An Introduction to Flyspecking Canadian Stamps

Introduction and Definitions

The intent of this article is to show Errors, Freaks and Oddities (EFOs) with stamps from my personal Canadian stamp collection, supplemented with scans provided by other collectors and some properly printed stamps for comparison. EFOs are not "constant" production errors that are listed in stamp publications, such as catalogues. They are generally one-off varieties that do not command the same premiums as constant varieties, but may exceed the catalogue value of the normal philatelic issue. This article is far from being comprehensive.

What is "flyspecking"?

Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary does not define "flyspecking", but does define "flyspeck", in part, as "something small and insignificant".

Robin Harris, FRPSC, OTB, Editor of the Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps and the past Editor of The Corgi Times, defines terms in the glossary of his website <u>www.adminware.ca</u>

Flyspecking - the 'art' of studying hundreds or thousands of a specific stamp looking for minute variations in the hope of finding constant plate varieties.

Constant - a flaw that occurs regularly in the same position on the sheet throughout one or more printings of a stamp.

Flaw - a defect in a plate, causing an identifiable variety in the stamp itself. If the flaw occurs in the same spot on the plate over the entire printing run, it is said to be constant. Most flaws are not constant and are classified according their frequency of occurrence on the plate:

Die flaw	Occurs on every stamp of the plate.
Primary flaw	Occurs on several consecutive stamps in a pane, typically on all the stamps in one row or column, on every pane on the printed full sheet.
Secondary flaw	Occurs on one stamp on several consecutive panes in the sheet, typically on all of them.
Tertiary flaw	Typically occurs on just one stamp on the entire plate.

Error - A stamp released to the public that contains some sort of major mistake in the design or production of the stamp.

Freak - an abnormal, usually non-repetitive occurrence in the production of stamps. Most paper folds, over-inking, ink smears and perforation shifts are freaks.

Oddities - an odd or remarkably unusual person, thing or event.


Examples

Imperforate - when it should have been perforated



On SC953a, the horizontal perforation between the two stamps is missing.

Misaligned perforation



The misaligned vertical perforations on SC 1707 are illustrated best in the ultraviolet image at the bottoms. The horizontal perforation is correct.

With this particular issue, some stamps printed on the gummed side had poor registration and blurred print, whereas one pane of 100 stamps had a clear, sharp image.

It is thought that an anomaly in the ink created what appears to be the magenta-coloured ink missing. This qualifies as an incorrect colour and not a missing colour.

Centre or frame inverted

Canada's first and only inverted stamp - the famous St. Lawrence Seaway (SC 387a). The normal stamp is on the left and the invert stamp is on the right.

The United States issued a similar stamp at the same time.


Untagged



The stamp on the left of the pair of the 15c 1971 Christmas stamp (SC 557) can be seen to be properly vertically tagged on the left and right sides, but is illustrated better when photographed under ultraviolet light. The centre portion of this photographed stamp is lighter than the right and left sides due to the existence of tagging. The stamp on the far right of the pair is missing the tagging.

Error of design

2015 was the first time that Canada withdrew stamp products from sale after they were issued. The souvenir sheet (SC 2844), the set of five postcards and the United States \$1.20 postal rate booklet were withdrawn from sale on July 6th, three days after issue, due to an incorrect image being used for the Dinosaur Provincial Park. When re-issued on August 21, 2015, the Dinosaur Provincial Park stamp was replaced.

To the left are eight of the withdrawn July 3rd, 2015 UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Canada souvenir sheets. One was used for a Day of Issue cover, a second was gifted to a fellow collector and a third was given as one of The Barrie and District Stamp Club's 2015 bourse's "DOOR PRIZE".

The top of these eight souvenir sheets has multiple flyspecked errors.

The most prominent error was the tear in the bottom left stamp of the top displayed souvenir sheet.



That torn piece of paper from the ninth souvenir

sheet fell into the printing press causing the greenish coloured donut on the remainder of the eight

souvenir sheets.



This same sheet has white dots in the

sheet's top margin above "UNESCO", the "B" of "Buffalo" (top row, middle stamp) and above "International" (bottom row left stamp).



Oddities





It is unknown how this printing shift on SC 1690 occurred.



Again, on the 1971 Christmas stamp (SC 557), there is a shift in the red ink where the snowflake is off-centre.



In this example of the 1987 Battleford Post Office stamp (SC 1125), in an entire column of a pane the orange ink was off-set.



In this example of the 2010 sea otter stamp (SC 2387), a variety of dots can be found below the baby otter and by the adult otter's tail.

All of the above EFOs are obvious to the naked eye (imperforate, missing colour, printed on the gummed side, and printed in the wrong colour) or are determined using an ultraviolet lamp (untagged), this article concentrates solely on "error of design" varieties. This type of error requires concentration, good eyesight, a jeweller's loupe, a magnifying glass or an electronic microscope that projects a close-up image on a computer screen. The souvenir sheet is a prime example of an "obvious to the eye error" (the tear in the stamp) and those errors found through "flyspecking" (white dots in the stamps, in the surrounding paper and the donut repeated in nine sequentially produced souvenir sheets).

1963 Postal Service Varieties

The stamp shown in Fig. 1, Unitrade 413, has been in my Canadian stamp collection for a very long time. The stamp was issued 1963 September 25 to commemorate the 200th anniversary of regular postal service between Quebec City, Trois-Rivieres and Montreal. The stamp was designed by Bernard James Reddie and was engraved by Yves Baril (picture) and Alan Alexander Carswell (printing). The stamps were printed in two colours, green and brown, by the Canadian Bank Note Company in plates of 300 stamps in six panes of 50 stamps. Because of the two colours the sheets had to be fed through the print process twice.

There are no varieties listed in Unitrade and I had not seen any varieties until I started a collection of horse stamps. Horse stamps are my personal thematic collection. The two varieties are a shift in the vignette down (Fig. 2) and up (Fig. 3). Other examples of these shifts have been noticed on various internet sites but not noted as varieties.


