"Several months ago, I completed a set of the 3¢ according to Shoemaker's classes. Now I am looking for someone who has done the same to compare results.

In the next issue of the Newsletter, would you insert a note to the effect that I have done so and would like to correspond with others to compare results.

Still working on the article on the 10¢ Small Queen. We have some problems to iron out, one of which is what names do we call the various shades and colors. As you may realize, color perception differs from person to person. The other problem lies in choosing a color standard easily available to the average leader. I started using Stanley Gibbons Stamp Colour Key which contains 200 colors. Some key similar to this was used by G. Whitworth in his article on the 10¢ value which appeared in Maple Leaves in 1975. I experienced great difficulty in following his colors. If anything, his colors were too extensive, is my thought at the moment.

Studd's article on the Small Queens is an excellent choice for reproduction."

"I was working on the 3c Small Queens last night using the Study Group Reprint of Shoemaker's article when I came across a couple of problems. On the assumption that these problems have not been brought to your attention, I am listing them below together with a couple of inconsistencies in Shoemaker's article which have been repeated:

Original Article Papers

Group F - Horizontal wave mesh

Reprint

Group F - Vertical wove mesh - aniline dye showing through

Should be horizontal mesh with analine dye showing through

Original Article Papers

Group H - vertical wove mesh - aniline dye showing through

Reprint

Group H - Horizontal wove mesh - no mention of aniline dye showing through

Should be vertical wove with aniline dye showing through

Class 9 - should be 11 3/4 x 11 3/4
Class 10 - part of description
missing

Class 11 - perf 11 3/4 x 12 Class 17 - description missing

Inconsistencies in Shoemaker article

Paper J. October 1895 - Paper J first shows up in Class #31 - Sept. 2, 1889. So I believe that the date should be changed to Sept. 2, 1889 (at least, see below, note on Class 27).

Paper F - Aniline dye should be added to description - at least all my F papers have the aniline showing through on the back.

Class 19 - Sept. 1882 - I think the 1882 may be a typo error and that it should read Sept. 1881. I have a copy dated in 1881 - month unknown.

Class 7 - Sec. 1873 - I suspect the 1873 is a typo error and that it should be Dec. 1872.

Questions on his classes.

Class 16 - Paper G - Perf 11 $3/4 \times 12$ Have a copy dated July '78 which perfs 12 x 12. This is the only vertical mesh dated '78 copy I have, so I don't know if the 11 $3/4 \times 12$ exists.

Class 27 - Paper F - Perf 12 x $12\frac{1}{4}$. Have a copy dated May 10 '88 perf. 12 x $12\frac{1}{4}$ which is a Paper J. It is definitely not a paper F. This is the only "88 dated copy I have other than the Rose Carmines. So I don't know if this is an odd ball or the norm.

I have long suspected Shoemaker's statement that the Carmine Roses were the first Ottawa printings isn't correct.

I haven't done any extensive perfing on the 3¢ except when I was trying to make up my study except for the one note on Class 16. Since on my worksheets I didn't note any other exceptions, I assume that I found no major exceptions to Shoemaker's statements. There are most likely 11.90s or 11.85s etc., as there are noted in my studies of the 6¢ and 10¢.

Would like to confirm my thoughts on Classes 16 and 27. So I would like to acquire 3 or 4 dated copies of '78, '88, late '81 and a few other years. So if you know where there are some copies around, I would sure like to acquire them."
