# Errors in stamp design

**NEWFOUNDLAND: STRANGE SEAL** 





People thought the seal on the Newfoundland stamp (left) looked too much like a monster, so the design was revised (right). Actually, the original was a good likeness of a ringed seal.

Once again the Linn's editor of the "Errors in stamp design" column has gotten things screwed up with respect to Newfoundland stamp designs. Study group member Bob Pratt has taken Linn's to task again for not doing their home work. His points are as follows:

The seal pictured on both stamps is a member of the hair seal family, a harp seal or a hood seal. It is not a ringed seal. The one on the stamps is a harp seal as it does not have a "hood", a bladder-like flap on the head of the males.

A harp seal does NOT possess paws with claws or nails, appearing like a dog. It is equipped with flippers in lieu of front legs.

The stamp on the left (1865) was designed by a Mr. Pease of the American Bank Note Co., New York. He did not know what a seal looked like.

The stamp on the right (1880) was designed by an engraver, possibly Smilie, from the British American Bank Note Co. of Montreal. This engraver did know what a seal looked like.

The Pease seal was copied by Mr. Jeans, a well known British engraver, and was used by Perkins Bacon, London, on banknotes for one of the banks in the colony.

The American Bank Note Company also used its rendition of the seal on banknotes printed as late as 1880.

The Perkins Bacon 15¢ Newfoundland stamp from the 1932 issue, also shows a whitecoat harp seal, with proper flippers.

From all this it is quite apparent that the stamp on the right is the proper one, and is "a good likeness of a (Ringed?) harp seal", and not the other way around as indicated in the column.

### NEW PUBLICATIONS:

NEWFOUNDLAND SPECIALIZED STAMP CATALOGUE, 1988; John M. Walsh and John G. Butt; published by Walsh's Philatelic Service, 9 Guy Street, St. John's, Newfoundland CANADA AlB 1P4; 1988; soft cover; 70 pp.; price not known.

Just published by study group member, John Walsh, is a handy little booklet on the postage stamps, postal stationery, and revenue stamps of Newfoundland. While it is called a catalogue, it is actually a checklist because space is provided for checking off mint, used, or cover of each item, and prices are not provided. In this one place the authors have listed the postage stamps, postage due stamps, air mail stamps, first flight covers, post cards, envelopes, postal slogans, reply coupons, postage meters, perfins, inland revenue stamps, money order tax stamps,

customs duty stamps, war savings stamps, plate numbers, rates, and post offices. All these listings in one publication makes it a handy book, but the shortage of illustrations and the absence of a bibliography hurts its usefulness.

This book is very good for the novice to intermediate Newfoundland collector. But for the advanced Newfoundland collector, it will be of limited value -- there are too many errors and omissions. Under the first pence issue, stamps in black with no gum are listed as proofs. This is not completely true, they may be proofs or they may be trade samples depending on the paper. The 5¢ Caribou, die I, comb perforated stamps of Perkins Bacon and Waterlow are not listed at all (see BNA TOPICS, Mar/Apr 84, p33). The first day of issue of Perkins Bacon 4c Prince of Wales, rose lake, is 15 August 1932 not 24 July 1934 as listed. The two "Buy Goods Made in Newfoundland" slogan cancellations (see newsletter 9, Jan/Feb 87) are not identified. These are only a few of the errors and omissions found during the review. As one uses this book, more discrepancies will be found to frustrate the advanced collector. Hopefully the next edition will reduce the number of discrepancies. All-in-all it is a good little book for the beginning collector who has just started to specialize in the stamps and postal history of Newfoundland.

## OLD PUBLICATIONS:

A philatelic friend recently discovered this item while searching through the "New York Times" collection in the Library of Congress.

"FEMALE MAIL ROBBERS. -- A St. John's, N. F. correspondent of the Boston 'Journal' furnishes the particulars of a remarkable systematic mail robbery, which has just been brought to light in that city. It appears that money letters have often disappeared of late, among others a letter mailed by an editor from St. John's to Conception Bay. The editor finding that the Post Office authorities would not properly investigate the matter, appealed to the Governor, who immediately ordered an inquiry, which resulted in some extraordinary developments. It seems that Mrs. and Miss Shea, (wife and daughter of the Chief Clerk in the Post Office -- The Postmaster-General being absent in England, the Chief Clerk had charge of the office) and two servant girls who lived with them, made a practice of opening the letters whenever they wanted money, and appropriating the contents. If they found bills of exchange or foreign notes, they would destroy them. In one case, a widow woman, named Woods, met with a serious loss. Some of her friends in England sent her a £50 Bank of England note. Mrs. Shea, not being able to pass it, burnt it. Numerous other cases have come to light. The discovery created great excitement. The parties implicated being related to some high Government officials. The four females are imprisoned in the Penitentiary awaiting their trial." --25 February 1860.

This episode certainly explains why John Delaney came from outside the Post Office to succeed the ill William Solomon as Postmaster General and why Solomon's Chief Clerk, Martin Shea was not promoted.
