<u>From Tony Thompson, FRPSL:</u> A short comment for the Newfoundland Newsletter. I was reading the first issue of 2025 and immediately noticed the relatively large size of the images showing all the details that the authors intended to show. Other publications all to often, shrink images so much that the salient features are almost impossible to see. Additionally, I see that the PDF is 3.1 mB for 16 pages – a relatively large file size that further supports high quality images. I assume that no one has problems downloading larger files any longer. <u>From Klaus Wehlt</u>: As is so often the case, I stumbled across an interesting newspaper article while looking for something completely different.

On June 11, 1886, the General Post Office published a notice that free delivery of letters and newspapers within the city limits of St. John's would be introduced with immediate effect. I assume that previously incoming mail and newspapers had to be collected from the post office. I have not found anything about this in the Newfoundland Almanac of 1886. If I remember correctly, I have found post office advertisements in much older newspapers listing unclaimed mail, but I didn't find anything right away.

Do you know how mail delivery was organized in St. John's before?

NOTICE! General Post Office. N and after this date there will be a FREE DE-LIVERY OF LETTERS AND PAPERS by Carriers throughout the City limits. Carriers are authorized to collect insufficiently-paid postage, and nothing further. The public are requested to have their correspondence hereafter addressed to their Street and Number, to facilitate the delivery. Poem Mail

I have owned this cover for a few years, mainly due to the marking "RETURNED/ FOR/ BETTER DIRECTION" – one of only three known examples. This fall, while researching another topic, I stumbled upon a notice in the 27th October 1938 Post Office Circular. Apparently, using a poem as an address was becoming enough of an issue to warrant an official mention and directions on handling.

Dated 19 October 1938, this cover makes me wonder: could it have been the catalyst for that notice? With no other markings or return address, and a vertical fold, the evidence suggests this letter was opened and returned inside a Dead Letter Office 'ambulance 'cover, in alignment with the instructions in the circular.

While finding Joe MacIsaac in Port au Port probably wasn't too hard, it seems the trend of poetic addresses had become a frustrating one for postal workers!




Figure 1: St Mary's postmark dated 19 October 1938 with the rare marking "RETURNED/ FOR/ BETTER DIRECTION." St Mary's is located on the Avalon Peninsula, about 100 km southwest of St. John's. The intended destination, Port au Port, is on Newfoundland's west coast, roughly 600 km away, perhaps underscoring the challenge for postal staff.

Insufficient and Improper Address

Several cases have come to notice recently of letters being accepted for despatch on which the address is shewn in verse form or in pictures. Such letters, if noticed by the Postmasters, should be refused and returned to the sender for better address. If such letters should happen to be placed in the drop box and the sender is unknown to the Postmaster, they should be forwarded immediately to the Dead Letter Office for disposal.
