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Editor's Report:

It would be appreciated if you would take a few minutes and help make sure that the list is as complete as possible.

So far I have hopes that 1993 is going to be a banner year for our group. Don Blair has written me with some interesting thoughts on the strand of hair varieties - I hope to have them detailed for you in the next issue. Leonard Kruczynski has prepared a very interesting article on stamp colours for us. He has produced about 1/2 of the materials necessary and suggests that I should have the rest before too long. Since <u>the article includes a colour chart</u>, we are willing to be patient. Each colour swatch has to be individually glued to the page. It is a lot of work, but I am sure that the membership will be most grateful. (Leonard also tells me that a three cent colour chart is in the works as well. Time will tell.)

Again, this year I would like to thank those members who have seen fit to add that "something extra" to the group. The contributions that are made by the authors is obvious. In the last bulletin, I placed a picture and notes of a cover sent to me by Harry Lussey (Tiverton, Ont. 1887) In addition to neglecting to mention that Mr. Lussey sent me the cover, I forgot to point out the most important aspect of the cover. The $5 \notin$ RLS is shown used during the period where the domestic registration rate was $2 \notin$. An extremely rare (unique?) usage of the wrong denomination. Thank you, Mr. Lussey, and my apologies.

The 10 Cents Small Queen Precancels H. Reiche

Scott numbers 40, 40b, 45, 45a list various ten cents shades from the Montreal and Ottawa printings. Precancelled ten cents are scarce and many probably have only been printed in quantities of one hundred. Multiples of these are in a few collections but must be considered rare. The ten cents can be found double, double with one inverted, triple and many other forms. The key shades noted are the following for certain precancel styles:

Style A	Red Brown	Dull Rose
Style I	Red Brown	Dull Rose
Style J	Red Brown	Dull Rose

It is interesting that the first precancel style exists and then the later styles, with many of the intermediate styles of precancel not having been issued on the ten cents.

The Scott catalogue lists a number of other shades but none have turned up as precancel. The previous precancel catalogue once listed a pink shade, but no real pink shade has been seen and therefore this shade was deleted from the present catalogue. A stamp with a re-entry has been reported, but has not been seen.

MORE COMMENTS ON RE-ENTRIES - R.D.LEITH

In a letter from Mr. Ralph Trimble published in the Small Queen Newsletter (September 1992 Vol-17, #1,2) Mr. Trimble raises a number of re-entry questions. His first comment was regarding my use of the term "ETCH LINES" in a number of articles where I was referring to the impression left on the printing plate after a stamp image was rocked with a transfer roll. When I wrote the article, I also had concerns with this term, however, I never did replace the expression with more appropriate wording. Mr. Trimble is correct in his contention that Small Queen plates were not "ETCHED", implying an oil and acid process such as one would expect in a Lithography printing operation. To eliminate any potential misunderstanding, simply replace the words "ETCH LINES" in my articles by the phrase "IMPRESSION LINES".

The second question Mr. Trimble raises is that of plate burnishing prior to re-entry. The evidence I have used to conclude that plates appear to be burnished prior to re-entering is two-fold ...

- (a) There are many Small Queen printings where we note multiple position dots on the same stamp. If the position dots are offset, there is a strong possibility that the resulting transfer die impression would be offset by the same distance. Plates are removed from service long before the plate impression completely disappears, consequently, one would expect to find a distinct double impression (commonly referred to as a "double transfer") on these multiple position dot stamps. This is not the case with the Small Queen Issue where only a small number of double position dot stamps show any kind of re-entry, let alone a double transfer.
- (b) Considering all the reported Small Queen re-entered stamps, one usually notes doubling of a small segment of the design. It is typically along a portion of one of the borders, or maybe in a part of the lettering, or possibly on one of the corner ornaments. It is very rare to find a complete doubling of the design (double transfer) as would be the case on most re-entries had the remaining plate image **NOT** been burnished.

