

OTTAWA DEAD LETTER OFFICE HANDSTAMPS 1872 to 1898 Decentralization



Purpose:

The exhibit shows the evolution of **Ottawa Dead Letter Office (DLO) handstamps** from 1872 up to the 1st July 1898, Decentralization into additional branches thru Canada.

Treatment & Structure

The use of Dead Letter Office handstamps was only by the Ottawa Office / Branch prior to decentralization in 1898.

Items are usually listed by type per catalogue order of listings, dimensions, lettering including periods, commas, and dashes. This will result in a general chronological order, but not for every item as the ranges overlap. The listing for each item includes the lettering of the handstamp and indicia, major and subtype of handstamp, dimensions, important variations as compared to similar handstamps, if a proof strike was taken and importance such as Previously Unknown, Only Reported Copy (**ORC**) or Earliest (**ERD**) and Latest (**LRD**) reported dates of use. Throughout the exhibit are numerous previously unknown, unreported, earliest, and latest reported dates discovered by the exhibitor.

Background:

The Dead Letter Office received and treated mail matter that could not be forwarded to its destination. This included mail addressed for delivery in Canada, mail posted outside of Canada and addressed for delivery in Canada, and Canadian mail originally addressed to foreign countries then returned because it bore insufficient forwarding information.

Without the Dead Letter Office, the postal system would slow to a crawl. The Ottawa office was the beginning till decentralization, and the division is still in operation today as the UMO in Scarborough, Ont.

The postage on all drop letters must be prepaid otherwise they are opened and returned to the inter (if possible) Significant items:

1868 Precursor >>

With Confederation in 1867, a new Post Office Department was created but Dead Letter Office handstamps were not produced until the early 1870's.

At right is an only known 1868 precursor of later printed Dead Letter Return envelopes with manuscript instructions for un-paid letters.

April 29, 1868, un-paid letter **RETURNED-FOR / POSTAGE** examined for name and address to return to sender. **Split Circle handstamps** are the earliest Dead Letter Office handstamps produced in the early 1870's up to decentralization of the DLO in 1898. They range in size from 21mm to 26mm, with single line, dashed and dotted side arcs in varying dimensions. Seven proofs are known with many no proof known.

Double Split Circle Handstamp



Closed Circle handstamps were not produced till 1880, as per earliest known report on the next page. they continued in use up to decentralization of the DLO in 1898. They range in size from 24mm to 30mm.

A distinct difference, the words **OFFICE** & **BRANCH** were used interchangeably between handstamps. Other features such as dots, hyphens '-' & '+' are between words. Nine proofs are recorded, although several reports are with no proof strike known.

Opened and examined for senders address to receive 5 cents in postage. 5 cents received and paid / cancelled at Ottawa DLO JY 28 1891 forwarded to addressee. Transiting via Manchester and arriving at Bakewell 10 AU 91.

Mailed Halifax, N.S. NO 13 97 to Glasgow Scotland marked INSUFFICIENT ADDRESS, sent to Return Letter Office Glasgow, opened and officially sealed in Glasgow, Post Office. Returned to Canada Ottawa Dead Letter Office DE 27 97, examined, and returned to sender in DLO Return envelope DE 30.

RECD AT DEAD LETTER BRANCH handstamps used numbers '4' through '6', proofed in 1892 & 1893.

Double Oval Handstamp

Only three Double Oval **Dead Letter Office** or **Branch / Canada** proofs are known prior to July 1, 1898. Less than a handful are reported of known handstamp types. They were mainly used by inspectors to seal envelopes with official seals or for parcels that found their way to the DLO.

The year date is not shown on this handstamp type, however, from a similar but different proof strike ⁽¹⁾ 1894 is an approximate time period.

This type is similar to parcel handstamps used in several larger cities during the Small Queen period. Although wear appears to show in the ovals, the proof strike is very similar with a thin border imprint.

Superintendent Double Oval Handstamp

The **Superintendent Double Oval** is a unique style type for this period. There are no proofs known of any Superintendent DLO handstamps prior to 1900. They were used by the Superintendent for only items of importance, complex difficult to handle items, and or fraudulent items such as franking's with used stamps. Period of use 1892 to June 30, 1898.

The Superintendent handstamp continued only till decentralization.


A similar handstamp with the words 'CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT' replaced this handstamp after June 30th 1898. "Stamp previously used" sent to Superintendent's office "S" zero marked

Circle and Diamond Shift Handstamp

The **Circle** and **Diamond** Shift Marking handstamps used numbers **1**, **2** and **3** to designate the 8-hour work shift that processed an item. No proof dates are available, as the handstamps did not have an enclosed date. The **Circle Shift** markings were used during the middle 1870's of the Ottawa DLO into the 1880's, with a 2nd version (**no dots & D pointing right**) used in 1888. The **Diamond Shift** markings appeared later in the late 1880's until decentralization of the DLO.



Dark clear strikes of the shift markings are not easy to find, many being under other handstamps.



No postal communication with this destination at present.

NEW FIND, ONLY REPORTED COPY

D. L. BRANCH, CANADA.

70mm x 26mm, double box handstamp Sans-serif, first three lines mixed, 4th line caps, all lettering in italics Mailed during the time of the **Cuban War of Independence**, possibly could not be delivered due to Cuban mail restrictions, resulting in the special double boxed handstamp '**No postal communication...**' being produced.



The use of this handstamp and most others ceased just two days later when the Dead Letter Office in Ottawa was decentralized into various DLO branches across Canada.
