RCMP on Canadian Stamps

Over the years Canada has issued several stamps commemorating the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP). 2023 marks the 150th anniversary of the RCMP.



From the 1973 RCMP Centenary PS14 brochure:

On May 23, 1873, Sir John A. Macdonald made an historic announcement to the House of Commons: the formation of the North-West Mounted Police. It would be the task of this Force to police some 300,000 square miles of wilderness in the Canadian North-West, to suppress the whiskey trade, to calm the growing unrest among the Indians and, in general, to stamp out lawlessness in that vast territory. Fear of the Fenian raids from the south and the possibility of losing the West by default made it imperative that Canada quickly take official possession of the area.

July 1874 saw three hundred raw recruits under G. A. French, the first commissioner, set out from Dufferin, Manitoba, across the plains to Old Man's River in what is now southern Alberta. There they constructed Fort Macleod, named for the Assistant Commissioner. The rigorous trek, which is portrayed on the 80 stamp, revealed in the men a stamina that augured well. Within a very few months the Indians came to sense the meaning of the scarlet tunic and the motto it represented: "Maintiens le Droit", "Uphold the Right".

The North-West Mounted Police made an important contribution to the settlement of the West. The members of the Force soon found themselves in the roles of doctor, counsellor and friend to the influx of settlers that followed in their tracks. They were also called upon to prove themselves in dealing with Sitting Bull, who had fled to Canada after his battle with Custer, in the skirmishes of the North West Rebellion, and in the stampede of prospectors to the Yukon during the Gold Rush.

In 1904 the Force became the Royal North-West Mounted Police and in 1920 the Royal Canadian Mounted Police received its present name.

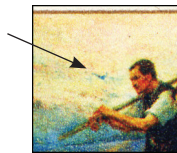

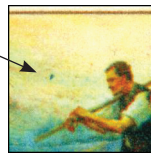
1969 Suzor-Côté (Scott 492)

