TWO CENTS KING GEORGE V OF AUGUST 1932 by C. A. Stillions

Recently sold at auction, this spectacular block of twenty (2 x 10) with the sixth stamp in both rows completely imperforate. In L.N. and M. Williams' book <u>Fundamentals of Philately</u>, a similar block of twenty is pictured. The Williams brothers explain it as an experiment in registering vertical comb perforations.

Comb perforating is when perforations are punched on three sides of a stamp at the same time. The pins which make the holes on two opposite sides of a stamps are aligned at right angles on a line of pins like widely spaced teeth of a comb; hence the name, comb perforation. The perforating pins are mounted in a machine that would advance the sheet of stamps after each vertical stroke of the perforating head. Thus two strokes of the perforating head is required to perforate all four sides of a stamp.

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This particular block was from a sheet used to adjust the amount of advance following each vertical stroke. The sheet was placed sideways under the single comb perforating head, which descended five times; the sheet was then removed, turned through 180 degrees, and again placed sideways under the perforating head which descended four times (or vice versa). The sequence of operations is proved by: (a) the imperforate sheet margins at left and right of the block of 20; (b) the perforation characteristic, the joined holes, that occurs between holes 8 and 9 from the bottom in the right half of the block, and between holes 8 and 9 from the top in the left half of the block; and (c)the absence of a line of vertical perforations at both the left and the right side of the center pair. NOTE: from an examination alone of the places where the rows of perforation apparently cross, and because of the encroachment of holes at those places, the perforation at first glance might be thought to be line; that it was not line in proved by the imperforate sheet margins. In my opinion this block is not the result of an experiment, but is a direct product of the production process. It was produced from a test of the perforating equiptment much the same way an engraver tests his work by taking prints from the die or a printer taking a proof impression to check the plate quality. Thus this can be called a perforation proof.

Since there are 100 stamps to the sheet (10 x 10), there can be 4 other blocks similar to this one. The curious thing about this block of twenty is that it is from the same position in the sheet as the block pictured by L. N. and M. Williams, rows 5 and 6 from the center of the sheet; but they are not the same block. In addition to these two blocks, I have recorded two additional blocks of twenty and a strip of ten. One is a top margin block of twenty from plate 4. I have always assumed that there was only one sheet and that the one illustrated by the Williams brothers was a 2cents green first issued on 15 August 1932, as the top block from plate 4 is green. Since the item is identified as "Newfoundland 1932 (1 Jan.) 2c" it could be the rose issue; but

that is doubtful as the catalogues only give one date for both stamps. None of the four blocks or the strip appear to be adjacent pieces. Therefore there have to be many more of these dramatic perforation proofs out there.



MEETING AT CHARLOTTETOWN

A meeting of the study group was held during the BNAPS convention in Charlottetown, P.E.I. The meeting was very well attended with seventeen people present. There were 11 members, 4 new members, and 2 visitors. We really filled the room. Jim Catterick, a visitor, reminded the group of the Newfoundland perfin survey the Perfin group is conducting. He requested that if you have not sent in your survey form, please do so, and to contact him if you need additional forms. After a short business meeting, John Walsh of St. John's presented a slide program on the plate number blocks of Newfoundland. John had a slide of almost all the known plus many unknown stamps with plate numbers. Some lively discussion of some of John's conclusions as to plate composition ensued. All in all John has put together quite a collection of plate number blocks without much assistance from the literature. He has an article scheduled for a coming issue of BNA TOPICS.
