Realized \$562,875
(\$475,000 hammer plus 18.5% buyer's premium), the highest realization for a philatelic item ever sold at auction in Canada.

Part II will feature **Rarities of the 6d and 10c Consort on Friday August 18, 2023**. The digital flipbook preview of The Brigham Estate Province of Canada Part II will be available exclusively on the <u>Eastern Auctions website</u> around June 23. One of the many prize items here will be a VF Mint 10c Black Brown with Original Gum, a pair of 10c Chocolate Brown Consorts on a Front and many nice proofs with Constant Plate Varieties.

Sparks has a Sale coming up on June 1-3 and Maresch has a sale on June 20-21.

You may have noticed that the Stamp Shows have been few and far between with only the legendary shows like Orapex opening. This seems to have happened due to poor attendance. Since the cost and risk need to be mitigated, less well-known shows have not been attempted or have been delayed until the fall. This leaves us with smaller local shows from clubs and online auctions from Eastern, Maresch, Sparks and the many other auction houses.

If you miss the fun and comradery of a good Stamp Show. BNAPEX 2023 will be held in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia in the Best Western on 15 Spectacle Lake Drive, Dartmouth NS, B3B 1X7 September 14-17, 2023. 

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7 1/2d Position 69 Misplaced Entry by Jim Jung



It's been getting harder and harder to find nice Plate Flaws and re-entries that have not been described by the Auction houses since Sparks Auctions, Eastern Auctions and R. Maresch & Son have been describing these flaws in their lots. This increases the price as more bidders are likely to bid on these stamps, knowing that the catalog value of these flaws and re-entries are much higher than the regular

stamp.





This is a lot of a proof pair from the recent Sparks Auctions Sale that was described as "mole on forehead on right stamp". The right stamp is actually the position 69 Misplaced Entry, with a similar error to positions 47 and 83, listed in Unitrade as 9iv Misplaced Entry in UL and UR spandrels and upper margin. This used to be called Flaw in the UR triangle. A closeup showing the flaw is at the top of this page.



Even VG copies of this stamp with the flaw have a catalog value of \$3500 CDN compared to a mere \$750 CDN for the normal stamp. That's a huge increase in value if you find a stamp with this flaw. Here is a copy of the stamp. It's harder to see the flaws on the stamp compared to the proof but the stamp is worth much more in value at this time. I find that the proofs with flaws and re-entries have been going up in value as collectors are bidding on auction lots more aggressively as beautiful blocks and pairs with these flaws show up with nice descriptions in Auction sales. When bidders see the Flaws and Reentries described, sometimes with a nice certificate confirming the variety, they are more likely to bid higher. Since catalog values in Unitrade are based on Auction results, this increases the catalog value of the variety.



Although the flaws at position 69 are quite similar to position 83, with marks in both upper corners and on the Queen's forehead, when compared together you can see the position 83 marks are quite a bit stronger than position 69. These scans are both proofs, with position 83 above and position 69 below.

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Position 19 State 3, Whitworth PF25, Vertical Scratch thru E of CENTS


When collecting the 5c Beaver, you will find a number of Plate scratches, many of them light but very substantial. It's quite difficult to find some of these as these fine scratches wore away fairly quickly or were corrected quickly. I've tried to put together a summary of these stamps from Mike Smith's, and my own collection, with closeup images as these are sometimes difficult to notice. You need a sharp eye to catch some of these beautiful flaws. You might notice that there are a number of nice plate scratches in State 4 of the plate, especially in the center of the sheet



Stamps from Mike Smith's collection are noted in the text description. The remaining stamps are from my collection.



Position 35 State 4, Whitworth PF11, Diagonal scratch in Lower right corner. The extra flaw in the image at right below is Huff's Flaw H7009, described as "two dots below C of CENTS." This stamp is from Mike Smith's collection.





Position 48 State 2 Whitworth PF1 Scratch thru POST. The marked closeup below shows the very faint, but extensive scratch from the upper margin to the T in POST. This stamp is from Mike Smith's collection.








Position 61 state 5, Unlisted in Whitworth, Scratch from R of VR through A of POSTAGE. This stamp can be plated using the dots at the lower left margin.





Position 62 state 5a, Whitworth PF16, Scratch through lower left 5 and E of FIVE






Position 63 State 1 PF1a, PF114c diagonal scratch through O of POSTAGE and upper right 5. PF86b is a single dot above the center of the crown. PF114c is a single dot below C of CENTS between framelines. H7036 is a dot below E of CENT. This proof is from Mike Smith's collection.











Position 65 State 4, Whitworth PF23a, Scratch through the trees and the G of POSTAGE





Position 65 State 4, Whitworth PF23a, Scratch through the trees and the G of POSTAGE. Mike Smith found this wonderful copy of this flaw on a cover dated in manuscript at left: **1864 Rec'd 4 April**. So now we can date the time of the flaw to the Spring of 1864. The flaw on this copy is very light so stronger copies would be from before April 1864.





Position 75 State 4, Whitworth PF7, Long scratches above the sun through G of POSTAGE. This copy in the Brownish Red shade shows the flaw very strong. It is also a very clear printing.