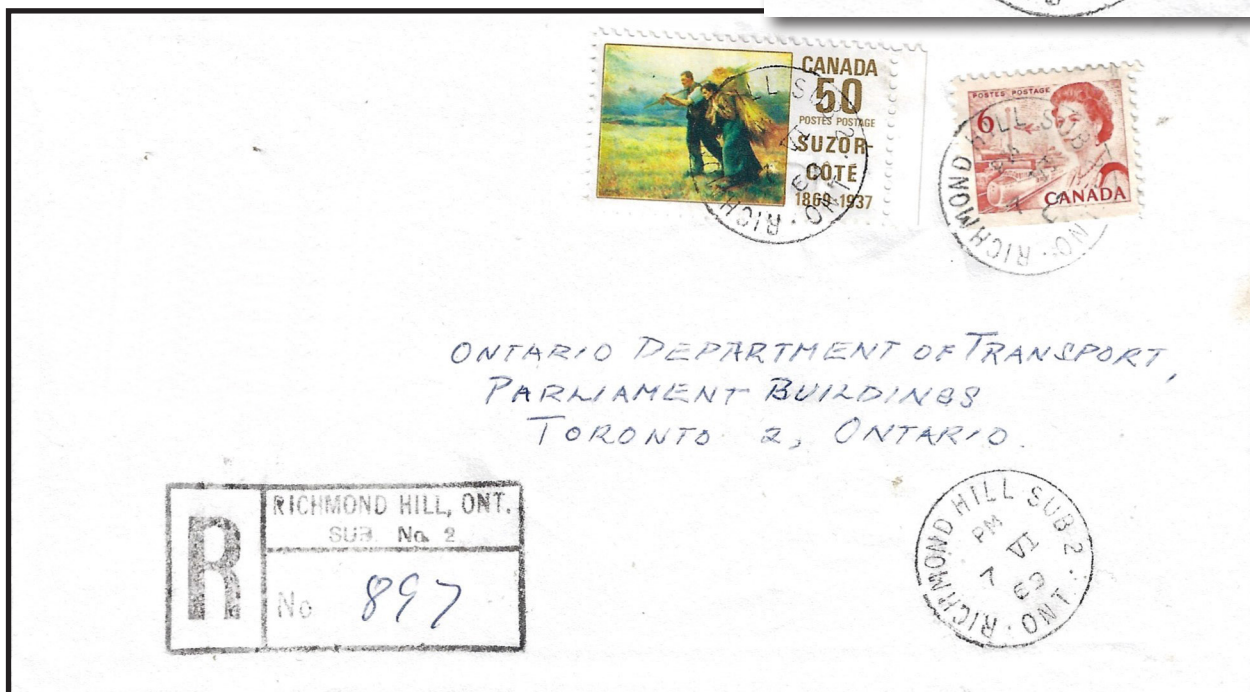

Articles Urgently Needed

New Stamp Issue Posters Inserted in Prepacks of Philatelic Panes, 1974 to 1978

In a letter dated February, 1974, Harold A. Nightingale, Director of Postage and Retail Products at Canada Post, announced to customers of the Philatelic Service a “Statement of Public Policy on Philatelic and Retail Product Sales and Services – 18 January 1974”.

Effective 1 February 1974: “1. Stamps will be sold at all philatelic counters as sheets, plate block sets, and combination or set singles in a prepackaged format for customer convenience and to protect the product quality.” and “There will be no additional charge for prepackaged stamps.”¹

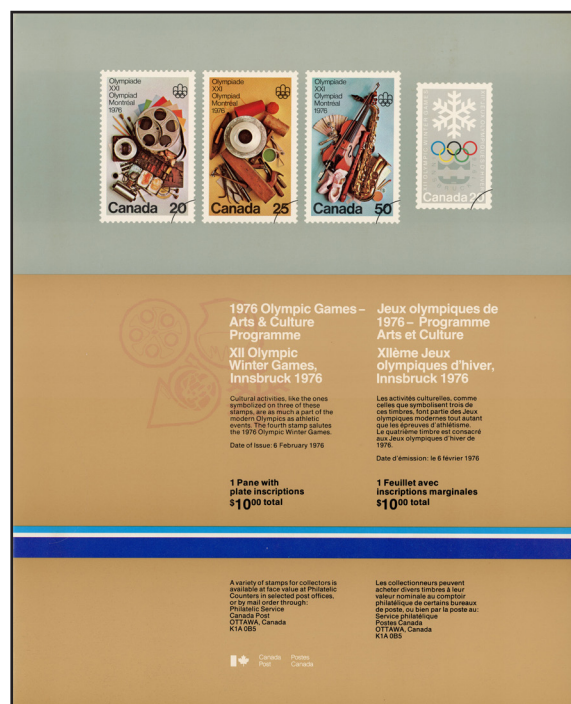
The first stamp issue where philatelic panes and sets of four corner blocks were prepackaged was the Indians of the Pacific Coast – Graphic Symbolism and Dress of 22 February 1974.

The 8¢ and 15¢ 1976 Olympic Games stamp issue of 20 September 1973 was prepackaged the following year as one of the “Special Olympic Products”.²

Prepackaged philatelic panes are heat sealed in clear plastic and include one pane with plate or inscription corners and a poster that complement the pane backed by cardboard.

The poster is nearly identical to the one displayed in the lobby of a post office except the addition of “1 Pane with / plate inscriptions / \$x total” in both official languages. The size of the poster is often based on the size of the philatelic pane and vary widely from 7” x 10.25” to 10.5” x 13”.

Over a span of five years, 1974 to 1978, 71 different posters were produced. Include 46 more posters with differences in the pane price – that is a total of 117 posters to collect.

Dear Customer,

For some time now, the Canada Post Office has been convinced that the philatelist should receive more attention, consideration, and service than was possible under our old organization.

As a first step toward that end, all activities related to philately were brought together in one new branch "Postage and Retail Products", last May 1st.

One of the most important results of our studies of Collector's needs, has been a decision to implement important policy changes in our Philatelic Services.

Below is a summary of these policy changes.

STATEMENT OF PUBLIC POLICY ON
PHILATELIC AND RETAIL PRODUCT SALES
AND SERVICES - 18 JANUARY 1974

Effective 1 February 1974, the Canada Post Office will implement the following policies with respect to its philatelic and retail product sales and services:

1. Stamps will be sold at all philatelic counters as sheets, plate block sets, and combination or set singles in a prepackaged format for customer convenience and to protect the product quality. Single plate blocks and single stamps may still be purchased at philatelic counters - but these will not carry the protective packaging. There will be no additional charge for prepackaged stamps.

