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Lunar New Year (Series 2)

January 15, 2021 saw the re-release of every Lunar New Year (series 2) stamp design, titled "Lunar New Year Cycle". All 24 previously issued designs re-appeared in a self-adhesive booklet (Permanent[™] value), water-activated gum pane (PermanentTM value), and an uncut press sheet (International rate).

All 36 stamps are unique in various ways, including the hidden copyright date of '2021' found on all of the new stamps.

▶ 2020/4 Quarterly Pack

The last quarterly pack of 2020 appeared in the middle of November. It is advertised as having the stamps issued from October through December (there were no stamps issued in December!). The price tag is \$13.54 which includes one souvenir sheet and seven die cut-to-shape selfadhesive singles.

There are five stamp issues included:

- Diwali
- Mary Riter Hamilton
- Christmas: Nativity
- Holiday: Maud Lewis (Christmas)
- Hanukkah

2020 Christmas Card

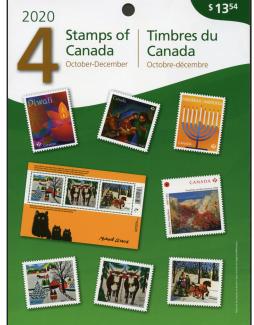
This past December (2020) Canada Post mailed out a 'Christmas greeting card' to (some?) people on their mailing list.

The stamp indicia shows the design of the Permanent[™] 2020 holiday stamp design (*Winter Sleigh Ride*) while the reverse side shows the image from the \$2.71 international rate holiday stamp (*Family and Sled*). An English and French version were distributed.

Canada Post Should Be Out Of Debt Now

Canada Post's "Lunar New Year Cycle" stamp issue of January 15, 2021, with its sell-out of the 8,000 uncut press sheets and 50,000 special panes of stamps within just a couple of weeks of their release date, has provided Canada Post with \$812,160 in total sales to collectors. And, don't forget the sales of the booklet panes that need to be added to this.

Well done Canada Post, for sales that is.

This re-cycle of the same designs used over the last 12 years of the Lunar New Year stamp issues resulted in 36 new, unique stamps for collectors to add to their collection.

Let's do a quick comparison. By my count, in 2020 there were only 76 stamps issued by Canada Post (a lower than usual number, due to the COVID-19 pandemic). In 2019, there were 103 different stamps. So, with just one stamp issue this year, we have had nearly 50% of the volume of all of last year's stamps ... again, in just one day. Wow.

Ok, I know Canada Post didn't plan to make up all of their lost revenue from 2020 with just one issue, but it is certainly quite an unfortunate coincidence when compared to other years.

Ok, I am being a bit facetious here; this little bit of sales from 36 new stamps will not get Canada Post out of debt.

FIREWORKS, LION DANCES, GOLD, AND A splash of red for good luck! To the Chinese, no New Year display is too extravagant. After all, the parades and festivals that take place during China's longest and most important celebration represent the shared hopes that good luck and prosperity will accompany the new cycle of the moon.

It's also a special time for Canada Post, when ultra-creative stamp designs—topped off with gold foil and innovative printing techniques—are issued to celebrate what is widely credited as the oldest surviving calendar system in the world. This year, we honour the Year of the Ox: a time of stability, harmony and balance. The issue will be the first release in a new 12-year *Lunar New Year* series.

The international stamp was inspired by long traditions of Chinese art and Lunar New Year decor. "We featured a work of pottery, as the art form is heavily

juxtaposition between the traditional quality of the pottery and the modern flair of the design."

