



" Gerald E. Wellburn - A New Book about the Man and His Hobby".

This year marks several anniversaries for me: I joined Vancouver Island Philatelic Society (VIPS) here in Victoria, just 50 years ago. I credit this group with enlarging both my collecting scope and my enjoyment of the stamp hobby.

Also, I made many friends as a VIPS member. A key person I met at VIPS was Gerry Wellburn. Thirty years ago he passed away (May 25, 1992) - and later that year the Philatelic Foundation bearing his name was established.

Gerry encouraged my interest in our hobby and perhaps helped convert me into a "philatelist"!

He often liked to recall anniversaries of past events in his presentations. That led me to consider

timely ways to remember Gerry and to recognize contributions he made to philately within British Columbia and beyond. He belonged to VIPS for 60 years and was a strong supporter of BNAPS (OTB) - and many other groups.

With the "One Frame Exhibition" at CAPEX 22, I thought it appropriate to develop a sixteen page Display about Gerry Wellburn. But as my research continued about Gerry's life with stamps, the project grewinto a book now published by Gerald E. Wellburn Philatelic Foundation.

Here is the Cover of the book (Figure 1).

Inside is a story of Gerry's early days, collections and exhibits; the end illustrated with the Display.

NEW VARIETY ON 'G' OVERPRINT 20 CENT

STAMP OF 1952

David Biltek

Sometime in the spring of 1952 one of the printing machines in the Canadian Bank Note Company shops "hiccupped", "stuttered" or in some manner caused a printing error that resulted in a rare variety in the 20-cent gray Pulp and Paper stamp of 1952. The stamp with this error is displayed below:



20 cent gray Pulp and paper, with Overprinted G Doubled

This Variation or error is not listed in any current catalogue or in any old issues of Wrigley's, or Bileski's Basi

Catalogue. An extensive literature search reveals nothing about the possibility of this variety.

Although issued on April 1st, 1952 and overprinted shortly thereafter the above stamp did not make another "public" showing until April 2020 at the Daniel Kelleher Stamp Auction where it was purchased by a Canadian Stamp dealer who subsequently sold it to the current owner

Is this authentic?

When the two leading expertization services in Canada agree that it is, the likelihood is that yes, this stamp is authentic.

On March 14, 2018, the Vincent Graves Greene Foundation issued a certificate which stated:

"Canada Scott number O30 used with Double printing of the "G" overprint,

is genuine in all respects"


And in March 2021, **Ken Pugh** issued a certificate wherein he commented:

"It is my opinion the O30v...is genuine. It is a double print, and not a "kiss" print as indicated by the equal intensity of the black ink on the front, and equal relief impressions on the reverse. There is an inking anomaly observed with the serifs. The first impression (top)has slightly more ink making it appear thicker. This is not consistent throughout all areas of the "G", but could be explained by the more intricate structure of the serif area more likely to trap surplus ink than other areas of the overprint This has often been observed in single impressions and is normal." 
O30v 1951 Pulp and paper issue, double G overprint.





It is my opinion the O30v illustrated above is gettaine. It is a double print, and not a "kies" print indicated by the equal intensity of the black ink on the front, and equal relief impressions on the reverse. There is a noted inking anomaly observed with the surifs. The first impression (top) has alightly more ink making it appear thicker. This is not consistent throughout all acts of the "O", has could be explained by the more intricate structure of the serif area more likely to trap surplus ink than other areas of the overprint. This has often been observed in single impressions, and is normal.

How did this happen?

The following is speculative but is based on what is known with similar varieties: the 1 cent Cameo Double G overprint and the Missing G's in the 2 cent Cameo.

The stamp was printed in sheets of 200 composed of 4 panels of 50. It was then overprinted with a G and finally perforated. There were 3,300,000 overprints issued.

Here are two scenarios:

Likely, as the sheet was printed it was not discharged all the way through the press, leaving perhaps the last row or two rows still in the printing area. The plate printed again, but in slightly different areas on these last one or two rows.

It is suggested that this only happened to one or two rows which could explain why the error was missed by inspectors.

The sheets so overprinted were perforated, bundled and sent to the Post Office without the error being noticed.

At the Post Office the bundles were unpacked, separated into the 50 stamp panels, and sent to various government departments depending on requisitions, and to the Philatelic Bureau. Clearly the sheets/panels with the error were not sent to the Bureau, where the error would have been more likely to have been noticed

At the department level, the stamps were received, again with no one noticing the error, placed in the stamp drawer or box and subsequently used.