Stamps ordered by mail will also be prepackaged with the exception of bulk orders from dealers.

Except for plate blocks, orders for stamps from specific locations on a sheet cannot be filled.

Both Blank and Inscription Sheets and Blocks are available by mail order.

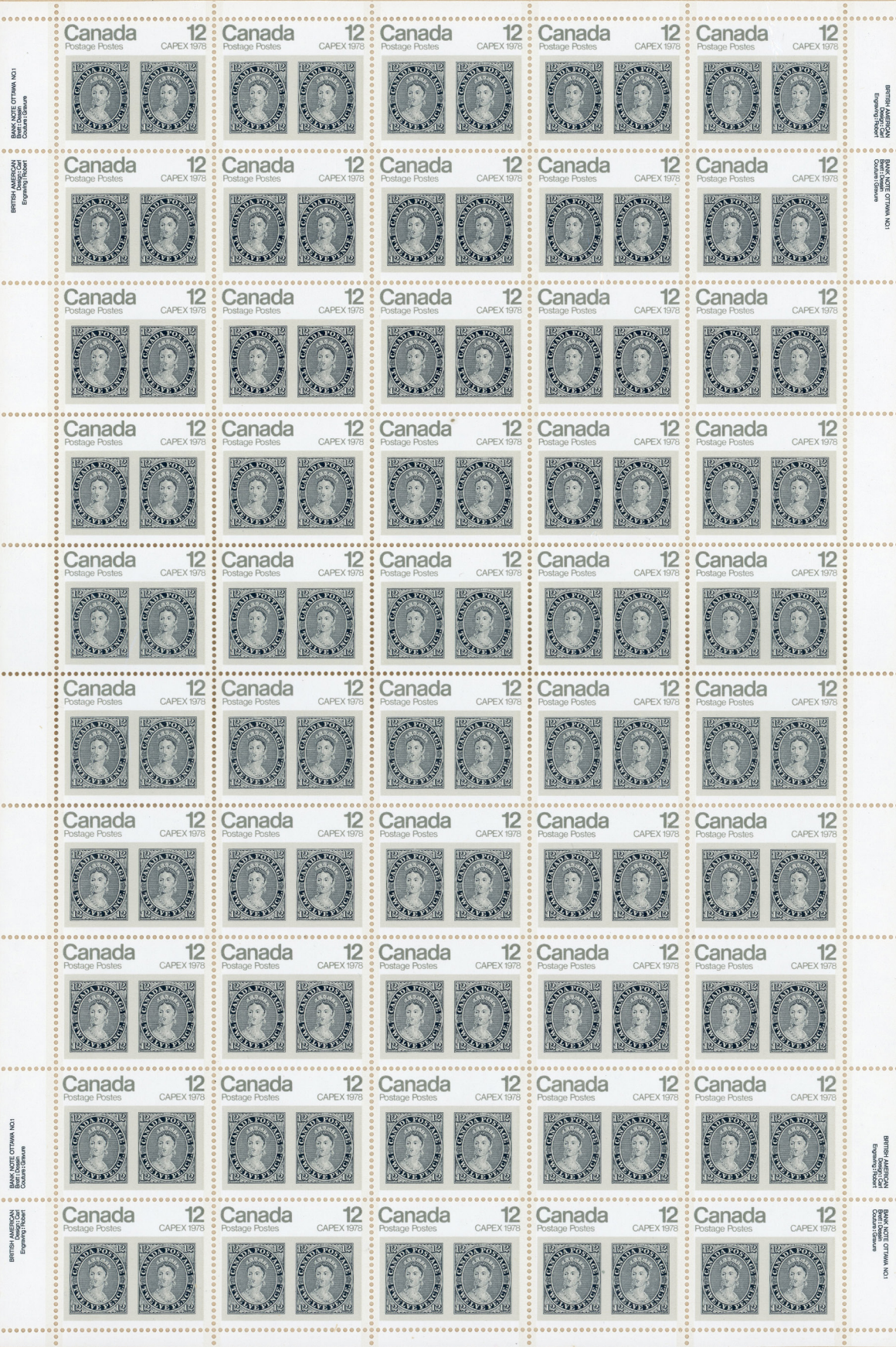

Beneficial Insects – Issue Recap

Sometime in 2022 Canada Post announced (very quietly, I believe...) that there will be no more reprints of low value definitives, that existing stocks will be used up, but then point-of-sale postage labels will be used for any postage deficiencies that cannot be made up with mint stamps (no more low values!). Many post offices now have only small amounts of some of the low value Beneficial Insects left for use, and a number of values are typically sold out.

This makes it a good time to recap the issue and the various printings that have been made since the first release of these in 2007. The table on the next page summarizes the values and their properties – some are identified in the Unitrade catalogue and some are not (there is a practical limit...).

Some years ago it was pointed out to me by ‘a person in the know’ that when a printer is asked to do a definitive stamp reprint, they do not necessarily use the old digital computer file for setting up the new print run. Instead, Canada Post often supplies them with a new file to use. Presumably this allows Canada Post to make any small tweaks and corrections to the file and the stamps they deem appropriate (without having to flag it as a new printing for collectors as they used to). Such has happened in this series several times, though there was no public mention of it in most cases. The 3¢ value was originally released with flaws on four of the stamps in a sheet (#2235a; Figure 1) - this was later corrected in the digital file, announced, and the stamp reprinted.