The domestic stamp features an illustration of an Ox before a mountainous landscape. "The landscape and tan earth tones in the background speak again to this year's element, earth," explains Novotny. Plum blossoms-popular subjects in Chinese art and a common feature in Lunar New Year decor-are peppered throughout the background of the stamp and pane of 25. These flowers are indigenous to China and the country's national flower. Blooming in the early spring snow, they symbolize life, rebirth and adversity overcome. The Ox and the blossoms, adorned with clear foil, shine in the light, while multi-level embossing techniques add depth and dimension. Alain Leduc, Manager of Stamp Design and Production at Canada Post, adds, "With the image so full of fine details, the embossing in the design is extremely intricate.'

rooted in Chinese history," explains Ivan Novotny, Vice President of Design at Toronto's TaylorlSprules Corporation. An ancient art form of Asian descent, pottery wares have been sculpted in China since the Paleolithic era. "We also chose it for its connection to the earth, since 2009 is the year of the Earth Ox," adds Novotny. According to Chinese philosophy, everyone and everything is subject to the influence of the five elements: water, metal, earth, wood, and fire. The elements rotate every year, and each is associated with specific character traits: stability, industry and practicality in the case of earth element.

The spark that surrounds the Chinese character for "Ox" in the top-left corner of the international stamp evokes fireworks. Gold foil is applied to the spark, while clear foil and multi-level embossing techniques add shine and dimension to the pottery vase. Novotny notes, "There's an interesting

Even the long, scroll-like shape of the new souvenir sheet—a format that will remain standard throughout the series—is rooted in Chinese tradition, as decorative scrolls are widely believed to have their origin in China. "It was a challenge to marry these two stamps so different stylistically on the souvenir sheet," notes Novotny. "But they were harmonized through a heavy use of the lucky colour red." The Chinese characters that run vertically down the souvenir sheet list all 12 animals of the zodiac, fading from one year to the next as they appear in the lunar cycle— a feature that reinforces the scroll concept.

With its insightful blend of time-honoured customs and modern flair, this issue is a fitting tribute to an ancient tradition that is well-known and celebrated around the world today—not to mention an excellent kick-off to a new 12-year stamp cycle. 🖂

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN—A TIME TO explore the enchanting world of Chinese astrology; a time to celebrate the fascinating myths, legends and traditions behind this ancient calendar system. And at Canada Post, we like to celebrate in style. This January, we'll kick off the Year of the Tiger with a commemorative issue that's as bold and fierce as its namesake animal suggests.

The stamps, which mark the second release in a twelve-year Lunar New Year series, were designed by Wilco Design in Toronto. "The Year of the Tiger issue is a cross-cultural celebration of the tiger figure in the Chinese tradition," says the firm's principal, Wilson Lam. "This project has been guided by a desire to tell the story of the tiger through traditional Chinese icons and imagery."

A Chinese seal, a stamp used as a form of signature, is featured on the international stamp, while its imprint, portraying the tiger in a traditionally

The fierce tiger, painted by Lam and featured in the background of the souvenir sheet, illustrates the status of the tiger in Chinese lore. "In China, the tiger is at once a figure of power and of obedience," says Lam. "Tigers are respectful of their culture, community, and the authority of their tradition. They represent values that have helped guide generations of people into prosperity, while promoting a cohesive culture." The long, scroll-like shape of the souvenir sheet-a format that will remain standard throughout the series—is also rooted in Chinese tradition, as decorative scrolls are believed to have originated in China.

A detailed look at the uncut press sheet reveals an abstract, forest-like pattern, against which all twelve animals of the lunar cycle have been imprinted. "We did not focus exclusively on the tiger, but placed it among the other lunar animals to present it as a commanding presence within the twelve-year cycle,"

stylized manner, appears on the domestic stamp. The seal was designed by Lam and sculpted by Chinese-Canadian artist Bill Lau, using Sculpey polymer clay. "Seals are often so well-crafted that they act as cultural artifacts in themselves. In the design, the seal works to establish a visual theme that delivers both a two-dimensional icon and a three-dimensional object," Lam explains. "We applied gold foil to the seal's imprint, because 2010 is dominated by the metal element and gold is the highest-valued metal in China." A symbol of wealth and good fortune to the Chinese, the colour gold speaks to lunar hopes of good luck and prosperity. Clear foil and multi-level embossing techniques were applied to draw attention to the seal, notes Alain Leduc, Manager of Stamp Design and Production at Canada Post. "These features combine to catch the light and really give prominence to Lau's sculpture," Leduc points out.

notes Lam. Speckles of foil are scattered throughout the background of the press sheet. Alain Leduc explains, "This gives the impression that gold flakes have been splashed across the surface, and the random spreading of foil is something we've never done before." The feature was inspired by the works of Gustav Klimt (1862-1918), an Austrian painter celebrated for his elegant use of gold foil.

