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

Here is what Canada Post is up to these days...


#### Canada Post Website Re-Design

The philatelic portion of Canada Post's website has undergone some changes over the last few months, including a new "Store" portion revealed in the last week of September (2021).

Unfortunately, what used to be easy and quick to navigate is now cumbersome and requires several more steps to find what you are looking for.

The *Details* magazine requires several more 'mouse clicks' to find a new issue (although there hasn't been much to find lately anyway!). The Store also requires some more 'clicks' to find what you are looking for, and the 'sort order' of items seems odd from time to time - hopefully that is still a work in progress and we will see improvements in the coming days.

According to the stamp program that has been announced for September to November, and information seen in post office retail guides, there are 10 stamp issues still to be released (with no issues slated for December) ... and we have yet to see a *Details* magazine for any of these ... and we are now into October.

I understand *why* this is being done, but compared to how stamp information *used* to be released on an annual (entire stamp program) and quarterly (*Details*) basis, I certainly miss the good 'ol days. It seems that most of the new-issue information we hear about now is accidently leaked from retail post offices and then passed along by collectors via on-line stamp newsgroups.

## ESG Zoom Meeting at BNAPEX 2021 VIRTUAL

This year, for the first time, the Elizabethan II Study Group's annual meeting was held virtually. Our 2-hour Zoom get-together took place on September 6 as part of BNAPEX 2021 VIRTUAL. Robin Harris, editor of our newsletter *Corgi Times*, began by welcoming everyone and providing an overview and status report of ESG for the benefit of members as well as visitors. Up to 49 attendees joined the meeting — a record for our group!



Next on the program was this year's special attraction — Robin Harris' presentation on "Lowe-Martin Coil Production". Robin took us on a fascinating journey: Lowe-Martin's facilities and methods; acquisition of essential study items at postal outlets; examination of enormous numbers of used stamps; and outstanding, innovative research leading to the plating of Flower coil issues and recognition of thousands of distinct varieties. What a phenomenal achievement! When it's available, a video recording of Robin's presentation will be posted on the BNAPEX 2021 website.

Following Robin's presentation, there was time for our ever-popular "show-and-tell". Luc Frève began with a rarity from the 1972 Earth Sciences issue, having the gutter between stamps. Arnie Janson then showed a 1¢ Centennial booklet stamp with re-entries in the lower right. Mirko Zatka and Leopold Beaudet noted similar features on 6¢ Centennial orange and black stamps and on Caricature stamps. It was suggested that such features may have been produced during the original transfer of the image to the plate, rather than at a later time. Next, Gary Steele had a coil strip of the \$1.05 Flower, with an interval covered by red tape on both the front and back. A discussion ensued as to whether this was a repair paste-up. Jeffrey Arndt then showed two covers bearing Wilding stamps. The first was a rare example of mail marked as fraudulent in the USA. The second was a registered cover returned from the USA, showing Canadian RPO cancels from its journey back to the sender. Next, Mirko Zatka reported that he and Robin Harris have undertaken a study of tagging varieties. Finally, Jim Watt inquired about the configuration of panes on the printing plate of the 50¢ Suzor-Côté stamp. And then, all too soon, our allotted time was over.

Hopefully, next year we can meet in person at BNAPEX/CALTAPEX 2022, to be held at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Calgary over the Labour Day weekend from September 2 to 4. Mark your calendars!

## The Loon River 4¢ Karsh Bisects

A 4¢ Karsh diagonal bisect used on cover was listed and illustrated by Robin Harris (1998, p. 52, fig. 205). His illustration was based on a photograph courtesy of Saskatoon Stamp Centre. That cover, to an addressee in Loon River, Saskatchewan, was cancelled "LOON RIVER / 23 DE / 54 / SASK." with the 23 inverted. A similar unsealed cover is shown here in Figure 1. It was also franked with an upper-right bisect cancelled on the same day and was addressed

in the same handwriting, but to a different recipient. The unsealed cover in Figure 2, having a lower-right bisect with pane selvedge on the right side, was cancelled "LOON RIVER / DE 24 / 54 / SASK." Figure 3 shows a lower-left Loon

River bisect, where the 4¢ denomination appears on the stamp. Cutting 4¢ Karsh stamps in half resulted in bisects with a value of 2¢ each. That was the domestic rate for addressed printed matter weighing up to and including 2 ounces, from April 2, 1951, until April 1, 1964 (Chung, Machum, and Narbonne, 2004, p. 20).

