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Introduction

An index is a fundamental tool in all of research. Without it, vital information languishes and researchers are forced to either slog their way through the back issues of the journals, or waste vital resources by redoing research and publishing what already been done. It also acts as a tribute and a legacy for all those hard-working contributors to the field.

To that end, this index is divided into two parts; 1) a Subject Index and 2) an Author & Contributor Index.

Formatting (e.g., punctuation, indentation, capitalization, etc.) is derived from the 13th edition of *The Chicago Manual of Style* (1982).

The perfin user names are according to the 6th Edition of the Handbook. However, pattern numbers are shown in chronological sequence starting from the first edition of the Handbook (if known) and ending in the 5th edition (in bold, e.g., **A1**). This is done in order to assist researchers, especially when examining past auctions which used earlier versions of the Handbook and often included no other descriptor. Double dashes (e.g., --) indicate an unfound pattern number, removal from the Handbook or the perfin never appearing in a particular edition.

Index entries with parenthesis (e.g., 11-2(2)) indicate two references appearing in two

places in a single issue of the *BNA Perforator* newsletter.

In order to remain consistent with the online BNAPS Perfin Study Group archive of the *BNA Perforator*, the index citations are given in "Vol-No." format (e.g., 23-1) before 2010, and "Whole number" format (e.g., #131) afterwards.

Citations from articles appearing in other journals are in **red** and use the same dating citation format as found on their journal's websites or published indexes. Abbreviations for other philatelic journals are as follows:

AP	The American Philatelist
BNAT	BNA Topics*
ML	Maple Leaves (Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain)*
PS	Perfin Society (UK)
PC	Perfins Club (USA)*
RPSC	Royal Philatelic Society of Canada*

*These journals are still to be added to this indexing project. In the meantime, researchers are encouraged to search these indexes contained in their society's websites.

This is a work in progress. It is hoped that updates will be published on a yearly basis along with those of the Handbook. It is also a very detailed project and therefore it is expected that there will be errors and omissions.
