

As part of the first set in a three-year stamp series showcasing Canada's famous roadside attractions. Issued in July 2009 as one of a set of 4, Vegreville, AB, where a massive Easter egg—the largest in the world is on at the entrance to Elk Island National Park. Its name, Pysanka, is Ukrainian for “Easter egg,” and it symbolizes Vegreville's vibrant folk culture.



In keeping with Canada Posts revenue maximization model, this set was issued as a booklet of 8, souvenir sheet of 4, and the official first day cover.





VANCOUVER DEAD LETTER OFFICE—Mark Oakley

This post card was purchased off eBay in furtherance of my interest in Northern BC and specifically Prince Rupert and surrounds. I purchased it because of the wonderful picture of the GTP SS Prince Rupert entering Vancouver Harbour. No Lions Gate Bridge and just a few cottages on the North Shore—a moment of a bygone era. The real story however was on the flip side and my first foray into dead letter office mail.



Two one cent Admirals, one private perfin "GTP" - Grand Truck Pacific.

Reverse enlarged image with contrasting of the image to show the various markings. Note the oval stamp which is the raised image from the front.

I showed this piece at a VIPS Zoom meeting as I was confused not only by the various overlaid cancels markings but the workings of the DLO. Gray Scrimgeour suggested a potential series of events but directed me to BNAPS Member Dr. Brian Plain who has some expertise in the area. Brain is the BNAPS Chair for the Dead Letter Office Study Group and author of *"The Dead Letter Office in Canada 1830-2002: An Illustrated Postal History, Second Edition"* which is available at the BNAPS Publications operated by Longley Auction <https://longleyauctions.com/product>



VANCOUVER DEAD LETTER OFFICE—Continued



"Vancouver BC

January 8 1917

My Dear Mother

Arrived in Vancouver safely. Have had a nice trip so far.

Trust you are all well and happy

David"



An International DLO originating in Vancouver for delivery in the USA. The "Returned for Postage" for the correct international rate. Appears to have been sent to its destination and the additional 1 cent US postage collected.

Brian explained as follows:

- a) Mailed at Vancouver January 8, 1917. Addressed to Victoria
- b) Vancouver postal clerk notices failure to pay WAR TAX and appends the appropriate handstamp which is a 'gateway' marking to tell the Dead Letter Office in Vancouver
- c) The single rim Vancouver DLO oval*, dated January 9, 1917 which underlies the second stamp, signifies that the DLO had completed its review and was sending the item onward to the DLO in Victoria.
- d) The large double rim Vancouver oval, also dated January 9 is the date on which the item was forwarded in a DLO pouch for mail to be processed at the Dead Letter Office in Victoria
- e) The DLO in Victoria received the item, likely later that same day via the evening ferry
- f) Here, the story becomes a bit uncertain. On the January 10, a 1 cent Admiral stamp was added to pay the required postage to allow the card to be delivered and it was canceled with the rectangular Victoria DLO handstamp**
- g) The card was then sent out into the regular mail stream for delivery after being canceled with the Victoria International machine January 11.

Usually, a printed notice would have been sent to the addressee indicating that in order to get his mail, we would have to attach the additional postage and return it with the form. That clearly didn't happen in this case as the turn-around time is too short. I believe the postal clerk may have added the stamp as a courtesy and the postman would pick-up the penny on delivery.

My Favourite Postcard – Hope Station, BC



My paternal great-grandfather Peter Johnson homesteaded at Hope Station, BC, (on the Canadian Pacific Railway mainline, across the Fraser River from Hope, BC) in 1891. He wrote this postcard 25 Jan 1911 to Clarke & Stuart Co, stationers and printers, Vancouver, BC.

Gentlemen, will you kindly let me know by return of mail, if you sell School Black-boards, and their prices! If you should not have them would you please let me know where they can be secured. And oblige. Yours truly. P. Johnson.


(At this time my maternal grandmother, Lily Carnegie, was a sales clerk at Clarke & Stuart Co.)

The Hope Station single room log cabin school opened in 1898 with five homemade desks, two students seated at each desk. The single teacher covered Grade 1 to Grade 8 at which point the students' education was complete. Interestingly, in 1909 the school trustees hired a teacher who upon arriving at Hope Station viewed the small community and caught the next train going west. The Dept. Of Education was unable to find a replacement teacher so great-aunt Christine Johnson, age 18 and Grade 8 education, was appointed teacher by the school trustees. With the assistance of a former Hope Station teacher and the teacher at Hope at the end of the year Christine received a very good report from the Inspector of Schools. She credited the good discipline to all students being her siblings, nieces and nephews or neighbour's children.




OAKLEY, ASSA - Mark Oakley



Our young family moved to the Okanagan in April 2000 settling in Winfield, a small town just North of Kelowna. One of the great aspects of our move from the Lower Mainland was our proximity to Kelowna and Robert Lee's Auctions. That Summer I attended my first live Lee Auction, having previously been a mail bidder. As Bob moved through the catalogue to the postal history section I lost interest. Until that time I had been a stamp collector with no interest in old envelopes. As I daydreamed, Bob called my name. As I listened he was auctioning a registered cover with an Oakley ASSA cancel. At that time I didn't know of Assiniboia nor a town in Canada named Oakley.

I was intrigued and started to bid. The bids increased as there was another in the crowd that was also keen on this lot. Somewhere around \$120.00, I dropped out as I had no idea of the value of this postmark or postal history generally. After the auction concluded Bob took me aside and said "I knew you weren't going to win that lot the first time you raised your hand" He asked me "do you know who you were



bidding against—Dr Thompson—he wrote the book on Assiniboia Postal History". So I ambled over to Dr. Thompson and introduced myself and explained my interest in the Oakley envelope. We chatted and he offered to sell me another Oakley cancel if I would write him later in the Summer.

Dr. Thompson's reply is shown overleaf and the postcard he sent me is still in my collection. And as they say "the rest is history" and my interest in postal history began.

Thank you for your letter. Enclosed is my duplicate cover showing the OAKLEY, ASSA. post. dated **JUL 1/07** - also with the neighboring Canaduff ASSA post. Though the sender of the card was using OAKLEY, SASK as the address, the post office was still using the ASSA cancel, as many towns did after the ^{5th} 1905 transfer of ASSA into the new province of Saskatchewan. The Brandon street scene of that period is very fine also.

I am enclosing a photo copy of the first page of a recent exhibit from my Assiniboia collection that I started in 1960.


It was a pleasure to meet you and I wish you all the best in your collecting endeavors.





Its Official - CAPEX 22 International One Frame Stamp Championship Exhibition will be held in Toronto, June 9-12, 2022.

CAPEX 22 will be the **world's first** fully international One Frame exhibition. It is anticipated to be the largest showing of one frame exhibits at one exhibition with 400 frames, providing an opportunity for up to 400 exhibitors to participate. In addition, CAPEX 22 will host exhibits in the literature class competition in both print and electronic media.

A full bourse of Canadian and international dealers is expected, as are seminars, society presentations, receptions, club tables, as well as an evening auction by a major auction house.

CAPEX 22 will be held at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre (MTCC) in the heart of Toronto's downtown entertainment district. The Constitution Hall in the 100 level of the MTCC's North Building (255 Front Street West) will be the site of the exhibition and bourse.

Interested in Attending?

Plan to spend a full day or more at the exhibition.

Staying overnight? - Special rates at nearby hotels are being negotiated.

Registration? – Information about a full exhibition registration package will be released closer to the exhibition date. Save time and money by pre-registering for the exhibition.

Frame fees will be announced shortly. The literature competition has no pre-qualification requirements, and further details on literature categories are to be announced shortly.