Shortly after the first set was released, there was talk that the actual panes of 50 were produced from the combination press sheet rather than press sheets of a single value. This cannot be proven as quantities of definitive issues are never released by Canada Post due to ‘continuous printing’. It makes sense that any reprints would have come from press sheets that contained a single value.

During the use of this set, Coated Papers changed the gum on the stamp paper from the standard green-blue to transparent (white). Reprints of all values except the 1¢ appeared on the new paper. The later 2010-added values were only produced with the white gum, though an associated souvenir sheet was still on the original paper with green-blue gum (#2410a; hence only singles exist).

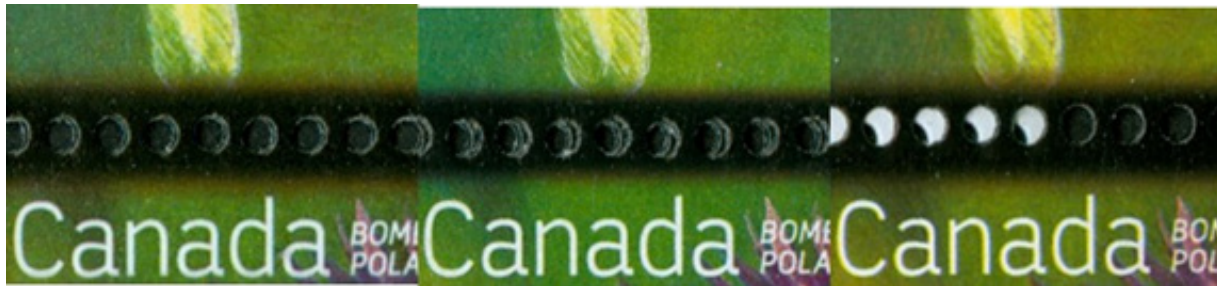


Figure 3: 5¢ printings – border thickness

As noted above, and forming the crux of this article, several reprints were issued that were not announced but that result in collectible and distinct versions from the original stamps. Let’s start with the 5¢ value as shown in Figures 2 and 3. There are three distinct printings (shown left to right), of which the middle one was not announced. It is differentiated from the others by the narrower black frame around each stamp, and the lack of shading on the bottom of the value ‘5’. It is still on the original green-blue gummed paper. It was available for a relatively short period of time, and then replaced by the white gum version of the stamp in 2015.

