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CPO Equipment and Supply Branch Listings of DLO Items to Order I cannot emphasize enough the importance for all Postal History collectors, historians, and researchers to ferret out material that may be important to other specialists. While visiting a philatelic friend for the first time at his residence I was able to dig through a few boxes of material. In one box was an understated Dead Letter Return Envelope with a previously unreported handstamp from Ottawa. Inside was the actual returned envelope with another handstamp of a different # as the Earliest Reported Date (ERD).

It is possible that no one may have ever found these items or at least for a few more decades. Who will be around to look in 20 to 30 years I do not know. Thus, it is imperative that over the next decade or two, collectors try to get the items or copies for research purposes in the right hands.

I do not plan on having a DLO Study Group meeting at the show unless I get some responses by any BNAPS members that are willing to attend.



Note on page 7 the manuscript (*1 D. L. G.*) *Undeliverable Mail Label*. This term could have ensued after several years during the changeover of the Dead Letter Office (DLO) name to Undeliverable Mail Office (UMO).

Treasures are sometimes in the stories one is able to ascertain in various postal history items. They do not always contain all the answers, but it is the pieces of the puzzle that get recognized while others pass them over.

Although I miss many things sometimes right under my nose, I was fortunate to have noticed this parcel piece with a customs label to England. A fondness for parcel post items, my amazement when I saw the Montreal D.L.O. cds in the Date Stamp section of form 91 B -1000,000- 13-12-05.

Dead Letter Office handstamps are seldom seen on Parcel Post items, especially on Customs labels (my first).



One can only speculate on the whole story here,

but what we do know is that 16 cents of the Edward issue stamps were placed on a Canadian parcel weighing 7 ounces. An assumption here is that no Customs label was attached, the parcel may have been opened, a customs label attached with a note 'Pr of sl....' and #1481 marked on the label.

Forwarded to England, a British PO label specifically for Canada was attached, also marked No. '1481' and Inland Postage of '3d' due.

With no other information, we can only assume the item was delivered after the Christmas season.

The DLO sometimes handled underpaid material, received payment and forwarded the items, however, they were required to cancel the stamps (if attached) with a DLO handstamp that was not done in this case.

This is a totally new handstamp a mere four months after being proofed, previously only proof known dated June 29.

In today's environment most people would not know what GENERAL DELIVERY was. However, in the past many letters and parcels were sent to a post office marked "*General Delivery*" resulting in many items not being picked up, forwarded to another address or sent to the Dead Letter Offices.

The letter could not find its destination at *1010 Broad St. Victoria* forwarded to Edmonton, Alta., NOT CALLED FOR at the Edmonton Post Office on Oct 7 1946 and sent to the Edmonton Dead Letter Office Oct 22 1946. As usual it would have been opened up, if a return address was included, the DLO clerk would have returned it to the sender in a Dead Letter Office Return envelope.

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D.L.O. CANADA FEB 14 1908 TORONTO BRANCH

Someone was in trouble on Valentine's Day. On February 14th 1908 a Valentine was sent to a Miss Myrtle Watson in Toronto with no postage. It was thus sent to the Toronto Dead Letter Office on Feb 14 1908 per large 34mm black handstamp.

A note would have been sent to the addressee asking for payment per file #16692 on the

left. Once payment was received the 1c Edward was applied and cancelled by a Toronto DLO oval handstamp Feb 17 1908, the File # crossed out per regulations and forwarded through the postal system the same day being three days late.

This is a very interesting previously unknown handstamp. Although it is a circle type single frame, the outside is shaped like a bottle cap. There is no proof known. All letters are sans-serif and large caps 5mm in height. There are no other similar handstamps that I am aware of.