At that time 20 cent stamps were mostly used for:

Given these uses it is quite possible that most of the stamps with the error were sent overseas or to larger departments where the envelopes were trashed, however one such stamp was used for airmail or registration to the USA, where a collector saw the stamp, rescued it and added it to his collection as an "oddity" If the collector was not knowledgeable about Canadian Officials the nature of this error may have been missed until that collection ended up at The Kelleher Auction previously mentioned.

The second scenario sees the sheets being perorated first and then separated into panels of 50 stamps; after which the panels are overprinted with the G. A different press is used, and the ink is also different, but as in the first scenario there is a printing error, which results in a whole panel being double overprinted. Again, the inspectors miss this and send stamps to various departments.

In one of these departments one or more of the stamps are put on an envelope and mailed. Someone at the receiving end recognizes an error, takes the stamp home puts in their collection, but since they do not collect Canadian stamps, do not recognize the error. Meanwhile, back in the department someone recognizes the error and returns the stamps to the post office.

No doubt more speculative stories can be created and it would be instructive to hear these, as well as theories about the stamp, observations, or questions....all of which would be welcome.

To further the speculation, one prominent Canadian dealer reports: "...having seen this stamp floating around for a couple of years. I think it is owned by some British fellow ..." It may be that there are more examples, or that this one somehow made its way to the Kelleher auction

There is also the possibility that the stamp is an amazing forgery, but given the assessments by VGG and Ken Pugh, it would need to be an astonishing one. It is more likely to conclude this is an authentic variety and further that it may be unique or one of very, very few.

EF & O—Errors Freaks and Oddities is always an interesting part of any auction catalogue. The government official overprints have a number of oddities in the various overprinted issues. Although more common with the earlier stamps, in particular small queens issue, EF&Os always male interesting companions to the regular issue in your album



Cover presumably mailed from a HMCS Restigouche crew member while on a United States Cruise, as it's meter pays the 10¢ Canadian naval airmail rate (1968.11.01 to 1977.02.28) for mail up to 1 oz from these cruises. <u>Sales does not list a #828938 meter for FMO Victoria</u>. Cover also has a CF 15 dater that was assigned to the Restigouche, and is dated a year before Sayles first reported use.


Located 2 km north of Masset the community of Old Massett is connected by road and a well-used sidewalk and sits on the site of three traditional Haida villages.

Old Massett is one of 2 villages where the Haida Nation regrouped in the late 1800s, having been forced to leave most of their ancient villages due to their declining numbers, a severe consequence of smallpox introduced by Europeans.



The Hudson's Bay Company operated a trading post at the far end of the Village from 1869 to 1898. Old Massett is named after Maast Island, a small island in Masset Sound, which is believed to have been named after an early European sailor who was buried on the Island. Today, Old Masset is the administrative seat of the Council





of the Haida Nation, and is home to about 800 Haida.

William Henry Collison (1847–1922), also known as W. H. Collison, was an Anglican missionary among First Nations people in coastal British Columbia, Canada. Birth records are unclear as to whether Collison was born in County Armagh, Ireland. His date of birth was 12 November 1847. After first apprenticing as a warehouseman, he attended the

Church of Ireland Normal College, after which he served as the Superintendent of the Buckingham House Free School for Boys in Cork, Ireland. After three years there, in 1872 he applied to the Church Missionary Society to be accepted into their missionary program, and then for a year attended the Church Missionary Society College, Islington.

In August 1873, he married Marion M. Goodwin who had served as a deaconess, nursing the wounded in the Franco-Prussian war. They were wed at St. Paul's, Tottenham, in London, and left for North America soon after their marriage.

After his training Collison was appointed by the Church of England's Church Missionary Society (CMS) to Metlakatla, BC, to assist William Duncan (missionary) in converting the Tsimshian people. Marion Collison became the first white woman to be resident in that community. Their first child, a son (William Edwin), was the first white child born there, as was a second son (Henry Alexander).

After teaching and preaching at Metlakatla, as well as becoming fluent in the Tsimshian language, he accepted an invitation by the Haida chief, Albert Edward Edenshaw, to set up a mission in Haida Gwaii. He later became good friends with Chief Edenshaw. In 1876 he became the first missionary to work among the Haida people on the nearby islands of Haida Gwaii (formerly named the Queen Charlotte Islands. Their first daughter, Emily Charlotte, was born at Massett on Haida Gwaii.

Collison was ordained at Metlakatla in 1879, by Bishop William Bompas who had travelled overland from Red River for this purpose.