The same occurred on the 10¢ value, though there were four distinct printings (from left to right):

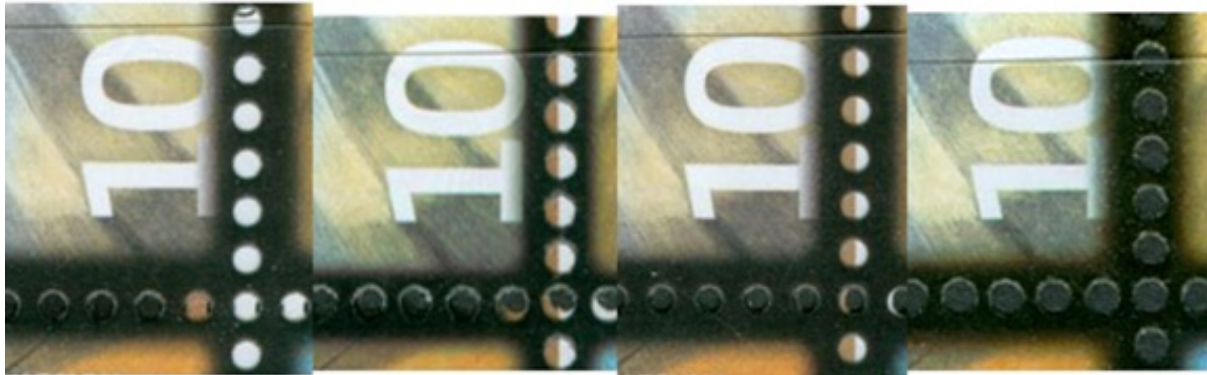


Figure 4: 10¢ printing comparisons

In this case, the second printing had the thin black border and a mostly unshaded 10¢ value at bottom. Both the first and second printings were on the green-blue gum paper. A later CBN reprint on white gum, and then by Lowe Martin, were back to the thicker border and shaded values, though there is a small colour difference in the shading (pinkish on CBN vs. bluish on L-M as seen in the photo). The L-M printing seems to be particularly difficult to find.

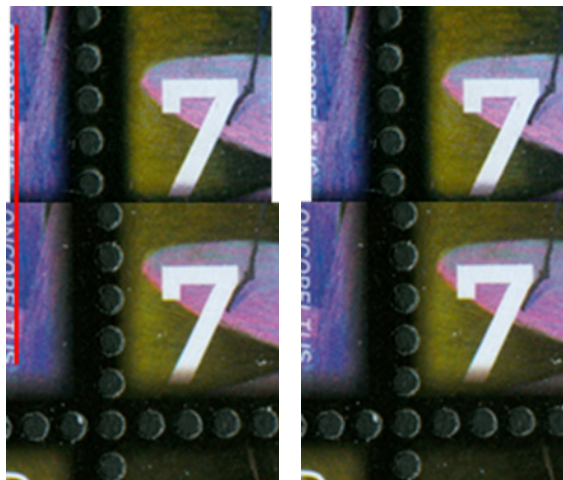


Figure 5: 7¢ printing differences - left aligned to text; right aligned to left edge of border

There has also been some discussion on whether the 7¢ value had been reprinted. Figure 5 shows my reason for saying yes, and you can create your own opinion (please let us know!). In both images the top picture is the original printing; the bottom one is the reprint. Notice that in the left image pair the text at left is aligned and the black frame is shifted in the reprint to right relative to the original printing, and is also thinner. This is further shown by the image at right which shows both printings aligned to the left of the black border and which clearly shows the thinner nature of the border in the reprint. Though not shown, the same is valid for the horizontal border lines. In this case the 7¢ value shading is the same on both printings.

The same occurs on the 2¢ value. Figure 6 shows the original printing at top and the reprint (on white gum) at bottom. There is a shading difference on the bottom of the 2¢ value between the printings, as well as thickness of the border (again, same applies on the horizontal border):

The 3¢ value went through the same kind of reprints – the ‘corrected’ version with green-blue gum also has a thinner black border on the stamps and a slightly less shaded 3¢ value at bottom (not as distinct as on the other values – Figure 7).

The 25¢ value was reprinted on paper with white gum, but there are no appreciable differences between the printings – perhaps due to the black design of the edges of the actual stamp making it difficult to clearly see the black border.

The remaining values were not reprinted, to my knowledge. The 22¢ value was a single printing as a make-up value to assist with the large first-class rate change in 2014 from 63¢ to 85¢. The others were printed on paper with white gum and further printings were likely not required.