Why were the Loon River 4¢ Karsh bisects produced? One of the covers I acquired was accompanied by a photocopy of a document that provided the answer (Figure 4). The hand-written correspondence on Post Office stationery was dated April 21, 1960, and signed by F.E. Bodoano. Francis Edmund Bodoano was the last postmaster at Loon River; he served there from September 18, 1945, until November 8, 1968 (Library and Archives Canada). The correspondence was directed to Ernest H. Bellard, who was an American philatelist (see Goodkind, 1960, p. 108). The body of the letter reads as follows:

"Re your letter of apl. 10th conserning [sic] bisected 4c stamp. / Loon River P.O. is a very small post office. at at [sic] Christmas time some few years ago I was short of 1c & 2c stamps and having only one mail day a week I was not able to replenish my supplies very quickly so I did bisect 4c stamps but confined them mostly to Local Delivery and no doubt the cover you have is one of these".

The 4¢ Karsh definitive, issued on May 1, 1953, was replaced with the 4¢ Wilding definitive on June 10, 1954. More than half a year later, 4¢ Karsh stamps were still on hand at the Loon River post office.

## **Centennial Booklet: BK65a with Blank Pane**

I have come across a booklet that I don't believe has been discussed before in the Corgi Times.

This appears to be a BK65a from the cover, has dextrine gum, and is perf.  $12\frac{1}{2} \times 12$ . The interesting thing is that the front of the pane is **blank**.

The pane itself appears to be glued to the inside of the cover properly. In other words, not glued in after the fact, and in the correct position.

The inside of the covers are lightly waxed in line with other BK65a's.


The pane is slightly miscut, showing evidence of partial perforations on the left of the pane, which none of my regular BK65's show (they are all neatly cut with straight edges).

There is evidence of some damage on the inside covers from possibly being glued which is not what I see on other BK65's with waxed covers. For the most part they are undamaged from opening. Lastly the cover is a bit grubby and appears to have been handled a bit.

Does anyone have any thoughts on this? Could it have been a test booklet to check the operation of the booklet machines?

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## The Demise of Canadian Low-value Definitive Stamps

Low-value definitives, for use as rate make-up stamps, have been with us for well over 100 years. Even the ½¢ Large / Small Queen and Jubilee values could be used as make-up rate stamps at the time of their use. It now seems that low-value stamps have literally 'met their maker' with Canada Post.

Values from 1¢ to 25¢ are no longer being reprinted, or for that matter, distributed to post offices, based on reports from Canada Post and RPO (Retail Post Office) staff. The 2¢ Beneficial Insect value (Scott 2328) is already sold out (except perhaps for some post offices that might have a few left). A similar situation appears to hold true with some of the high values stamps such as the \$2.00 definitive, as it is also not being shipped out for postal use – post offices have been told that they can no longer order these stamps. I have spoken several times with 'Crown' post office and RPO staff in Calgary over the past four months. They have confirmed this with some frustration on their part. The stamps are still needed, they said, when a postage sticker is not being used for showing the amount paid (or as a late add-on for an extra service).



Canada Post must be trying to eliminate the tracking, accounting for, and storing of, the low-value stamps as demand for them is much more limited compared to 'Permanent<sup>TM'</sup> values, and to simplify operations at post office locations (whether 'Crown' or RPOs). Another reason may be the current COVID-19 pandemic, as all of these stamps are still of the 'lick and stick' type. Avoiding the need to have staff lick stamps to affix them to items being mailed no doubt provides a higher degree of working safety for the employees.

