

The cover above was sent Nov. 23, 1877, from Montreal to Valanee, Doorne, France. As of January 1, 1876, the rate to France was reduced from 10¢ 1<sup>st</sup> ½ oz, 6¢ 2<sup>nd</sup> ½ oz., 10¢ 3<sup>rd</sup> ½ oz, etc. (basically translating ounces to the GB-France 10 gram conventions from late summer 1870 through 1875) to 10¢ per ¼ oz, the rate above. There are about 20 covers recorded for this rate, and only two with the franking above. The rest are franked with the 10¢ Small Queen almost certainly issued for that purpose in late 1874. The 3 ½ is the British credit, equal to 7¢. The other 3¢ is the Canadian inland fee.


#### Map of College Station north side of TAMU



### The Millennium Book and Stamps Victor Willson

On September 15, 1999, Canada issued a book for the upcoming Millennium that included 68 stamps, each with a theme celebrating some aspect of Canadian life. The stamps were bound into the book in sheets that had two stamps horizontally parallel on a side, folded in the middle, with the edges bound into the book through a bolt much like stamp albums, with pages of text interleaving the stamps. Thus, 68 stamps appear on 17 folded sheets with gum on the inner side of the fold (that may prove a problem for some books stored improperly). A total of 94 pages of photos and text and an endleaf with the serial number of the book, one of 200,000 printed, comprise the book with a heavy cardboard trifold cover. The stamps were valid for 1 oz. domestic postage, each rated at  $46\phi$ , but apparently almost no one thought to separate the stamps and actually use them. It has been reported to me that a few dealers did in fact create sets of covers, and recently I purchased a complete set, all sent from BC addresses in December, 1999. I have no knowledge of any first day of book issued stamps on or off cover to date. With a threat not to list the stamps by Scott because of the limited number and additional cost (the book cost \$60, the stamps a total value of  $68 \times 46\phi = \$31.28$ , Canada proposed and quickly printed 17 blocks of 4 of the stamps, issued in February, 2000. The new stamps, however, differed from the originals in the book by having a smaller size of the 1999 date in the upper left corner outside the design. Thus, there are two ways to identify the book stamps from the revised versions- date of use on cover and size of date on the stamp.

The cover below is one of the set sent by John Burnett's mother to him from Vancouver over a period of a month or so. It represents the only example I have seen to the US. I plan to add this material to a proposed exhibit of the issue, which I have not seen anyone put together before. Given the likely extremely limited use of the book stamps, and not much use of the revised versions either, this documents a fairly rare late  $20^{th}$  century postal emission by Canada. The rate to the US was  $55 \, \phi \, 1^{st}$  oz., so an additional  $9 \, \phi$  definitive was added.



#### Early Yukon Postcards Vic Willson

I have long been interested in the Yukon Gold Rush from the time of the Sgt. Preston radio show of the 1950s, listening as a kid and imagining the scenery and conditions. So, I have picked up items here and there, including post cards. Many people after the 1898 initial rush went as tourists in the summer of 1899 and every summer thereafter for many years. They often sent back cards. Previously I showed a registered post card sent in 1898, acquired in a trade from George Dresser, and a great rarity. Recently I picked up the cards below. The first, a US government 1¢ card overfranked with a 2¢ Numeral sent August 20, 1900, is actually a business correspondence indicating that some legal papers had arrived. It is docketed Sept. 7, not a bad time required to go down the Yukon River and pick up a steamer to Seattle and then San Francisco. The overpayment is due to the common problem of running out of 1¢ stamps. Covers and cards are often seen overpaid at different times because of the lack of appropriate stamps. The second card, sent August 23, 1903, to Paris. It appears to be from a French tourist who comments on the Rockies, Alaska, and the Klondike. Since the Edward UPU card was only issued in December, 1903, this card is in the correct time frame for use.