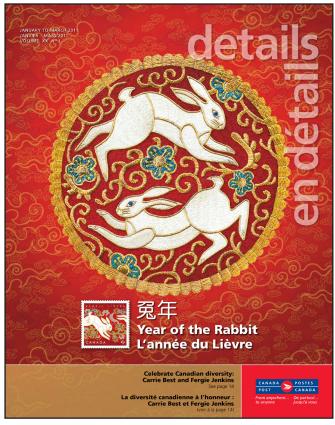
"Year after year, it can be challenging to develop a new Lunar New Year issue that blends well with the series, while being completely original in its approach," notes Leduc. When it comes to making a match, they should gravitate to those born under the sign of the Ram, Pig, or Dog. The Rabbit will be unable to cope with the arrogance and criticism of the Rooster, their patience will be exhausted by the tantrums of the Tiger, and for them, the Horse is too hot tempered and fickle. Rabbits don't need the grief. They are survivors—and can deal with anything life throws at them as long as they are at peace with themselves.

As in keeping with Canada Post's second series of Lunar New Year commemorative issues, January 7th will see the release of both a domestic and international stamp, as well as related collectibles, in celebration of the Year of the Rabbit.

"With the scope of this project, there were many details and so much to keep in mind. It was too, a team effort," says Paul. "Embracing, acknowledging and encouraging the indispensable contributions, support, suggestions and observations of each team member yet remaining true to a constantly evolving vision was truly challenging—but the end result is better for it."

THINKING OF DRAGONS MAY CONJURE UP FIREbreathing, serpent-like beasts of fantastic legends, but in many Asian cultures, these magical, mythical creatures are benevolent, associated with wisdom and longevity. They are revered for their influence over the primal forces of nature; for example, the Chinese water dragon has potent and auspicious powers over rainfall, hurricanes and floods.

A fiery red dragon bursts from the water on the dramatic souvenir sheet bearing an international-rate stamp and imagery taken from the domestic stamp. The embossing on the dragon's head is carved by hand, with touches of foil to give it vibrancy. The background is red, a colour symbolizing good fortune and joy that is used prominently during Chinese New Year celebrations.

The highly collectible uncut press sheet features 12 souvenir sheets. The Chinese characters on the selvedge bear the names of all the Zodiac creatures, and the calligraphy along the bottom offers greetings and wishes for luck in the New Year, in a tone similar to messages found in fortune cookies.

The presence of the dragon in Chinese culture dates back thousands of years. Dinosaur bones unearthed in ancient China are documented as "dragon bones," and dragon statues and jade badges of rank have been discovered as far back as the fifth millennium BC. Excellent and outstanding people are compared to the dragon, and leaping, swooping dragons operated by a full team of people are a common sight at Chinese festivals.

This year, Canada Post honours the Year of the Dragon—a time of innovation, risk and achievement—the fifth sign of the Chinese zodiac. The dragon in the PERMANENT™, domestic-rate stamp in this series is fully embossed. Gold foil is used

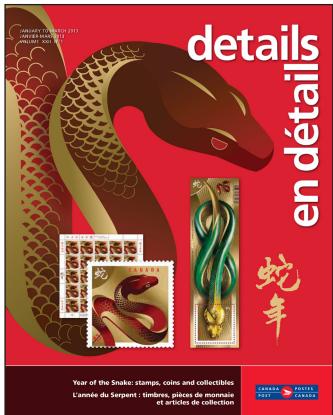
A couple of brand new products will appear this year for the very first time. "Designer Louis Fishauf, who also designed the extraordinary Year of the Monkey stamp from the first Lunar New Year series, did a great job with all of this year's stamp products as well. The images are complex and striking, and the foil and embossing techniques are outstanding."

