The illustrated photograph and text is of a postcard sent from, I believe Springdale Green Bay, via Notre Dame Bay TPO to St.John's and hence to Whitby Yorkshire England.

The broken circle hammer tying the 2c stamp to the postcard is partial and I can only make out the letters SPRI of the post-town. Checking through the Walsh and Butt Catalogue leads me to believe it can only be Springdale.

An interesting feature of the postcard, apart from its postal markings, is the group photograph of members of the "Epworth League" at Carbonear.

Can anyone enlighten me, through the medium of the newsletter, what the "Epworth League" was all about and is it still in existence today.

THE 1920 2¢ ON 30 ¢ SLATE

SOME QUESTIONS RAISED

The September, 1920 shortage of low value Caribou's led to the need for a number of provisionals, among them a 2-cent surcharge on the 30¢ Cabot.This is SCOTT #127 or NSSC #125. This article is not intended to detail all the varieties of this stamp, but merely raise several questions.

Could someone provide me a photo or Xerox of NSSC 125b? This first question may be easy ---Harry Huber says one block of 25 was misfed resulting in a diagonal overprint. SCOTT and GIBBONS do not list it nor does Robson Lowe comment on it, but John Butt and John Walsh do list it in NSSC at \$120 mint with no listing as used. I have been searching for a photo of this variety for some time.

Huber also reported that two blocks of 25 (or 50) exist with the surcharge inverted, and this item is frequently seen in auctions. In December of 1995, Eastern Auctions had an invert on cover, stating it was "likely the only known example on cover." See the illustration. As you can see it was sent from one law firm to another, the recipient being **Leslie R. Curtis, Esq.** In Robert Siegel's super BNA auction of last October, a very similar cover was sold. Although partially masked in the photo, I can clearly see this one was **sent** by Mr. Curtis to **H. Norman Burt, Esq.** another attorney. So we know now that more than one was "created", using that verb with a certain degree of caution, and they were popular items among the lawmen of St. John's.

The next question relates to the postmarks which also are very similar, from St. John's East on Oc 3 20; however, both 20's look manuscripted. I must also note that although October 3, 1920 was the last day of the 1920 provisional period, it was also a Sunday! I have about a dozen covers from this period but none is postmarked on a Sunday. There are really two parts to this question, then, -have the 20's been added by pen or pencil, and was St. John's East cancelling mail on Sunday, October 3, 1920?

Regarding question 2A, possible answers might be that the imprint was so weak that someone decided "to help", or perhaps it was not even 20 to start with. It would certainly be a nice item to have this provisional inverted on its last day of official use -the new shipment of 2¢ Caribou's went on sale on Monday, October 4th. The Siegel cover came with a 1963 B.P.A. certificate. (I do believe the stamps are authentic on both covers, it is the NEWSLETTER

postmarks that concern me.)

Back to Huber, and question 2B. He is writing about the same era and states:

"Letters at the G.P.O., St. John's, are postmarked by an electric cancelling machine and records show an average of 11,000 daily, including Sundays...."

Later, in relation to the "pre-sale" of the first 3¢ on 35¢ 1920 provisional, Huber states that 500 stamps were sold just previous to closing hour at the G.P.O. on Saturday, September 11th. This was done so as to not "inconvenience those with letters for **Sunday's mail.**" He went on further to the effect that the clerks worked until late Saturday night on requisitions from the outposts, as well as "all day Monday." No mention is made of any Sunday work. Also, there are no known covers of this value (SCOTT 128 or NSSC)postmarked prior to Monday, September 13, 1920.

Perhaps G.P.O. cancelled mail on Sunday but no other services were available. Where, then, are the provisionals postmarked on Sundays, or, for that matter, the **POSTAGE PAID** rubber stamps also in use at this time? Or are they out there, unbeknownst to me?

This is not an article with answers. I welcome them from you. Please send your answers/ideas to John Butt.

Boggs in his "Postal History of Newfoundland" lists under Slogan Cancellations SC 7 BRITISH EMPIRE EXHIBITION 1925. It is said that this slogan was verbally given to Boggs by the late Rev. E.A.Butler of Stephenville, Nfld, a noted dealercollecter. No other reference to this slogan has come to the attention of the author to substantiate a 1925 slogan cancell ation.

Could the Rev. Butler of Boggs have been mislead by this cover by giving it only a cursorary glance. If by so doing the 1925 slogan could have been taken to be that of the Newfoundland Post Office. On closer examination, however, the format of the slogan is not that of the slogan of 1924 but rather that of of London, England. In the case of the above cover the Newfoundland post mark is the closed circle St. John's East NEWFD 1925 with seven wavy lines to the right. The London post mark is a double circle with LONDON 1925 between circles and June 13 1???? AM in the centre with BRITISH EMPIRE/ EXHIBITION/MAY 1925 OCT. to the right.

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


