Dear *Horace*

I read with interest, in the recent Newfie Newsletter, your query about the use of the broken line device cancelling the adhesives on your registered cover.

Although I do not have a definitive answer to your question I do have a theory as to why and where it might have been applied.

I have a cover with a similar style obliterator, albeit 29 years later than yours. This is a 4c basic rate cover from St. John's East to U.S.A. You will see from the enclosed Xerox that 1 x 2c is tied by the St. John's East slogan machine cancel, whilst the second 2c is tied by a straightline bar toothed device. The obliterator on my cover appears to have been manually applied, whilst yours seems to have been machine cancelled.

My theory as to the use of this type of device is that when the cover was received at the St. John's main sorting office it was noted that the second 2c stamp had not been cancelled. Rather than use a pen cancel, the toothed obliterator was used to deface the stamp.

Might not a similar process have been followed with your cover? I can accept that such a device could have been used at any point your cover was handled in Newfoundland, but if it was machine applied, St. John's main sorting office could be the most likely place.

Anyway, quite thought provoking.

I hope you do not mind me writing to you informally.

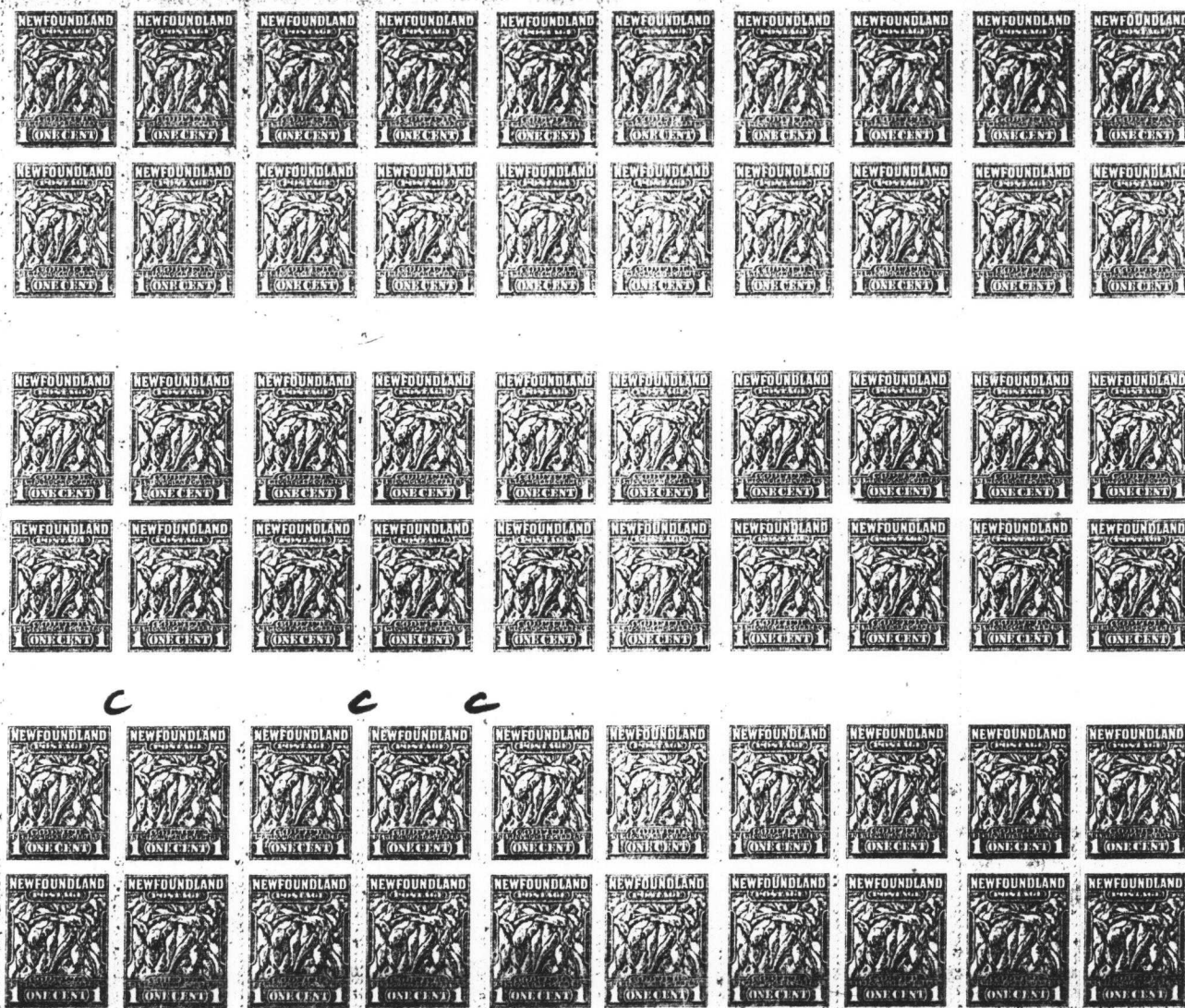
Springtime in Paris, 1947. As the world emerges from the effects of the most destructive war in history, its nations are rebuilding and attempting to normalize relations. Representatives of the world's postal administrations met for the 12th Congress of the Universal Postal Union. This was the first Congress since the pre-war 1939 Congress in Buenos Aires. A tradition of the Congress was the exchange of philatelic souvenirs among the delegates. These were usually small booklets containing some of the stamps issued by the delegate's country. Newfoundland prepared a booklet, measuring 205mm x 175mm, and bound in fine blue calfskin. Stamped in gold on the cover is:

NEWFOUNDLAND
INTERNATIONAL POSTAL UNION CONGRESS
PARIS May 1947

The inside of the booklet contains only one page, a glassine interleaf. The fourteen values of the 1941-1944 definitive set from 1¢ to 48¢ along with the 7¢ air mail and the 30¢ Memorial University commemorative are affixed in frames printed on the inside front and back covers.







As a follow-up to query in Newsletter No.60 about the sheet format of the imperf horizontal 1c codfish green of the 1932 Resources Issue, I have been successful in researching the answer myself.

Associated is a reduced size Xerox of a complete sheet of 60 of this issue, with a number of varieties shown as follows:

- A. Imperf horizontal rows.
- B. Double perforated bottom row.
- C. Double perforated vertical rows.

A quick reference to the copy of my pair in Newsletter No.60 will show that its likely sheet position is the centre two rows right marginal pair. Positions 3/10 and 4/10.

These sheets were produced for Booklet No.2 which contained a pane of 4 (Sc183a), plus 2c rose (Sc185a x 3 panes) and 3c orange-brown (Sc187c). The sheet would have provided 15 panes of 4.

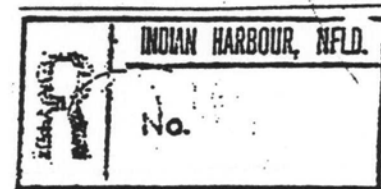

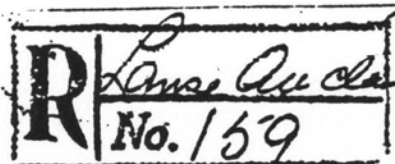