IN WESTERN CULTURE, CALLING SOMEONE A snake is considered fighting words. But in the Asian countries that celebrate the Lunar New Year, the Snake is viewed as the wisest and most enigmatic of all the zodiac creatures. In fact, it's such a strong sign of intelligence and luck that an ancient Chinese saying notes that finding a snake in one's home is great fortune and ensures that the inhabitants will never go hungry.

The Year of the Snake, in this case a water snake, slithers in on February 10, 2013, and bids farewell on

According to Dunkelman, the design team spent months consulting a number of experts in Chinese culture, including curators at the Royal Ontario Museum, and tested designs on his financial planner and Joe Gault's dentist, who are both of Chinese origin. "There's always a concern of creating something that might work graphically, but offend Chinese Canadians."

Technically, the design team was allowed to use two finishes, gold foil and embossing. In addition to the right lighting, the right shadows in the flat image, these finishes were used to create a threedimensional effect of the snake slithering through the water. Incorporating the water element graphically, through the circles and waves – and then selecting

January 30, 2014. The sixth of 12 creatures in the zodiac, the Snake represents intelligence, materialism and gracefulness. Those born in the Year of the Snake are analytical and tend to look closely before they leap. They love luxury and know how to get what they want. Even if it means scheming and plotting, clever and cunning snakes know that the end justifies whatever means necessary. Still, the Snake requires peace; noise and stress are not well tolerated. The hard-working and ambitious Snake is successful in professional life, but tends to hop jobs, becoming easily bored if not sufficiently challenged or rewarded.

The duo stamp issue (Permanent™ domestic and International) for the Year of the Snake, the fifth in this series, is created in lavish textures befitting the

areas of the snake for foiling enhanced the 3D effect. Dunkelman adds, "The passion for this project and the openness to experiment – from Stamp Design Manager Alain Leduc, Gravure Choquet (foil stamping and embossing) and Lowe-Martin (printing) – is what made this stamp issue what it is."

Says Leduc, "We hope that we have met the challenge of continuing to surprise the collector and the mailer with this annual issue. This design, combined with the multi-level embossing technique, has achieved the best three-dimensional effect possible on stamp paper. The illusion of the snake floating on the water is, I think, stunning."

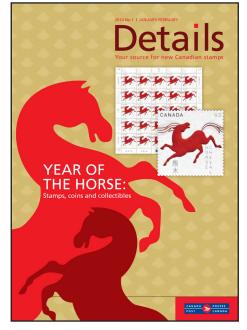

luxury-loving Snake. On the domestic stamp, a red snake slithers on curving waves, symbolizing the water influence on this particular Year of the Snake. On the international stamp, a yellow and green jade snake, artfully embossed on multiple levels to provide three-dimensionality and simulate scales, coils into a stylized 8, the luckiest and most valued number by the Chinese people. Both images visually draw on the most significant character attributes of the Year of the Snake.

For designers Joe Gault and Avi Dunkelman of MIX Design Group in Toronto, and calligrapher Tan Chao Chang, the snake was originally conceived as a three-dimensional object, so it was essential that this dimensionality be present within the stamp.

YEAR OF THE HORSE Issue date: January 13, 2014

The Year of the Horse gallops into view on January 31, 2014, and rides on until February 18, 2015. Those born under the sign have more than their fair share of ingenuity, a gift for communication and a taste for the spotlight – traits that also set the benchmark for this year's stamp design.

Throughout the design process, Paprika's Louis Gagnon and Daniel Robitaille were keenly aware of the need to balance innovation and tradition. They focused on attributes that would not only result in a timeless design for this issue but also continue the high level of artistry and refinement that has been the hallmark of the Lunar New Year series.

