NEW BOOKS :

Robert Pratt's long awaited book "The Nineteenth Century Postal History of Newfoundland" is out and it is weighty. It weights six pounds and costs accordingly. It has been published by the Collectors Club of New York and is priced at \$140.00 U.S. The BNAPS Handbook Department has made arrangements to offer a small quantity to BNAPS members at a discount. Check with the Handbook Department for details.

"Scott Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps" for 1987 has been released. It has a new larger format and about 100 more pages. The price is \$5.95. The introduction has been completely rewritten and for the first time it is expressly stated that the prices are in Canadian dollars. However a comparison with the Newfoundland section in the 1987 "Scott Standard Catalogue" shows the prices to be almost always identical. Since the Standard Catalogue is in U.S. dollars, there is bound to be some confusion here. Even though considerable improvements have been made to this edition, many more improvements are needed before it can be a true specialized catalogue especially in the Newfoundland section. For instance the Province of Canada and the Dominion of Canada stationery sections have been reworked, but there is still no Newfoundland stationery section. But for \$5.95, it is not a bad book.

TWENTIETH CENTURY POST OFFICES: In this issue we resume the listing of the dates of operation of the twentieth century Post Offices of Newfoundland. The following are Palmer Moffat's comments concerning the reporting of towns and postmarks.

<u>Corrections</u>: In the January/February 1986 newsletter (Newsletter No. 3), on page 2, in the paragraph on OUTPORT DATE STAMPS, under duplex types, LANCE BROOK should read LANCE COVE. On page 4, under DATA REQUESTED in item 2, change la to lb.

When reporting: It will be most helpful if you send information on all your strikes. Split circle Type la may be reported e.g. as TIZZARDS HR. N.D.B./ OC 8/ 18/ NEWF'D. For any

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other date stamp types, please send a photocopy, if possible, and with your interpretation of the date if it is not clear. This procedure will provide the data necessary to identify (1) alternate ways of spelling town names (e.g. Harbor, Harbour, HR.) (2) the presence or absence of a geographical location (e.g. BON., B.B., or nothing), and (3) early and late dates of use, etc.

If you have 20th Century Newfoundland material prior to 1 April 1949, your cooperation in furnishing this information is greatly appreciated.

NOTES ON THE LONG CORONATION ISSUE by C. A. Stillions

The perforation types of the long coronations are the easiest to understand and the easiest, in some respects, to obtain. Basically all values exist in all three perforations -- line 14.1, line 13.7 and comb 13.2 -- but not equally so. In the early 1950's, Marshall Kay (BNAPS #760) and some friends did a count of several thousand stamps in dealer stocks and came up with the following distribution:

Even though the sampling technique used by Marshall Kay and friends does introduce a substantial margin for error into the distribution, I have found general agreement with these percentages. The most common perforation is the line 13.7 and the next most common is the line 14.1. Except on the 3¢ Map, the comb perforation is almost always the scarcest. I have at least one example of each value in each perforation except for the comb perforated Dog. I have never seen an example of the comb perforated 14¢ Dog.


Tradition has it that Dan Meyerson found an example of this rarity. When a British stamp dealer doubted its existence and asked to see it, Dan sent it to him for examination. Soon thereafter a check for the stamp came in the mail for a sum hundreds of times its catalogue value. Dan did not really want to sell it, but for that much money he figured that he could find another example. Well he never did and no one on this side of the Atlantic has seen it since. With only one example reported, the 14¢ comb perforated Newfoundland Dog has to be the rarest of all Newfoundland stamps.

For a full discussion of the sampling and counting techniques used by Marshall Kay, see his article "Perforation Varieties in Some Later Newfoundland Issues" in the January 1953 issue of BNA Topics, volume 10, number 1 (whole no. 98), pages 23-6. Back issues of BNA Topics can be borrowed from the BNAPS Library.

On some values part-perforated varieties exist. The catalogues list seven values that exist part-perforated. However, they do not distinguish which are line perforated 13.7 and which are line perforated 14.1. Stanley Gibbons indicates that part-perforated comb perforated varieties exist, but I have never seen or heard of any examples. I have recorded the following part-perforated:

The catalogues list the 3¢ die I, the 3¢ die II and the 8¢ as existing in both vertically and horizontally imperforate between. I have yet to record a second part-perforate variety for these values. Also my records indicate that all horizontally imperforate between part-perforates are line perforated 13.7 and all vertically imperforate between part-perforates are line perforated 14.1. I am interested in hearing from any study group member who have part-perforate varieties for two reasons: (1) to develop an inventory, and (2) to determine if part-perforates exist in more than one gauge for any particular value.
