

# 1975 H.M.C.S. Restigouche/FMO Victoria Meter

Cover presumably mailed from a HMCS Restigouche crew member while on a United States Cruise, as it's meter pays the 10¢ Canadian naval airmail rate (1968.11.01 to 1977.02.28) for mail up to 1 oz from these cruises. Sales does not list a #828938 meter for FMO Victoria. Cover also has a CF 15 dater that was assigned to the Restigouche, and is dated a year before Sayles first reported use.

Since the meter is dated 2 days before the ships date stamp, was the meter applied on the ship? If so, did other Canadian naval ships use meters as well?








# **Help with Postal Meter Slogans**

# **Courtesy Airmail Covers**

These covers were all carried by favour or "courtesy" by the airline from one location to another as de facto airmail even though applicable airmail postage rates were not applied because it was carried at the airline's discretion, rather than as a Canadian post office service.

These letters typically originated from a remote or isolated location and were carried to a major city where they were then placed into the postal system and postmarked (though not always) at that location, rather than at the point of origin.


The covers from Zeballos and Campbell River are two such examples of mail that only entered the postal system after they were flown to Vancouver. To my understanding, these airlines had no official sanction from the post office to carry mail but seem to have done so to endear themselves to those who would benefit of expedient air service with the idea that they would then also use their paid services such as cargo and personal air transport. They also obviously were wanting to promote themselves and the handstamps they applied to the mail that they carried served as advertising.



# Maps on Postcards - On the lighter Side of Philately By Bill Pekonen

Currently, BNAPS members have been interested in postal history. Great interest has been concentrated on events about 100 years or more in the past. Postal history is being made every day. Examples of mail from 75 years ago are slowly disappearing. More current examples may be easier to find at a reasonable cost.


The economy was recovering during the late 1960's and 1970's. Many people had the desire to travel in automobiles. Motels were built along highways to cater to the overnight stays. Cafes and informal restaurants were created. Drive-in hamburger stands became popular.

Postcards from about 50 years ago can still be found with various maps on the front face. This collecting interest was a popular fad during that time period. One of those postcards illustrating a map is the Lake Superior Circle Tour. This card boasts of being the most scenic drive in the United States and Canada. Any place along the tour route could be a starting and ending date.

The description on the card states as follows. "Motorists traveling the circle tour around Lake Superior will visit Canada and three of the United States – Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan. The distance of the complete route is 1,068 miles. The many points of interest are spectacular ---- the scenic beauty superb."

This card was written at the Blue Water Cabins, Ontario on Oct. 7, 1971 and mailed at Saint Ignace Mi. on Oct. 9. The post card with a 6 cent Eisenhower postage stamp was addressed to Bellevue, Wash.


These map postcards can form an interesting collection, if you can find them.



# **Prince Rupert. BC**

Unused post card c. 1925 showing downtown commercial buildings and residences located on the cliff above.



The house identified with the arrow is 220 West 4 th Avenue and is the house I lived in as a child. Both of these homes, 220 and 228 West Fourth still stand and are on the heritage list. They are easily identifiable in almost any image of the city due to the unique shape of the roofline of 228 West Fourth, which was built sideways due to the narrow lot. It was painted a very distinctive green with a red asphalt shingle roof.

#### **OAKLEY, Assiniboia**

Don't let the title fool you—there is no relationship between myself and Oakley, Assiniboia. At least, not yet. I have been researching the history of Oakley Assiniboia for about 30 years. What started off as a genealogical side trip ended up as a philatelic puzzle. During that period have I have acquired 6 Oakley cancelled items. But the greatest puzzle is not the absence of philatelic material but the almost complete absence of any information on the town of Oakley. The Oakley post office was stablished May 1 1893 and closed August 31 1917. The last building was moved to a nearby town in 1965. A roadside cairn indicates the date of formation was June 17 1892 and

closed December 1959. The National Archives has information on the formation of the post office but there is nothing on the formation or dissolution of the town. I assume that the formation of a place name required some governmental approval and that the dissolution of the town required Provincial approval. Where did all the records go? Were they destroyed or are they in a dark government archive? If you have any ideas on re-



search directions - I would most welcome your assistance.

#### Oakley Feb 5 1910

(Acquired at BNAPS 2022)

The usual routing for Oakley mail was the nearby town of Carnduff, (just south of Oakley) posted from Gainsborough, SK (20 km east of Carnduff). Note this card shows Miss Henderson's mail address as Carnduff, but eventually arriving in Oakley on Feb 5.



This later mailing April 23 1910 is now routed to the correct address in Oakley, via Carnduff.

"The original die verse engraved," on specifier on steel, very probably by Mone. J. Ferdinand Joseph Mesers, De Lia Rue's chief engraver: Impressions of the original die were steen in lead blooks and arranged in panels of viety, electric pasts of these impressions were then taken for the plates actually used in printing, and four of the plates, enfaced with solver to make them more duratile, made up a sheet of 240 stemps." Thus, they were electricized from an engraved die. ectrotyped from an engraved die.

#### MASSETT, BC 1910—1948

#### Renamed MASSET 1948

Masset, formerly Massett, is a village in Haida Gwaii .It is located on Masset Sound on the northern coast of Graham Island, the largest island in the archipelago, and is approximately 50 km west of mainland

Located on the North End of 2 km north of Masset ,the community of Old Massett is connected by road and a well-used sidewalk and sits on the site of three traditional Haida villages.

Old Massett is one of 2 villages where the Haida Nation regrouped in the late 1800s, having been forced to leave most of their ancient villages due to their declining numbers, a severe consequence of smallpox introduced by Europeans.

The Hudson's Bay Company operated a trading post at the far end of the Village from 1869 to 1898. Old Massett is named after Maast Island, a small island in Masset Sound, which is believed to have been named after an early European sailor who was buried on the Island. #### **Calling All Tax Lawyers and Accountants**

A very nice South Saltspring BC split ring Aril 1, 1918. Office opened 1900, changed 1924 to Fulford Harbour.

Tax professionals may remember the controversy surrounding this property as a major test of taxation of the family farm on the passing of the homesteaders - The Ruckle Family. Given the size of this farm, when Gordon Ruckle passed away, substantial estate taxes were due on the capital appreciation of the farm. So large in fact that the only way to settle the taxes



was to sell the farm. To keep the farm intact, the Estate entered into a tenancy agreement to allow the farm to operate but eventually devolving to the Province. Seen at the time as expropriation through taxation and was a warning to farmers and large landowners of the risks of intergenerational estate transfers.

The websites history page talks of how the farm was purchased in 1974 but fails to mention that it was in exchange for forgiveness of Estate taxes. It certainly was not a voluntary transfer, rather more akin to a shotgun wedding.

"Ruckle Heritage Farm was established in 1872 by one of Salt Spring Island's earliest settlers, <u>Gordon Ruckle</u>, and is the oldest operating family farm in the Gulf Islands and is a significant property among British Columbia's working farm heritage sites. The Province of BC purchased the land from the Ruckle family in 1973 and it was established as a Class A park in 1974. It bears the name of the family as a tribute. A life tenancy agreement was established between the Province and the Ruckle Family that granted six family members the right to continue to occupy and farm the historic farm area.

With the expiry of the life tenancy agreement in 2019, BC Parks is responsible for the management of the 82 hectares of the Active Farm and heritage structures...

In 1974, the Ruckle family bequeathed their farm and the surrounding 1307 acre property to British Columbia's <u>provincial park service</u> with the stipulation that the 202 acre farmstead remain a working farm. In addition to a large market garden, the farm includes sheep and lambs, cows, chickens, turkeys, highland cattle and goats."
