moved by rail. There somehow has to be a connection between these two offices. Bay OF Islands is listed as a way office only from July 1883 to 1885 only with Thomas Carter as waykeeper. The location could have been from one of the other smaller settlements around the bay. A strike from this location is not known.


