
Here is what Canada Post is up to these days...

The Summit Series, 1972

Canada Post released a single stamp on September 21 for "The Summit Series, 1972", commemorating the 50th anniversary of this epic eight-game hockey series between Canada and the Soviet Union.

This is the third time that Canada Post has commemorated this historic sporting event. This new design, at least for myself personally, is one of the least inspiring images in recent memory. What a disappointment it was to see the design of this new stamp.

While browsing the new stamp on the Canada Post website on the day of issue — which was postponed from September 2 — I came across the official first day cover illustrated below. Notice the cancellation date of September 6 for Winnipeg, MB. This differs from the announced release date of September 2 [Canada Post *Details* 8 | July 2022] and the actual issue date of the 21st.

As shown in the sidebar, the first game of The Summit Series was played September 2 (the originally announced date of issue fo this stamp). The game in Winnipeg (incorrectly shown OFDC cancel) was played on the 6th. The issue date of September 21 does not correspond with any scheduled game.

Note that the OFDC image on the Canada Post website was corrected very quickly to reflect the issue date of September 21.

Elizabethan II Study Group "Annual Show-and-Tell" at CPS 2022 BNAPEX

Saturday, September 3, 13:00-14:15 Doll Room, Hyatt Regency Hotel, Calgary, AB

The Elizabethan II Study Group held its "Annual Showand-Tell" on September 3, during CPS 2022 BNAPEX in Calgary, Alberta. Eight participants were welcomed by Bob Elias. Although attendance was relatively low this year, it was our longestever meeting, lasting an hourand-a-quarter!

Bob began by encouraging non-members to join our study group. He thanked members who contributed to the special CAPEX '22 issue of *Corgi Times*, which featured their favourite Elizabethan II items. Robin Harris continues his outstanding production of *Corgi Times*, but the urgent need for articles is ongoing.

Please support our newsletter by sending submissions to Robin.

Luc Frève started off the "Show-and-Tell" with a cover sent from Newfoundland to Ontario, for which registration was paid with a 50¢ Suzor-Côté stamp. Luc also passed around an official-looking folder containing an information card with stamp for each Canadian issue of 1969 (including the 50¢ Suzor-Côté). Although there was speculation that the folder may have been produced by Canada Post, no identifying marks were found on its cover or cards. Next, Luc showed another cover with a 50¢ Suzor-Côté stamp. Unlike the varieties identified in the Unitrade Catalogue, there was a red stripe in this stamp. Luc also had a cover mailed from Oregon to Montréal, with a yellow tag related to the 1975 postal strike on the back.

Arno Kolster brought two Centennial-period covers. The first was sent from Montréal to Italy; the rate was $15 \, \mathrm{¢}$ for airmail, and $40 \, \mathrm{¢}$ was added for special delivery. The second was an airmail letter sent to Britain, paid at the $6 \, \mathrm{¢}$ preferential surface rate resulting in a deficiency of $9 \, \mathrm{¢}$. The cover was marked 18/12 for postage due ($18 \, \mathrm{¢}$ = double the deficiency, $12 \, \mathrm{¢}$ = UPU surface rate), which was converted to $13 \, \mathrm{pence}$.

Adri Veenstra continued the Centennial theme with a Certified Mail envelope sent by the Revenue Authority in Scarborough. It was franked with an 8¢ Centennial stamp (domestic first-class letter rate) cancelled on October 10, 1973 (10 days after the introduction of Certified Mail).



For an unknown reason, the envelope was subsequently franked with another 8¢ Centennial stamp, which was cancelled on October 16, 1973.

Dave Russum has been studying the travel time of mail from Great Britain to Canada, based on the mailing and delivery postmarks on covers. He noted that airmail efficiency reached its peak in the 1950s–1970s, and has declined ever since.

Leopold Beaudet led a detailed and informative discussion on how Library and Archives Canada obtains material from Canada Post, how it is stored, the procedure for accessing and examining it, and the types of information that can be derived from the available material.