"The horse is shown in movement, its mane and tail touching from one stamp to the next," says Gagnon. "The embossing also creates a multidimensional look and feel, adding to the physicality of the horse, while the red and gold – traditional Chinese colours – evoke the liveliness of fire."

The creative team grounded the image of the wild horse with a silhouette design influenced by shadow puppets and traditional print-making. Acting as Continued page 8 a base for the flashes of red and gold, a white background serves as a soothing and elegant canvas.

Gagnon continues, "We wanted to show the energy, strength and gracefulness of the animal itself – and we put a lot of effort into featuring those characteristics in the different denominations. We wanted each stamp to be powerful."

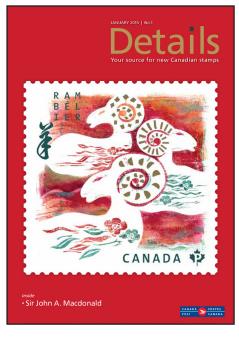
"We've used foil in the past to accentuate parts of an image, but in this case, the entire horse on the international stamp was created from embossed foil," explains Alain Leduc, Stamp Design Manager at Canada Post. "It is definitely something special."

In keeping with its equine theme, the Official First Day Cover is cancelled at Horseshoe Bay, British Columbia.

YEAR OF THE RAM Issue date: January 8, 2015

Singer-songwriter Joni Mitchell, big-screen scream queen Fay Wray, and former prime minister Pierre Elliot Trudeau – what do they all have in common, aside from being subjects of Canadian stamps?

They were all born in the Year of the Ram, whose next cycle runs from February 19, 2015, to February 7, 2016.

In Chinese culture, the ram – or male sheep – is a sacred symbol of good fortune, kindness and justice. Ancient Chinese literature often associates the ram with religion, law, ethics, politics, literature, art and folklore.

Those born under the influence of the eighth creature in the zodiac of lunar New Year are caring, sensitive (sometimes to the extreme), artistic, fashion-savvy and intuitive. They long for beauty, to see the world, and many have the special talent of being able to turn challenges into opportunities – qualities shared, to some degree, among the Canadian Rams we just mentioned.

Sheep are close relatives of the goat, a creature that holds a special place in Guangzhou (Canton), China, also known as "Goat City." The name comes from a tale of five goat-riding fairies that brought rice and everlasting fertility to the local people. Guangzhou's granite statue of five goats, which honours the legend, is a favourite among tourists, and locals believe that it brings them prosperity.

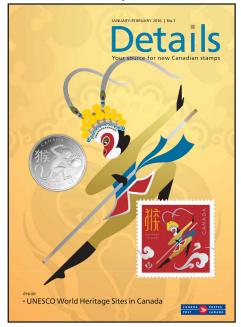

YEAR OF THE MONKEY Domestic-rate stamp Issue date: January 11, 2016

The eighth stamp in the Lunar New Year series celebrates the Year of the Monkey, which begins February 8, 2016, and ends January 27, 2017.

The ninth creature in the lunar cycle is an all-powerful symbol of honour, luck, riches and longevity, according to Chinese custom. Monkey symbols traditionally include an element of "godliness" – one of the reasons they are ubiquitous in classic Chinese art and architecture.

Chinese novel *Journey to the West*. Also transformed into a famous Chinese opera, the story tells of how the sovereign accompanied the monk Xuanzang on a journey to India to retrieve Buddhist texts known as *sutras*.

In keeping with previous issues, the domestic and international stamps come together on a stylized souvenir sheet and an uncut press sheet. Those lucky enough to be born in the Year of the Monkey count brilliance, flexibility, skillfulness and inventiveness among their traits, along with an excellent memory, an iron will and a strong drive to succeed. On the downside, Monkeys are said to be easily frustrated by delays, tend to look down on others and have a fast-flaring temper that (fortunately) cools quickly. Canadians born in this lunar year include singer Céline Dion, actress Kim Cattrall and legendary pianist Glenn Gould.