The stamps are being replaced by postage labels which have been in use since Canada Post computerized its operations, and which are printed at the time of mailing. If a package with pre-affixed stamps or pre-paid postage is low on the amount paid, the extra cost will then be added by a label instead of actual stamps.

I acknowledge that low-value definitives have not seen high collector focus since the Caricature set, though a number of interesting and elusive varieties and reprints occur on each of the series that followed: Wildflowers, Artifacts, Mammals, Edible Berries, Traditional Trades, and the current Beneficial Insects (see Table). Nonetheless, they have formed an important part of specialized collecting in Canada for many, many, years and it will be sad to see them go! Finding combinations of low-value booklet (make-up) stamps paying the full letter rate on commercial envelopes, or even with first class rate stamps, can be very challenging!

I would be interested in learning if some of your local post offices give you a different answer or explanation to this...

NOTE: A 'Major Reprint' is defined as one involving a change in the security printer, the paper or gum, or perforation layout. A minor change refers to a subtle change in the design of a stamp, or changes to margin markings of the sheet.

## **Canada Special Delivery Cancels to 1992, Part 1: Circular Cancels**

G. H. Davis (1991) illustrated one circular date cancel devised specifically for Special Delivery mail: Montreal with S and D at left and right, illustrated her in Figure 1. He also noted that a similar cancel with letters C left and right was used from Montreal, also in Figure 1, that was not specifically for Special Deliver but other mails.

In a series of articles, I will show other date cancels specifically noted as Special Delivery between 1948 and the late 1980s. Since I continue to find new variants of each type, these articles are intended to begin more systematic investigation of these cancels dedicated to special delivery mail.

#### **TYPES**

I define Special Delivery cancels as having the words SPECIAL, SPECIAL DELIVERY, or S D as part of the cancel. Many have the French equivalent LIVRAISON SPECIALE or LIVRAISON EXPRES. I have based my research around three basic types of cancels, although there is great variation among them: circular, box, and clockface. They tend to follow chronologically in that order, although there is overlap among all. They continued in use up to the end of Special Delivery service in August 1992 and perhaps a year after, as my latest use is in 1993. It is likely there may be later uses.

#### CIRCULAR DATE CANCELS

Cancels vary greatly in size, arrangement of city, dater, and special delivery designation. Within and between cancel types, the arrangement of the time varies greatly. Some list hour, day, month, and year, while others only day, month, and year, in various order, which I list in Table 1, with the other features discussed here. Examples of some of the Types are shown in Figures 2 to 15.

There is a sort of order chronologically by early date of use in the cancels' arrangements, and I use that feature to label them as Types 1–25 based on changes in feature.

The Montreal Special Deliver cancel of Figure 1 appears to be used between 1948 and April 3, 1958, my late date. Its diameter at 23mm is the smallest of all the cancels. The largest, Type 23 of Red Deer, AB, is 50mm. There was a certain consistency in the 1970s with Types 6 and 7, comprising 26 of the 51 listed cancels. The termination of Special Delivery as a supplemental option in mailing did not stop the use of the cancels for a few years, even though other services had different names and terms of operation. The circular date cancels, however, seem to have gone out of use by mid 1989.

In future articles I will address the box and clockface cancels. The latter, particularly, is quite complicated to describe. I hope these articles will generate some interest and additions to the listings.

Here are some "odd" perforations employed by Canada over the years (five stamp issues). That is, perforations that are not circular.

Year of the Horse (January 3, 2002)



A diamond-shaped perf is placed halfway down each vertical side.

Big Cats (October 13, 2005)



First appearance of a Maple Leaf-shaped group of perforations (between se-tenant pair).

International Polar Year (February 12, 2007)



Maple Leaf-shaped group of perforations (between setenant pair). Anne of Green Gables (June 20, 2008)



Maple Leaf-shaped group of perforations (between setenant pair).

#### Marine Life (May 13, 2010)



Top: Maple Leaf-shaped group of perforations (between se-tenant pair) and elliptical-type on left- and right-side edges.

Bottom: Elliptical perforations between se-tenant pair of stamps; a first in Canada (stamps were printed in Sweden).