One could argue that the position dot offset described in "a" could be an individual plate maker technique and that the transfer die position was adjusted to fall directly over the old image. This argument cannot be used to explain the results in "b". The re-entry procedures certainly changed within the Small Queen period. The lower left position dot was replaced by a medallion position dot in the 1886 plates requiring a new reentry technique. In addition, there must have been new re-entry procedures initiated in 1893-1897 as magnificent examples of double transfers are noted for the first time on both the 2¢ and 3¢ stamps. It should also be noted that the Small Queen stamp printer (BABNCo) was replaced by a different printer (CBNCo) in 1898. There are bound to be differences in both plate making and re-entry procedures between the two companies. As a result, some of what is observed in the post 1898 stamp printings may not apply to the Small Queen Issue. For example, there is a higher incident of double transfers in the Numeral Issue stamps verses any of the Small Queen printings.

Mr. Trimble also states that it would be cheaper to replace a plate rather than burnish it prior to re-entry. On the contrary. Remember that the plates are smaller than a sheet of $8\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" letter paper, they are made of unhardened steel, and stamp impressions are very shallow. Consequently, it is a simple procedure using an abrasive metal polishing cloth to quickly remove most of the stamp impression from an already worn plate. After all, it takes less than 75,000 wipes with a soft felt pad to render a new plate surface unusable. Far less effort would be required using the proper abrasive cloth. In fact, it is likely easier and less expensive to scour an entire plate than to delicately burnish a single impression as would be the case when a faulty image requires repair.

The observations noted above are by no means intended to be the definitive explanation since much of what we know about the Small Queen printings has been the result of detective work by many students. There are bound to be diverse opinions. I insist on basing my beliefs on strong supporting evidence. I would hope other students use the same criteria when voicing an opinion.

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A Special Cover #7

A Mourning Cover from Winnipeg to England

The black border of this cover, shown below, says "mourning cover." This style was popularized by the black bordered stationery that Queen Victoria used after the death of her beloved Prince Albert. A black bordered envelope probably means mourning for a death and possibly the announcement of a death. This mourning cover carried the announcement of two deaths. The enclosure came with the cover. The letter, dated March 4, 1878, was written by a grieving mother. Of five children in the family, two, Rhoda 8 and George 2 had been killed by an epidemic of scarlet fever a few weeks earlier. Sometimes it's well for us to remember that the "good old days" were no picnic. Sometimes they were pretty terrible. The mother's word was "fearful." She used it three times in her 300 word note.

The cover itself deserves attention. In 1878 there was no Canadian railway connection with eastern Canada. The cover probably went from south to Pembina on the U.S. border and then through the U.S to Detroit. Re-entering Canada at Windsor, the cover was made up for mail to England at Hamilton. There is a HAMILTON, ONT. / MR 11 78 backstamp. Canada was not yet in the UPU. The 5¢ Small Queen paid the 5¢ preferred rate to England.

The Postal Arrangement of 1875 [1] included the provision, Article II:

Each country will transport the domestic mail of the other by its ordinary mail routes in closed pouches through its territories, free of charge.

Addressed to England, this cover was not Canadian domestic mail but it was to re-enter Canada. It may well have travelled with domestic mail in the same closed pouch. There is a good probability that the U.S. mail service carried this cover from Pembina to Detroit free.

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A Census of 10¢ Small Queen Covers

The Reports of the Postmaster General show that 4,277,450 10¢ Small Queens were issued to postmasters. This is a small amount, the smallest of any of the Small Queens. As a consequence, 10¢ Small Queen covers are relatively scarce. The table that follows is a preliminary stage of a census of the 10¢ Small Queen covers. Studies of U.S. covers of the 1869 issue show one or more covers for every 10,000 stamps issued. If that ratio applied to the 10¢ Small Queens, we could expect 428 covers. This present, preliminary census lists less than 250 10¢ Small Queen covers. Maybe there are another 200 or so 10¢ Small Queen covers hidden away, maybe.

If you have a 10¢ Small Queen cover that is not listed in this census or if you can fill in a blank in the listing (date, origin, destination) or if you can correct an error, I would like to hear from you. I ask your help. A photocopy of your cover would be ideal but a simple statement of date, stamps, town of origin and destination would suffice.

No covers will be identified by owner. It is expected that this census will eventually be published in Topics. At that time, there will be a paragraph of acknowledgement thanking, by name, all who have contributed to this census. Please help.