These domestic and international stamps were inspired by the legend of the Monkey King Sun Wukong, one of the main characters in the classic

Designed by Albert Ng and Linna Xu, the stamps not only depict the Monkey imagery but also feature popular New Year's greetings, which appear at the edge of the pane and on all of the souvenir sheets.

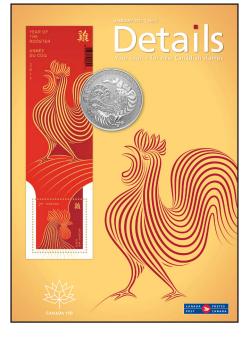

Those born under this cocky sign – which rules the roost until February 15, 2018 – are said to be honest, hardworking and punctual. Although their tendency to boast might rub some the wrong way, Roosters also have a knack for winning friends with their wit and charm.

The ninth issue in our most recent series celebrating the Chinese New Year, these domesticand international-rate stamps showcase striking designs by Montréal-based Paprika. The gold-line work on the international stamp captures the Rooster's stately profile, while the undulating pattern on the domestic stamp features the fowl in full form – its chest puffed out with pride. The pane of 25 complements the wavy design by rotating the stamps throughout the sheet – a first for Canada Post.

To start the sesquicentennial, these elegant designs strut their stuff for Canada's birthday – as will each issue in 2017. CANADA 150 is hidden in tagging around the stamps and revealed only in black light, while the official Canada 150 logo adorns the uncut press sheet and pane of 25 in the same gold used to enhance the stamps.



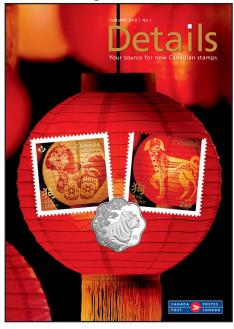

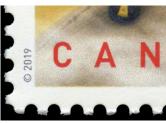

After one last bark from the Year of the Dog, the Year of the Pig trots into the limelight on February 5, 2019, and squeals to a stop on January 24, 2020. Two stamps – the 11th issue in our 12-year series – celebrate this porcine sign, which also ruled the Chinese zodiac in 2007, 1995, 1983, 1971 and 1959. Those born under it are said to be frank, forthright and trusting.

Albert Ng and Seung Jai Paek, of Albert Ng and Associates, based their designs for the stamps on the story of Zhu Bajie, a colourful character from the 16th-century Chinese novel *Journey to the West*. A once powerful figure in Heaven, Pigsy – as he became known – was banished for misbehaviour to life on Earth as a human-pig hybrid. The Permanent™ domestic-rate stamp features a proud Pigsy clad in heavenly armour, clutching an enormous nine-toothed muck rake. The international stamp shows him lounging in more modest attire.

As with past years, the pane of 25 stamps and the uncut press sheet are adorned with auspicious messages offering blessings for the New Year. When asked about their significance, Ng said he followed one principal in choosing them: to be meaningful. "Another challenge," he added, "was to select sayings that were acceptable to both Mandarin- and Cantonese-speaking audiences."

Our latest series of Lunar New Year stamps wraps up with the Year of the Rat – the first of the 12 signs in the Chinese zodiac.

As legend has it, the rat earned the primary position thanks to its cunning nature. According to one story, the Jade Emperor based the 12-year cycle on the order in which the animals arrived at the heavenly temple. The rat persuaded the tireless ox, which was sure to win, to carry it to the finish line. Just as the ox approached the temple, the rat jumped down and scurried ahead to take first place.

Designed by Albert Ng, O. Ont., and Seung Jai Paek, the stamps present the traditional story of the wedding of the rat's daughter in the style of folk art known as Chinese farmer painting. The Permanent™ domestic rate stamp depicts the bride on her way to her nuptials, while the international rate stamp shows the happily married couple.