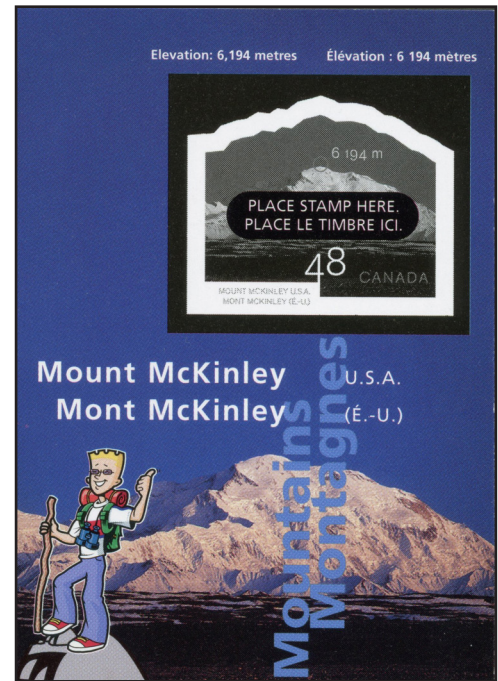
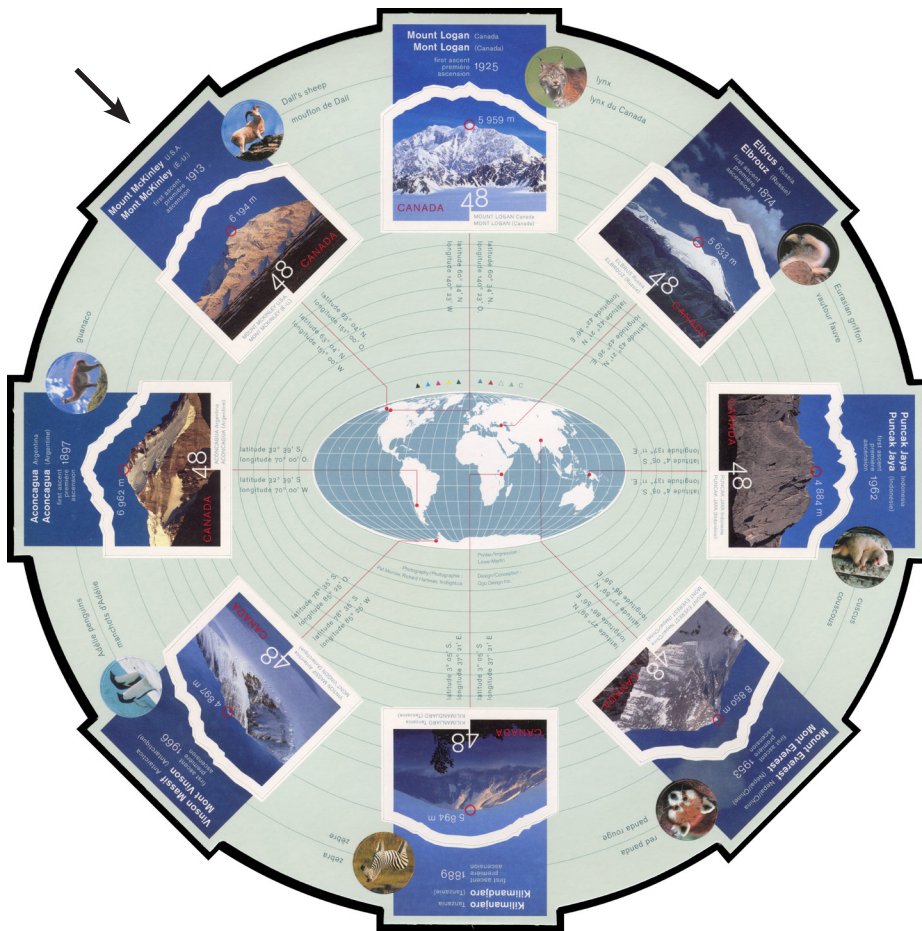
The three souvenir sheets issued as part of this set (#2238a, 2409b, 2410a) were only printed once as souvenir articles.