Collison returned to Metlakatla in 1879 to take the part of the CMS when it became involved in a controversy with Duncan. After several years of acrimony, in which Duncan sought to establish his mission there as an independent church, out of the control of the CMS, Duncan removed to Annette Island in Alaska with some 850 followers, and set up New Metlakatla. Approximately 400 villagers who had remained faithful to the church, stayed in Metlakatla.


In 1881 Collison began work among the Gitxsan, up the Skeena River from the Tsimshian. He founded the first mission at Hazelton, B.C., in Gitksan territory.

In 1891 he became Archdeacon of Metlakatla, and from 1893 to 1894 he served as Secretary for the CMS's northern B.C. mission.

In the early 1890s he and his family moved to Kincolith, a Nisga'a village on the Nass River in northern B.C., founded as an Anglican mission by the medical missionary Robert Tomlinson. Collison remained there until his death on 23 January 1922.

Collison is best remembered for his vivid 1915 memoir In the Wake of the War Canoe, which contains numerous ethnological insights, including information on the nearly extinct Tsetsaut people, remnants of whom lived at Kincolith.

From the Auction Floor—Notable Sales

For Sound Sweet C'Troop De Squadron Protectora to Regiment B. S. A. Fort Mafering

Auctioneer Brian Grant Duff offered the Scott #180 Baden Powell cover, last given as a 1951 Christmas gift to a King's Scout by Westmoreland Sheriff J.M. Danson, as lot 123 in All Nations' 1355th weekly auction on 2 April. Estimated at \$5000, there were 10 bidders including some from Israel, and Great Britain.

A U.S. based collector phone bidder who needed it for their collection prevailed.

The Quebec, Canada East 29 April 1869 2c Large Queen Soldier's rate Transatlantic cover from J.B. Hale, who was awarded a Canadian General Service Medal for action against Fenian raiders, to Charles Marsh Lee, a Salisbury solicitor and town clerk, is one of five known 2c Soldier's rate Large Queen covers, three of which are also franked with single 2c. A similar cover from the Don Thompson collection exists from Montreal in 1870. Ron Brigham owns two other ex-



amples. Another cover is recorded but is currently whereabouts unknown.

The cover offered as lot 27 in All Nations' 26 March auction appears to have been a Christmas 1950 gift from U.K. collector and Westmoreland Sheriff J.R. Danson and is backstamped E.F.H. Harpenden, by Erik F. Hurt, a U.K. collector member of the A.P.S. Hall of Fame for his postal history and local collections. Seven different bidders: leading dealers, and exhibiting collectors vied for the newly rediscovered cover, which eventually sold to one of four phone bidders, a U.S. based Canadian collector.

SKIDEGATE and IKEDA BAY 1907

- Sometimes a cover, apart from its philatelic appeal, gains additional import when it also contains important historical information, and particularly so when it documents otherwise little-known facts that even a professional historian would wish to be appraised of.
- Such is the case with this cover, mailed from Skidegate, Haida Gwaii (Queen Charlotte Islands), January 7, 1907 to Japan. Its philatelic appeal is immediately obvious – an exceptionally fine strike of the first Skidegate postmark (Skidegate had only \$64.95 in total revenue in that year's reporting period), a five-cents Edward paying the correct UPU rate to Japan, its interesting Japanese (Kanji) handwriting, and a clear Japanese post office receiving strike. Bonus – it even contains its original letter, also written in Kanji.



The mine at Ikeda Bay is a tribute to Japanese Canadian entrepreneurship. In 1903 Arichika Ikeda was processing herring for fertilizer in Nanaimo. Stopped by government regulations, he turned to salting herring to ship to Japan and 1906, while searching for new fishing grounds, discovered copper on Moresby Island. Named Ikeda Bay, it was the richest copper discovery on Haida Gwaii. With Japanese capital, he brought in miners from Japan. At its peak the Ikeda Mine employed 150 men, operating until the 1920s when it closed due to the drop in copper prices.

The letter was written and addressed by a Mr. Ariaki Ikeda to his friend and acquaintance, Mr. Kisaku Ninomiya, in a small village in Japan.

Ikeda has prospected and developed a producing copper mine which at one time employed up to 150 Japanese nationals. His letter to Ninomiya describes in some detail the ore content of his various claims.

> The site had an extensive dock and ore bunkers. By Feb 1909, 1000 tons Of copper, silver and gold had been shipped on the Princess Beatrice

COMINCO bought the mine from Ikeda in December 1909, redeveloped and reopened it in 1914 (with Ikeda as manager), kept it open during the high copper prices of WWI, then finally closed it in 1920. Ikeda died in Vancouver in 1939.




