Thompson wins Pratt Award for Newfoundland articles:

BNAPS member Anthony B Thompson of Saltsjö-boo, Sweden, has received the prestigious Pratt Award for 2018 from the Collectors Club of Chicago (CCC) for his articles entitled "Gum: The later Newfoundland issues printed by Perkins Bacon, Waterlow, and others" (BNA Topics, Volume 75, No 1, 2018) and "Newfoundland's foreign mail—basic rates and colours for the letter, post card, and printed paper stamps" (BNA Topics, Volume 75, No 4, 2018).

The CCC Pratt Award is named for Robert H Pratt, the eminent Newfoundland stamp and postal history collector, researcher, and author. In 1997, the CCC initiated the award, which is annually bestowed on the author(s) of the philatelic article(s) or book(s) published on Newfoundland's philately judged best in that year. The annual Pratt Award is a prize of one thousand dollars US.

- There is a nice article in the most recent BNAPS Topics on the Newfoundland 1887 ½¢ Dog: A detailed study of its correct release date and other discoveries by John M Walsh, FRPSC and Julian J Goldberg.
- There is also an article by Clarence A Stillions, OTB, detailing an interesting NFLD cover from Newfoundland to Fiji!
- Eastern Auctions had an important auction on June 14 & 15. It included the Specialized Collections of C.A. Stillions featuring the Resource issues of 1932-1938 and 1941-1944, and included proofs, imperforates, varieties, plate multiples and postal history. Catalogues may still be available.
- Treasurer Martin Goebel has expressed some concern about our financial position as we
 did not receive a stipend from the BNAPS this year. There is no immediate crisis but we need to
 be fiscally responsible. We could raise dues or we could cut costs in order to avoid future
 shortfalls.

I would like to propose the latter for now. The easiest way to do this is to cut out the colour pages on hard copies. MY REV. CANON E. E. RUSTED COVER

One of the great pleasures that I have discovered as a member of the Newfoundland Study Group and as co-editor of this Newsletter with the late Norris (Bob) Dyer, is access to the variety of interests and expertise of the members of this great study group. I have been fortunate to learn so much from so many of you that I really can't thank you all enough.

After learning about the Rusted family from the writings of Bob in BNA topics, Vol. 2, No. 4, NN160, pg.1 and Bruce Robertson in NN168, pgs.6-7, while I was perusing the stock of a dealer at one of the local Toronto shows, I immediately recognized the name on the return address of this envelope.



It was from the Rev. Canon Ernest E. Rusted, the father of Nigel Rusted whom Bob Dyer had written about. As Bob had noted in his article, the good Reverend was also an avid stamp dealer in his off hours, much the same as the Rev. E. A. Butler of Sandy Point fame.

This is a registered letter to Mrs. Hailey Williams, re-directed to Old Holbans, Broadoak, Heathfield, Sussex, (England). Bearing $3-5\phi$ Grenfell stamps, cancelled at Carbonear on December 1, 1941. It also has a faint ``PASSED`` censor stamp to the lower left and it is a first day of issue cover. While the reverse of this cover is unfortunately a bit rough with thins on the flap that removed part of the Wilmington receiving cancel, and a Newfoundland T.P.O. cancel, it fortunately still had the enclosure that gives an interesting glimpse into the stamp dealings of the Reverend.






Bill kindly agreed to allow me to publish scans of these examples.







NEWFOUNDLAND 1939 ROYAL VISIT WITH "NY" SURCHARGE ERROR

This 4c overprint of the 1939 Royal Visit to Newfoundland was included in a recent lot from Weeda Stamp's (www.weeda.com) bidboard. It shows a distortion and joining of the N and T of CENTS giving an NY appearance. The upright of the N is broken to the left and the bar of the T sloping obliquely downwards. The red letters, including the NY, all show a darkening around the edge, and it appears that there is a fault in the lettering on the overprint plate. Scott (2008:251i) and NSSC (2016:234b) list the CENTL variety, and the latest Unitrade catalogue notes "There are many varieties of broken letters and figures in the settings of these surcharges." Overprints with missing parts of letters due to lack of ink seem well known. However, I can find no mention of this NY variety where the letters appear properly printed but damaged. Is this a constant variety? Has anyone seen it before?




Figure 2. Normal (upper) and error (lower) showing CEN(NY)TS.

MORE ON THE PROOFS OF THE 1942-49 RESOURCES ISSUE

Attached are 3 PDFs from my exhibit (it is on the ORE area BNAPS), just to add to the piece on the 8 cent Resource proofs in NN 174

159 (NSSC) Walsh Newfoundland Specialized Stamp Catalogue (NSSC) Perkins Bacon still printed and supplied definitives since 1932. Their plant was destroyed on May 10, 1941. With loss of the printing plates a scramble ensued to get contracts filled. Waterlow and Sons copied and printed these designs. Differences in image sizes, perforations and plate layouts occurred. Newfoundland Post Office pressed the denominations into use upon receipt. Images are of current Royal Family and from the previous resources and manufacturing. This issue has design width on narrow side > 20.5 < 21 mm; except the 48¢ (> 20.2 < 20.4 mm). Some values exist with a skeleton key styled watermark which is part of sheet layout for the watermark. This set exists as 'plate proofs'. Found as imperforate, gummed, with hole punches; "security hole punch" is term often used. NSSC #252 & 253 also exist in this manner; all from company archives. NSSC #236 (1¢); 238 (3¢); 240 (5¢); 243 (10¢); 252 (4¢); 253 (5¢) exists as 'plate proofs' sans holes. Ex archives basic perforated sets exist with security hole punches; often called 'requisition order proofs'. Many large die proofs have imprint of a hole. LC = left center Type 1 - center numerals with \perp only in perfs. of stamp with numerals (1 plate) TC = top center Type 2 - center numerals with stamp right of numerals having \odot and \bot (1 plate); should be collected as piece that shows a corner plus all of the above info; otherwise it looks as Type 3 Type 3 - center numerals and layout as Type 2 plus same numerals are now in 4 corners (5 plates) Type 4 - center numerals + same numerals in 4 corners (5 plates) Type 5 - numerals in 4 corners only (4 plates)



JUST AN INTERESTING OBSERVATION




Fig. 1 Fig. 2

Look at the two proofs; 41 (fig.1) and 41 colour trial (fig.2). Note the right side development. Observe the nice detailed outer frame lines. Now look at the left side. Not there or remnant thoughts placed there. Yet these are die proofs!

Now look at the issued stamps NSSC 41 violet brown and NSSC 42 green. The released printing plate proof has been developed the same way. It is as if the engraver forgot to do the outer frame line on the left. Just to show how complete development of both sides of a frame are not always done.