Position 75 State 4, Whitworth PF7, Long scratches above the sun through G of POSTAGE. This copy from Mike Smith shows the flaw at its' weakest point. It looks quite different but if you see a copy, you should grab it as this flaw is quite scarce. It is only listed in State 4 of the plate. Whitworth states that it was removed for State 5 but judging from this copy, there wasn't much to remove.







Position 90 State 4a, Whitworth PF20, Unitrade 15viii, this is the Split Beaver variety that is listed in Unitrade.

Although partially hidden behind the duplex grid of the postmark, it can still be seen in the closeup below.

Berri Duplex Updates by Vic Willson

A new ERD for Three Rivers PM timemark was secured by me on ebay- PM/MY 22/61. The earlier date was MA 2/64 per the Lee listing. The AM timemark ERD remains MA 23/61.



For those who did not see the Brigham sale catalog of March 17 a new Berri duplex ERD was listed on a Hamilton 1¢ printed matter cover to New Brunswick PM May 11, 1869, purchased by me. This beats the previous date of May 12 on a London cover.

Part 2: Interprovincial Destinations

In Part I (1), I discussed the printed matter mail (non-letter mail) used domestically and provided examples of covers such as printed circulars and prices current. In this issue, I will discuss interprovincial printed matter sent to the Maritime provinces which during most of the decimal period (1 July, 1859 to 30 April, 1868) had their own postal departments although incoming postal rates were determined by the Canadian Post Office Department of the Province of Canada. After the Confederation, on 1 July 1867, the Dominion of Canada consisted of four provinces (ON, PQ, NB, NS) but the postal rates from Ontario and Quebec to the two Maritimes did not change.

The rate for printed circulars, prices current, etc. was set at 1 cent per 1 oz. during the decimal period and didn't change until 1873 when the weight basis was raised to 2 ounces. Getting mail from the Province of Canada (CW or UC and CE or LC) was hit or miss depending on the weather. Rather than repeating the various railroad, steamer and summer and winter overland routes which is beyond the scope of this article, one can get very detailed information from the excellent coverage in the Arfken and Leggett book (2).

Printed Matter to Nova Scotia




Figure 1. Printed Circular Sent to Halifax

Figure 1 shows a simple example of a weekly produce circular sent from Montreal to Weir and Co. in Halifax, NS. The cover was endorsed "via Portland" which meant that the circular first went by rail to Portland, Maine, then by steamer to St. John, NB and next to Halifax, NS. A great number of such circulars went to the Maritimes at a bargain rate of a penny and provided the local merchants with a weekly update on prices and availability of various foodstuffs at the bigger markets in Montreal, Quebec.

A different produce circular (Black & Lockes) sent to Hawkesbury, NS also shows the use of a 1¢ QV stamp. Even in the 1860s, Hawkesbury was an important port in Cape Breton Island.

A weekly circular sent to Mahone Bay in Lunenburg County, NS is depicted in Figure 3. Since most circulars were a single page on light paper, a double weight (2 0z) circular is quite unusual. Paid with two 1¢ Queen Victoria stamps, this franking appears to be the only one that was recorded in the original Firby census (3).




Figure 4. Produce Circular to Halifax Franked with 2¢ QV Stamp

An even more unusual franking is shown in Figure 4. Affixed to a James Lord weekly produce circular, originating in Montreal, is a 2¢ Queen Victoria stamp (issued in 1864). The Moravian steamship mentioned to the left of the stamp and indicated that the mail was carried by this ship was owned by the Allan line. According to the Firby census, only three covers with this franking have been recorded.

Printed Matter to New Brunswick

A produce circular from Sewell, Wetenhall and Reid's, dated Aug 7, '63, is depicted in Figure 5. The "per S.S. America" steamship is covered up by the left margin stamp that pays the 1¢ rate to Miramichi, NB.




Figure 6. Short Paid Circular to New Brunswick

Figure 6 depicts a short paid circular rate, again to Miramichi. The 1¢ QV stamp is tied to the cover with a 2-Ring "21" (Montreal). Also noted on the front (right hand side) is a "1" handstamp that infers that the cover was overweight (greater than 1 oz) and thus an extra penny was to be collected from the recipient.

A similar cover is shown in Figure 7. This circular (abbreviated at lower left) was sent to Kingston, NB. A Kingston receiver (backwards) was applied in the Kingston P.O. and a handstamp "1" applied over the receiver so that the recipient would be sure to see that a payment was due. Figure 7a shows the many P.O.s that the letter traversed in its journey.

Printed Matter to Prince Edward Island

According to the Firby census, there were only 4 printed matter covers to PEI during the decimal period. Figures 8 and 9 shows two of them (50% of the world's supply!).

Small Book Rate to New Brunswick




Figure 10. A Small Book falls under Printed Matter Rate

Paragraph 11 of the Department Circular No. 45 grouped books with printed circulars and prices current at the 1¢ rate per 1 ounce. Figure 10 shows a small printed memorandum book to Richibucto, NB franked with a 1¢ QV decimal stamp. Nevertheless, the small book must have weighed over 1 oz so a "1" handstamp was applied meaning that the recipient would have to pay an additional penny due to take possession of the book.

Next Printed Matter Topics

Part 3 of the printed matter story will show printed matter sent cross border to the United States as well as printed matter to overseas destinations. In the latter case, there are less than 10 printed matter pieces that have been documented, making it a difficult area to collect.
