THE COLUMBIA AIR MAIL-SCARCE BUT NOT ELUSIVE

Among the treasures of philately are the Hawker, Martinsyde, De Pinedo, and Columbia air mails of Newfoundland. Of these, the Columbia is the most "common" with 300 copies issued (just four more than the De Pinedo, for purists). It was a fifty cent surcharge on the thirty-six cent value of the 1919 caribou issue - used in 1930 for a flight from Newfoundland to England on the Bellanca monoplane, "Miss Columbia."

Both Harmer and Lowe state that only 100 of the stamps were used on covers, with the others sold mint to the public. Boggs says 158 of the stamps were used on covers but this seems doubtful. Most copies that come to auction have not been used.

For a stamp of such limited creation, a lot are coming to auction now. Is someone "dumping" Columbias? Also, most of the recent sales involve well centered copies. Whereas most experts agree on the quantities made available by the GPO, and mint/used breakdown, there is a lot of confusion about the number of truly centered copies. Gary Lyon, and others have stated that only 10% of the 300, or 30, are well centered. Of the 13 stamps I have seen in sales recently (described later), eight are well-centered. The confusion probably stems from Bogg's description of centering in NEWFOUNDLAND AIR MAILS:

"The stamps given to the printer were often off-centre with the result that well-centered copies are rare. It is difficult to estimate the proportion of perfect specimens, but it seems evident that possibly 50 or 60 were good average copies, of which number not more than about 30 can be described as really well-centered."

Read the above more than once, please. What does Boggs mean by "perfect", "good average" and "really well-centered"? If he really means "perfect" than perhaps that solves the mystery and 30 would be right. Of the eight well centered stamps, I would describe five as very fine and three as extremely fine - including the UR and LR stamps of the block pictured. In other words, a good number may be VF but only 30 EF.

The block pictured is probably only one of two remaining. It was featured in the Firby auction of September 12, 1995 and did not sell although a bid for \$10,000 (U.S.)was entered. The block is now for sale in Canada for \$25,000 (all \$\$ prices at this point are in Canadian dollars). The stamps at UL and LL are unfortunate but the two at the right are outstanding, as I suggested earlier, with clear surcharges within the frame, another excellent quality.

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The chart below lists the details I have on eight Columbias that have come to auction in the first quarter of 1996. Undoubtably, others were also offered and I just didn't see the catalogues. In addition, Gary Lyons tells me he sold a VF (not EF!) used copy with a socked-on-nose Harbour Grace cancel for \$7500 in January in a retail transaction.

*Although these stamps commonly come with certificates, they are fairly easy to plate and forgeries don't plate: UL, defective serif, "A" of "MAIL"; UR, defective serif "A" of "ATLANTIC"; LL (bit harder) "t" of "September" directly under left stroke of "u" of "Columbia"; and LR, defective "1" in "1930", best seen at top.

**For those with good eyesight, this stamp is actually the LL of the block pictured on page 103 of Boggs' reference, 1984 edition. Charles Firby says the block was broken up some time ago.


The prices in the table include auction commissions, and the Canadian dollar is calculated at .72¢ to the U.S. dollar. Average sale price of mint copies was \$5300. How do the catalogue prices compare? Well, UNITRADE is too high with \$8,000 fine, \$12,000 VF and a 50% addition for NH. STANLEY GIBBONS comes in at approximatly \$9,000. SCOTT (1996) for F-VF is \$5555 and WALSH AND BUTT show it at \$5800 for"margins nearly equal on all sides. VF." The latter two are in the ballpark, but SCOTT is still somewhat low, if it anticipates such a price for "retail". Auctions realizations are typically lower than retail.

The VF/EF mint copies were all sold in United States and Canada. It could be conjectured that someone owned (owns ?) a quantity of Columbias. These are not the speculative items they once were. On a positive note, this small sampling of recent prices suggests a nice hinged copy of the Columbia can be purchased at auction \$4,000-\$5,000. Still a lot of money, but perhaps enough for that one big lifetime philatelic purchase!










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
