From Graham Searle in the UK, Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain:


Malcolm,

I am just starting to put together some thoughts on the programme for our 2025 CPSGB Convention. We will be holding this year's event over Zoom in the week commencing 6 October, a couple of weeks after BNAPEX where Karen and I hope to attend. Using the Zoom format opens the door to a larger number of North American collectors being able to take part this year and to facilitate this I am planning to hold all the main philatelic displays in the evenings UK time.

Putting these factors together, I would love to get a few Zoom displays from Canadian or US based collectors whose material is rarely, if ever, seen over here.

I know that since the pandemic many collectors have become fairly expert in giving online displays over Zoom or Teams and I am guessing that many folks over your side of the pond have ready made displays they may have given to local or regional groups that have never had a showing over here.

The programme will include a range of different philatelic items including-



b) at least one evening devoted to members short displays (could be as little as 1 slide but think a max of 16 - so one frame or less). The idea here would be to get the widest possible mix of material and for those of you who have attended our, in person Conventions, this would be a digital version of the Members Sheets slot.

c) our usual one frame competition - open only to CPSGB members.

The April issue of Maple Leaves will include a call out for members to contribute under topics b) and c) above, including the usual Competition Entry Form.

As part of the programme of larger displays, I would very much like to have one on a Newfoundland topic and this is where you may be able to help me. Would you be able to point me in the direction of anyone on your side of the pond who might be able and willing to give either a larger display (as per a) above) or a short display (as per b) above) on any Newfoundland related topic. An idea of names and topics would be great. I can then follow up with some formal invites. Needless to say you are welcome to nominate yourself!!



A PUZZLING REGISTERED LETTER FROM 1933

The Sir Humphrey Gilbert issue is one of my favorite issues and since BNAPEX 2023 in Halifax I have been trying to build up a special collection to be able to show a three-frame exhibit one day. When a registered letter from Deer Lake to Gaultois / Hermitage Bay from 1935 franked with a 9c Sir Humphrey Gilbert issue was offered, I naturally jumped at the chance.

The letter would have been franked correctly with 9c, 4c domestic letter postage and 5c domestic registration fee. But there is still this puzzling manuscript mark "Via Toronto Canada" and the note "Tax 12 cts" at top left The back of the letter has neither postmarks nor other markings. We know that the stamps of the Sir Humphrey Gilbert issue were only sold at post office counters in 1933. However, they were still valid for postage after 1.1.1934, but an usage in 1935 is quite late.

The addressee Mr. Harold Garland does not tell me anything, but in the list compiled by T. R. Harris there is a Thomas Garland Jr. from Gaultois, coincidence? Why on earth would anyone send a letter from Deer Lake to Gaultois via Toronto in the late summer of 1935? There may have been a connection with the National Exhibition in Toronto, especially as the letter was probably philatelically influenced. However, I would have expected a note, e.g. "Via National Exhibition, Toronto Canada" or something similar.

A registered letter to Canada would have cost 10c, plus the postage for forwarding to Gaultois. I have no idea about the Canadian postage rules, would this be covered by 12c? So once again a tough nut to crack, but you know I love such covers. As always, I would be very happy to receive any hints that lead to the solution of my little puzzles.

Editor's Note: I attended a ZOOM session for the Small Queens Study Group at the recent BNAPS Virtual. Darin Cherniwchan chaired the meeting and showed many examples of similar lines in the margins of many small queen stamps. Klaus Wehlt also sent an example on a stamp from Denmark. The consensus from attendees was that the lines are likely plate scratches caused by cleaning of the plates by some form of abrasive, possibly like steel wool. We will likely hear more about this in the future. Any thoughts?

Canadian Army Post Offices Outside of Canada

In 1940 the Canadian Army supplied troops known as "W' Force, to Newfoundland and Labrador for local defense. CAPO No.1 operated in St. John's Newfoundland from 7th September 1941 to 31st January 1946 serving the "W" Force headquarters.

This cover dated 6th December 1941, is backstamped "The Sherbrooke Fusilier Regiment Orderly Room" and "Earl Grey Sask. 15th December 1941.


