Editor's Column Roy Sass



The Mystery of the Cross Border Cover - Where Was It Mailed?



This cover is from Christie's Ishikawa sale of 1993. The lot was estimated at \$2,000 to \$3,000 and sold for \$5980. (The catalog description is on page 2.) The question is whether this is a legitimate double franking, mailed in Canada, or is it the result of the mailer's change of mind or circumstance. Did he go to (probably) Boston and affix US stamps and then post it to England?

Note that the Canadian stamps are not cancelled. This was rare in Canada at the time. Have you ever seen a Canadian Small Queen go through the mail without some kind of cancellation?

The red circular mark that ties one of the Small Queens was probably a Boston (?) transit mark. Have you ever seen that kind of mark on a Small Queen cancelled in Canada?

The rate to England from Canada at the time was six cents. Therefore if the letter was posted in Canada, there would have been no need for US postage, even if the mails had carried the letter through the US.

There are no markings on the letter to indicate it origi-

nated in Canada - only the stamps.

The letter rate from the US to England was also six cents. The US stamps were cancelled in the US. One could deduce that the letter was mailed from the US and not from Canada. The mailer could have changed his mind about mailing it in Canada or perhaps forgot it in his folio when traveling to the US, so it was mailed in the US.

What do you think? Have you seen any other mixed franking covers where the Canadian stamps were not cancelled, but the US stamps were? Please send any comments to the editor for inclusion in the next newsletter.

Questions and Answers

QUESTION: The catalogs have the color of the main listing for the 8c Small Queen as grey. The 5c Small Queen, Ottawa, Scott 42, is also listed as grey. Is it the same grey as the 8c?

ANSWER: The 5c color is actually a brownish grey, as listed in the Gibbons catalog.

QUESTION: For the Half-Cent Large Queen, what are the paper and perf combinations?

Not counting the differences in shades between intense black, black, and grey black, the editor has seen:

Perf?x?,	Bothwell watermarked,

Perf 11.9x11.9,	Soft, white, Duckworth Paper 8
Perf 11.9x11.9,	Stout wove, Duckworth paper 10
Perf 11.75x12.1,	Stout wove, Duckworth Paper 10
Perf 11.6x11.9,	Medium, Montreal printing

Mystery of the Cross Border Cover The Christie's Catalog Description

Lot 634 **3c Ultramarine** (114), average horizontal pair. left stamp with trimmed perfs at left prior to use, used with **Canada 3c Dull Rose** (37a, Gibbons 64c), horizontal pair on 1870 cover which **originated in Canada** to London, England. US stamps tied by bold circle of wedges cancel, both pairs tied by indistinct red Boston exchange credit handstamp, red London transit, stamps have faults from overlapping cover edge, cover opened three sides.

A VERY FINE AND SCARCE LEGITIMATE COMBINATION FRANKING, THE CANADIAN STAMPS PAY THE SIX-CENT RATE TO THE UNITED STATES, THE UNITED STATES STAMPS PAY THE FURTHER SIX-CENT RATE TO ENGLAND.

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My Favorite Cover by Roy Sass

My favorite cover is my only cover. It is franked with six copies of the Half Cent Small Queen and was mailed from Quebec to Syracuse, New York on April 4, 1894. The cover shows a backstamp from Ogdensburg, New York April 24, 1894 at 8 AM. It was received in Syracuse later on April 24.

What makes this interesting? For me it is interesting because I grew up in Syracuse, leaving for California some 30 years ago. It's also interesting because the address was in my old neighborhood, and I

think I remember there being a family named Gerst still in the area. Was this sent to one of their ancestors?

The cover crossed the border at least three times that I know of. The original posting, of course, and then it made its way back to Canada, showing up in a recent Ian Kimmerly auction. Then it came back across when it was sent to me.

Thus, it is a cover that is part of my collecting interests and a link back to my youth, which makes it my favorite cover.
