LABRADOR PHANTOMS =

The TERES PHANTOM STAMPS OF LABRADOR are quite well-known to collectors of such issues, and the story is told in Fred J. Melville's Phantom Philately. The stamps were put out by an American company which, so the tale goes, 'received a charter from the governments of the U.S. and Newfoundland to develop the country, on condition that a postal service to various parts of Labrador is kept in operation during the navigable season.'


In anticipation of the setting up of the service the company had the stamps printed, very roughly by lithography, but it is believed that little came of the venture. The values, colours and designs are: 5 cents black and green (seal on an ice floc); 25 cents black and blue (man in Arctic krit; 1 dollar black, red, pink and green (map of Canada showing location of Labrador). The inscriptions read Labrador U. S. A. Postage (or Post Office)' and the value.

The stamps came on the philatelia market in 1908 but received an icy welcome. Nobody regarded them as being a legitimate issue, and even the appearance of specimens used on covers did little to restore confidence. Melville records that Whitfield King, of Ipswich, had shown him a cover bearing two used copies cancelled Ramah—Post Office—Labrador with Canadian stamps alongside.

Recently we were shown a cover, addressed to a Montreal newspaper, bearing the Labrador 5 cents alongside the Canadian 2 cents of 1903-12, both tied by a wavy-line Montreal cancellation with the circular date stamp of April 18, 1908. The Labrador stamp is additionally cancelled with 6 bars in a circle, reminiscent of the type of marks found on early issues of Newfoundland. There can be no doubt whatever that the cover has passed through the post, but whether or not the Labrador issue paid postage to Montreal is a matter for conjecture. We should need more convincing evidence to prove that the issue was anything else than bogus.

Re: Nfld. T.P.O. N-47?

Enclosed herewith is a photo-copy of a scarce Postal Card I acquired at the great BNAPex in St. John's, NF last weekend. Please note that the bottom arc is interupted by a period in the center, for which there does not appear to be a similar strike in the Ludlow illustrations, which state that the governing portion of the 4D type is the uninterupted arc between runs at the bottom. This arc is interupted and this (and many others) NF R.P.O. perhaps should be listed in the RR section of the catalog, perhaps without delisting in the NF section. Is this strike a new one or just a glitch in the Ludlow listings?

The card is very interesting, because it is not just a late usage of the 1892 Message and Reply card, for the great surplus of these U.P.U. mandated cards very divided in two by the Post Office and sold over the counter separately to be used by the public to meet the demand for the 2 Cents rate to Canada and the U.S.A. during the period when the rate to other U.P.U. countries had been changed to 4 Cents, a 2 Cents decrease from the U.P.U. rate imposed after the Great War, in effect from October 1921 to October 1925.

While Canada issued a 6 Cents Postal Card, and an essay for a 4 Cents Card was part of Earl Covert's display at Convention, NF issued neither, causing postal patron to affix additional adhesive postage to the 1Cent card. I have been able to acquire two 1 Cent cards with 3 Cents additional postage added to meet the 4 Cents U.P.U. rate, but have never been offered or seen a card with 5 Cents added to meet the 6 Cents UPU rate. Surely, such must exist somewhere off island. For the Postal Stationary Postal Historian I enclose photo-copies of my two 1 Cent postal cards to UPU members other than Canada and the USA.