"A merry wedding procession of rats is a common folk-art motif associated with the Chinese New Year," explains Ng. "The snowy scene, reminiscent of Canada or northern China, joyfully captures the celebration of the wedding – and the coming new year."

The Year of the Rat begins January 25, 2020, and ends February 11, 2021.

Lunar New Year Cycle: 2021



The culmination of more than a decade of awardwinning stamps, this retrospective brings together in a single issue all the stamps from our most recent Lunar New Year series. The exquisite stamps, issued from 2009 to 2020, were part of one of Canada Post's most popular and longest-running series, which featured such elaborate techniques as gold and silver foiling and multi-level embossing.

The Lunar New Year cycle showcased all of the animals in the Chinese zodiac: Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Ram, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig. Conceived well before the series was launched, this collection features 24 stamps based on the designs of all the previous domestic and international rate stamps in the last 12 years. "Even before we began this series of Lunar New Year stamps, we envisioned bringing them all together for a grand finale," explains Jim Phillips, Director of Stamp Services. "That required a plan from the very beginning. We developed standardized specifications that made the stamps consistent across issues in terms of dimension, format and palette, but still allowed sufficient creative freedom for each to be spectacular in its own right."

Brought together by Paprika from Montréal, these eye-catching stamps feature the work of the many design firms and designers who contributed to the series over the years. The result is a unique collectible that is a fitting tribute to Lunar New Year celebrations everywhere.

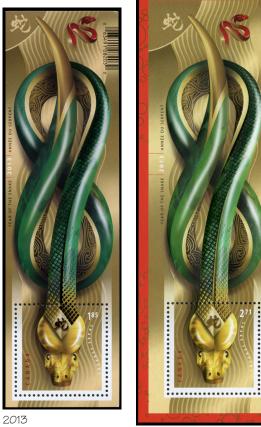

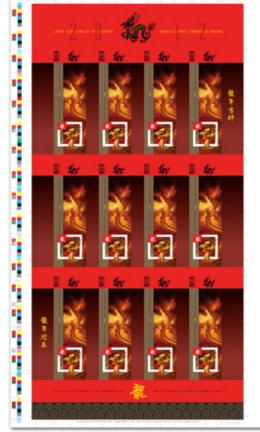

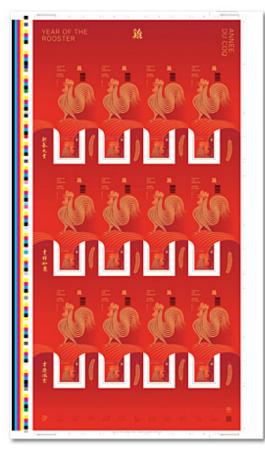






















The Lunar New Year Cycle included an uncut press sheet that included all 12 of the Lunar New Year international-rate souvenir sheets of one. Note that the designs are presented in the order of the Lunar New Year calendar, not the order that the stamps were initially released (i.e. the last stamp to appear — Year of the Rat — is first in the Lunar New Year calendar).

All of the stamps on the 2021 uncut press sheet are denominated at the current international rate of \$2.71. Thus, eleven of the designs are new stamps simply because of the new rate (only the Year of the Rat has the same value as the initial release of the stamp in 2020).

The Year of the Monkey stamp has a constant variety: a thin squiggly line extending from the top of the mask. A closer look at the uncut press sheets shows that there are two unique time stamps at the bottom of the sheet: either 8:51:46 AM or 3:53:18 PM. It is the latter time-stamped sheets that have the flaw. Initial reports suggest that the "no flaw" sheets are far *less* common than the "flaw" sheets.

All stamps on this uncut press sheet have a '2021' year date; this differs from all of the original printings.

Three of the stamps have a different perforation compared to the first releases: Monkey (2016), Pig (2019) and Rat (2020).

