Feedback: Cleaning the Muddy Waters

Several friends and study group members have commented on last issue's *Cleaning the Muddy Waters* article. I received notice from several readers that they would give the cleaning process a try on some of their less attractive copies. However, I have not received any scans or feedback on their success.

Arnie Janson was keen to try a more comprehensive treatment. He writes, "I was fascinated by your peroxide vapour treatment to restore the colour of the muddy water map stamps... What do you think of the idea of just resting the stamp on top of an open bottle of peroxide?" While this is certainly an option if the neck of your peroxide bottle is wide enough, it should be noted that the treatment described in the article is designed to give a very low dosage of diluted hydrogen peroxide solution. The mixture of fresh air with the fumes of the liquid allows for a very mild and even application. It is also worth noting Arnie's usage of the words "restore the colour". While the treated Map stamps do appear to revert to their original colour appearance, it is not certain that the ink characteristics have actually reverted to their previous chemical state. While the colour is restored, I cannot vouch for any restoration of the ink's original chemical composition.

Our study group Chairman, Rick Friesen, welcomed the article but also shared some concern about what is happening chemically with the ink and the paper of the stamp or cover. He writes, "I don't like using any chemical, even with the fumigation method, to modify my stamps and covers. My reasoning - we don't know exactly what chemical processes are taking place and the treatment with peroxide can potentially lead to an acidification of the stamp surface. I have no idea what that acid can or will do to the stamp upon long term storage, so I'd rather not play with fire." I fully appreciate Rick's concern with these types of chemical treatments, especially for expensive material. However, I must point out that hydrogen peroxide has for a long time been commonly used to treat stamps with so-called "oxidisation" problems (the 3c Small Queen and 2c Registration stamps come to mind). I believe we would have heard by now if there were any long-term ill effects. However, given that no studies have been published on the long-term effects of this process and that I am not a chemical scientist, I again encourage readers to exercise caution.

Finally, Ronald Majors wrote to say that he had come across another relevant article by one of the authors who was cited in the original references of my article. The short but technical Canadian Philatelist article by Dr. John E. Milks provides some additional information about the chemistry of the muddy waters discolouration and its treatment with hydrogen peroxide. The article is available from the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada website.

In closing, I invite any members who have tried the hydrogen peroxide treatment of their Map stamps to provide some before-and-after scans showing their results.



Map Stamp Covers Postmarked December 7, 1898

On December 2, 1898, the Deputy Postmaster General announced that the 2¢ Map stamp was available and authorized its use for the prepayment of postage.¹ However, no Map stamp covers are documented until several days after this announcement. The earliest date recorded on a Map stamp cover is claimed to be December 6, 1898. The stamp is found on a mixed franking 8¢ registered cover, possibly philatelic, with St. Hyacinthe squared circle canceling and dispatch (on the back) postmarks dated AM/DE 6/98, and a Montreal barred circle backstamp receiver dated DE 6 P11/98.² The images of this cover in the PHSC Journal (see Figure 1) are very poor and the cover has not otherwise been documented in the philatelic literature or at auction. Until a better image is available to verify the claim, the dates on the postmarks of this Map stamp cover remain questionable.

The earliest confirmed date of use of a Map stamp is December 7, 1898, and postmarks from 6 cities are claimed to have been identified on this date.³ I have compiled a census of December 7, 1898, Map stamp covers from the philatelic literature, auction catalogues and on-line auctions. The 13 covers that I have recorded are listed in the Census Table, and include covers from Hamilton (1), Montreal (3), Ottawa (4), and Toronto (5). I have not documented covers originating from either Bridgewater or Kingston, although off-cover Map stamps with cancellations on this date are claimed (in the case of Bridgewater)³ or documented (in the case of Kingston)⁴ to exist. There is also a cover bearing a faked RPO cancel on this date (see Census Table, last entry). The majority of the documented covers (7/13) are drop letters in cities that had letter carrier service in December 1898. Since the drop letter rate for this service was 2¢ per oz., the requisite postage could be paid with a single Map stamp. One of these drop letter covers was sent special delivery and bears an additional 10¢ Special Delivery stamp (E1). The remainder of the covers exhibit varied rates/destinations including a 2¢ UPU post card rate to England, a 5¢ UPU rate to England on uprated EN9 postal stationery, three covers to the USA (one of which is a 12¢ quadruple weight rate and bears 6 Map stamps), and a domestic 3¢ rate.

The most recent addition to this list is a previously unreported patriotic cover front that was offered for sale recently on eBay (Figure 2) and now resides in my collection. I don't believe that the seller realized what he had in his possession since it was offered for sale along with an Admiral cover and the lot listing was titled "1898-1926 CANADA AD COVERS! US/CANADA PATRIOTIC + ALLOVER OTTAWA ONTARIO L@@K!". No mention was made of the rare December 7, 1898, cancellation date on the Map stamp (from plate position 1A31) cover. Although it is only a cover front and is in somewhat ratty condition, the combination franking exists on a pretty J.C. Wilson patriotic envelope (Anglo-Saxon WLS-E06). The addressee is hilariously identified as a fellow "Stamp Crank" (stamp collector) and "Kamera Fiend" (photographer)!





