It is hard to read the proof year but it looks like 1922 or 1923. The interesting part is; Indian Bay opened as a post office BUT not until 1930. Could this be the forerunner of the Indian Bay office and why does it not appear in any of the records? Parsons Point/Indian Bay Map 10 X 22. If indeed it was genuine, the mails would have been weekly from Gambo by motor ferry via Wareham.

- (c) Strikes of Stanhope are known in Palmer Moffat list 1917 to 1920 and beyond.