To conclude our session, Bob Elias passed around a 10¢ Canada Air Letter up-rated with a 5¢ Karsh stamp, which was sent to Austria in May, 1953. In that country, the letter was opened, examined, and sealed by an employee at the Allied Censor Office, who placed their official mark on both the inside and outside of the letter.

Next year, our "Annual Show-and-Tell" will be held during BNAPEX, September 2023 in Halifax-Dartmouth. Be sure to bring a treasure to show us or a puzzle to ask about!

Counterfeit From Far and Wide III coil stamps – an update

The counterfeit 'P' and \$1.30 coil stamps from the current From Far and Wide definitive set, discovered in late spring 2022, have occasionally shown up in the marketplace offered to collectors in strips, but none have so far been reported used on mail. Their 'marketing' source has changed its web location at least once, since first reported. I have been recently able to obtain two full rolls of each value, so can provide some more details on these.

As has been previously reported in the *Corgi Times* (March–April 2022, Vol. XXX, #5; and July–August 2022, Vol XXXI, #1 issues), the stamps are found on UV-bright, self-adhesive paper, no tagging, and identical diecuts from row to row (in terms of diecut position at left of each row). Also as reported earlier, there are no nibs that help to keep the stamps adhering to each other and the backing paper. This results in the stamps peeling off the roll very easily, especially at the start of the roll (even as shipped).



The rolls are sealed with a strongly adhesive, plastic, UPC bar-coded sticker strip similar to those used on genuine rolls. The paper surface more strongly bonds with the adhesive due to paper properties (thinner, with a lighter surface coating than on the genuine stamps). Strength of the adhesive on the strip makes it difficult to remove it without taking with it some of the first few stamps near or underneath it. On the \$1.30 roll, I found it impossible to remove the strip, despite being extremely careful, without thinning the small gutter end and one of the stamps on which the sticker is placed. The bar code from both rolls scan on Canada Post's computers the same as genuine rolls – on the \$1.30 it scans as a single stamp, while on the "P" roll it shows it as a full roll of 100 stamps.

The gutters on both values are taller than on genuine rolls, measuring 13mm vs. 8mm on genuine rolls. The rolls are also finished differently from the genuine ones – the start and end cuts in the gutter appear as a broad semi-arc, with valleys on the 'P' roll at the start and peaks at the end. This is reversed on the \$1.30 ends as shown.

The cardboard core that holds the strip of 100 or 50 stamps appears to be identical to those use on genuine rolls. The glue used to attach the end of each strip to the core is much weaker than on genuine rolls and the backing paper readily separate from the core. There is no security back-print on the stamp paper, most likely due to the paper not being the multiple-layer type with a water-soluble layer between the paper and the adhesive glue used by Lowe-Martin on genuine rolls to allow the stamps to float free in water. Each roll has numbering on the back of every fifth stamp indicating how many are left on the roll, identical to that used on genuine rolls.

Though the website advertises availability of other Canadian stamps (such as the \$2.71 coil roll and some Christmas stamps – in sheets, not booklets!), none are actually available for purchase.

The counterfeit stamps do not appear to be common, so it will be interesting how long they will be available and if they ever show up on mail. My purchase of these is strictly to document what format they were produced in and how they differ from their genuine counterparts, as well as for collector interest, and NOT for use on mail. I have enough mint discount postage to last me a lifetime for that!






ESG/BNAPS Publication Promotion

Canadian First Day Covers by Artopages, Gary Dickinson. Between 1967 and 1976, beginning with the Canadian Flag stamp of January 1967 and the Centennials and continuing until the Montreal Olympics stamps of 1976, a partnership of an artist / designer and an entrepreneur interested in first day covers who had a small printing press \$27.00 \$15.00 in his basement combined to produce 245 different First Day Covers for Canadian stamps of the period. The company was called Artopage Covers. Many of the FDCs featured the same stamp, but with colour differences in the FDC design. October 2021, Spiral bound, 62 pages, 8.5 × 11, colour.