A Look at an Old-Time Map Collection


Earlier this year, BNAPS Past-President Ronald E. Majors was kind enough to share scans from a Map collection he purchased about a decade ago from stamp dealer Irwin Weinberg. In his price list description, Weinberg stated that the collection was created "more than 50 years ago". So, it is a nice example of an old-time collection that was probably assembled in the 1950's or even earlier before any of the significant Map Stamp literature was available. Below are some thumbnails showing typical pages from the collection followed by some close-ups that highlight interesting details.
























The collection highlights the theme of the Map Stamp as a Christmas stamp in several areas. Most of the pages have a heading at the top that reads "1898 – CHRISTMAS DAY – 1898". This section of one of the title pages shows an incredible pen and ink drawing of Christmas carolers accented with colour and painted white snow over the grey album page.




In addition to the hand lettering that appears throughout the collection, the various mounted stamps and covers are also adorned with attractive hand-drawn frames with occasional detailed ornamentation or an illustration of a plate variety.




The description of this collection from Weinberg also stated that it included "Progressive Proofs showing the stamp as it would have looked, as each of the colors had been added." The relevant page, shown below, describing the multi-colored printing process, clearly shows the collector's own "sketches" and not true progressive printing proofs. The order of printing for the various colours shown on the page agrees with current thinking on how the stamp was produced. On another page, the text of the collection also correctly states that the coloured parts of the stamp were printed using typography instead of lithography which many people mistakenly believed for almost half a century after the stamp was released. Note also how the registration of the colours is described as somewhat "SLOPPY".



Many red plate varieties including misplaced, missing, or extra islands are described in the text but are not plated. Interestingly, several white "patches" or "spots" caused by misregistration of the colored plates during printing are also included among the plate "varieties" even though elsewhere the text recognises that these are caused by the somewhat sloppy registration.







The collection also showcases a variety of cancellations plus a nice example of a non-postal stamp used to publicise the Pan-American Exposition of 1901 that is clearly based on the Canadian Map Stamp.





Most of these old-time collections have been broken up and sold as separate items many years ago. So, a big thank-you to Ron for keeping this one intact and sharing with us.


Remembering Ralph E. Trimble

I was very saddened to learn of the passing of Ralph E. Trimble earlier this year. Ralph was a giant in the research aspects of Canadian philately. His skills in close-up photography and his many writings have contributed in an unmatched manner to the documentation, understanding, and popularization of re-entry collecting of Canadian stamps. Like his mentor, Hans Reiche, Ralph's published contributions have become a permanent thread in the fabric of our history and understanding of Canadian stamp production.

Ralph was initially interested in Canadian coins with irregularities and multiple strikes. This interest led him to collect and research stamp reentries. His association with BNAPS runs very deep. He has had numerous articles published in BNA Topics but is best known as the founder of the BNAPS Re-entry Study Group where he served as chairman, editor, and principal writer of their newsletter for sixteen years.

Ralph was also a member and contributor to numerous other philatelic organizations and societies. He served as an editorial associate for the Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian



Stamps and as a director and member of the expertizing committee of the Vincent Graves Greene Philatelic Research Foundation.

For more than 20 years, his website, re-entries.com, has remained the go-to destination for information and visual references for Canadian and even international re-entries. His site was the inspiration for my own website of Canadian constant plate varieties, flyspecker.com. Although I never had the pleasure of meeting Ralph in person, I have spoken to him by phone and shared many email conversations with him over the years. He was always generous in answering my questions or accepting information, stamp scans, or eBay auction tips that I shared with him.

What many people may not know about Ralph is that he was a very enthusiastic Map stamp collector. He was a member of our study group and shared with me that the Maps were one of his favourite issues, the largest part of his collection, and that he had studied them in detail for many years. On his website, he mentions that the well-known major Map reentry from 5B91 is "probably my very favourite re-entry of all time". Following Whitney L. Bradley's initial documentation of the rare black plate 4 Map proof at the National Archives of Canada, Ralph was the first person to photograph and publish details of some of the major plate varieties from than unissued plate.

Before writing my article in the last Map Stamp Report about treating Map stamps with hydrogen peroxide to restore the colour of "muddy waters" discolouration, Ralph had shared with me his success in restoring some of his mint copies by applying the solution directly to the surface of the stamps with a Q-tip. He also shared my opinion that muddy waters Maps were colour changelings that should not be treated as premium-priced collectible varieties.

One of the funniest email conversations I had with Ralph was back in 2018 when I shared a scan of a very strange imperforate Map pair offered by a dealer. I felt that the plate positions did not make sense and that they could not exist adjacently in a pair block. I expressed my concerns to Ralph who shared my confusion. His email reply said, "You have just about blown my mind with this pair!!! I have examined them and examined them, but I still can't wrap my head around how they can be so far off from what they should be!" He ended the email saying, "Ouch!.. My brain hurts!" and asked me to let him know if I found anything more about the pair. Thanks to Ken Pugh's later examination of the pair, I eventually learned that the pair of stamps was actually two separate imperforate stamps that had been deceptively joined and regummed. I let Ralph know so that both of our brains could rest easy!

I will remember Ralph as a dedicated philatelic researcher who thrived on sharing his knowledge with the Canadian stamp community. I will miss our phone and email conversations. Rest in peace my friend.