Permanent[™] rate WAG Shrink-wrapped Packages

On March 31, 2014, Canada Post introduced a "single stamp mailing" fee. If one was mailing a single domestic envelope (0–30g) and required the purchase of a single stamp at the postal counter, they were charged a premium. At the time, the regular postal rate was 85¢; the single stamp mailing cost was \$1.00, a premium of 15¢.

Since the new single stamp mailing rate went into effect, Canada Post is no longer selling *single* domesticrate stamps. In order to ensure that single stamps of these water-activated stamps are not removed from a pane and sold individually, the full panes are only distributed and sold in a shrink-wrapped package.

All of these shrink-wrapped offerings include the shrink-wrap package, full panes of the water-activated gum stamps, and an advertising 'card' (printed on both sides).

Six such shrink-wrapped packages appeared for the Lunar New Year stamps.

The 2021 Lunar New Year Cycle pane of 12 stamps was not shrink-wrapped.

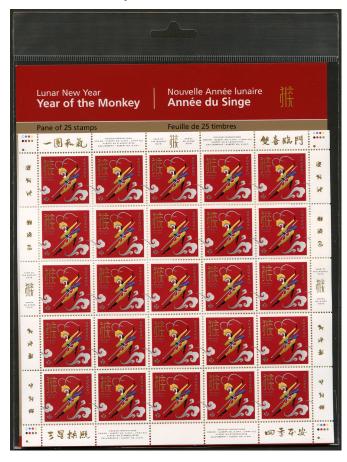

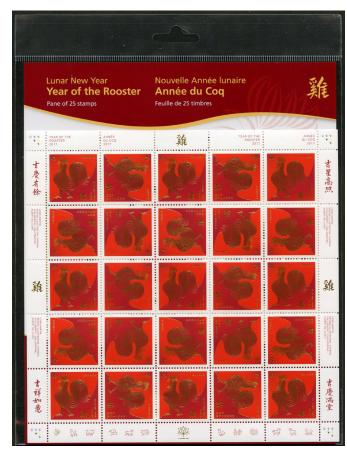

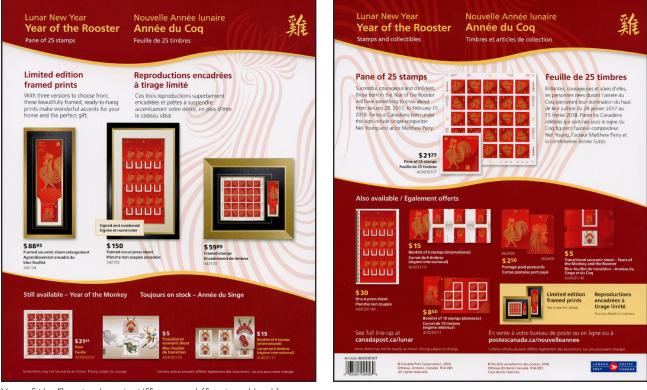

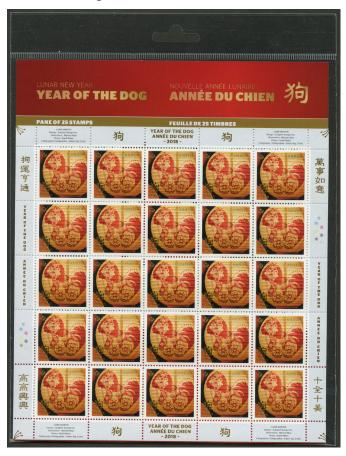

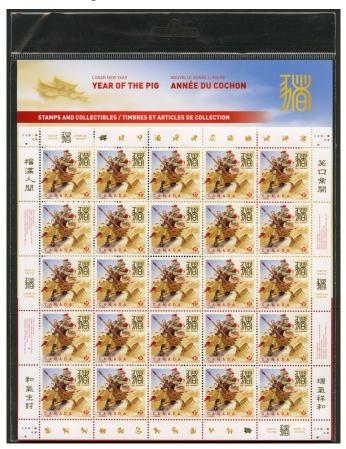
