

A NICE RE-ENTRY ON THE 5¢ REGISTERED

It's been some time now since I last showed you a re-entry on the 5¢ Registered Letter Stamp, Scott #F2. I did mention one in Issue #63 that I was shown by Harry Lussey at BNAPEX 93, but I don't yet have that one on film.

The one seen above is from Plate II, the sheet of 100, arranged 5 X 20, and is from Position #80 on that plate. Note the strong line in the top of the 'E' of REGISTERED, and the line in the top of the 'T' of STAMP directly below it. The clarity of these lines makes this an easy stamp to identify.

I've had a copy of this re-entry for quite some time, but the detail in the 'E' was marred by the cancellation. It wasn't until member Michael Smith sent the above lovely, clear copy to show me that I was finally able to photograph this position in all its glory.

THE RE-ENTRY FROM POSITION #80 ON THE 121/2¢ DECIMAL

In the last Issue I showed you a very prominent re-entry on the 12½¢ Decimal from Position #71. Above is another very nice one from the same proof sheet from Position #80. Note the strong doubling of the inner and outer vertical framelines, as well as the doubling in the numeral and the tiny squares forming the background to the spandrel.

This doubling is somewhat typical of a number of other positions, although this one is one of the strongest. §

SMALL QUEEN COLLECTORS TAKE NOTE!

The latest catalogue to arrive from John Jamieson's SASKATOON STAMP CENTRE (Box 1870, Saskatoon, Sask., CANADA S7K 3S2, Phone 1 800 667 6900) included his Literature Catalogue. On the very front page is something that many of our collectors of the Small Queen Issue may have been waiting for for years! John now has available Gummed Labels of line drawings of the 1¢, 3¢ & 6¢ SMALL QUEENS!!!

The text of his ad reads: Gummed Labels showing line drawing of stamp enlarged to 45x55mm. Ideal for mounting with your stamps to illustrate varieties, reentries & plate flaws. Pkg of 50.

His price per package of 50 is \$8.95 CDN, \$7.79 US, plus tax and shipping. Canadian shipping is 5%, minimum \$3, while shipping to the U.S. is 10%, \$6 minimum. (Those are his literature rates, which I assume apply to these labels as well.)

Be sure to specify 1¢, 3¢ or 6¢. (Sorry I don't have a sample to show you here, but the catalogue just arrived as I was putting this Newsletter together.) Call John if you need more info.

CRSG Newsletter /#66

In the last issue I told you that I had made an addition to my computer set-up and asked you for your comments. Well, since I didn't hear from any of you, I'll just tell you!

I have acquired a Caere OmniScan Hand Scanner, which is the perfect width for scanning my 4" X 6" photographs. For you computer 'techies' out there, it is a true 8-bit, 400 dpi, 256 grayscale scanner. It is a "Complete Scanning Tool Kit" all in one! ... It came complete with Image Assistant GS software for image-capturing and enhancement; OmniPage Direct for OCR (optical character recognition) for text-recognition ... scanning recognizable text directly into my word processor; and FaxMaster for OCR of received faxes.

For the 'non-techies', a scanner creates a digital image of a photograph, text or drawing that it is passed over, which is then stored on my hard drive. Using the software, I can lighten, darken, alter the contrast, and of particular importance, sharpen the image as much as I wish. (There are also all sorts of other 'special effects' that I would never use on my Newsletter photos, but are certainly fun to play with! For example, you should see what a ONE HALF PENNY looks like when it has been 'embossed'! WILD!!!)

Anyway, you may be interested to know that EVERY SINGLE PHOTOGRAPH in the last Newsletter (and THIS one) was scanned directly on to my pages, rather than using the old 'cut and paste' method! ... I used to type my pages on my Mac and insert a box or boxes large enough for the photograph(s), which I then manually glued on to the pages after printing them. Then I would take the pages with the various coloured photos attached and try to photocopy them so that the photos showed as good a contrast as possible to show the re-entry details, while also being able to get the text to come out clearly enough so it would not be too light. This was a constant problem. Now I can adjust the tone, contrast and sharpness of every photograph directly on my screen before I even print it! Then I simply 'Insert' the images directly into my word processor pages.

Indeed, many of Michael Rixon's 3¢ S.Q.'s in the last issue were extremely pale with very smudgy borders. (Typical 3¢ S.Q.'s!) Even many of the letters were dark and smudged with cancellations, etc. Using my software, I was able to go in and sharpen the blurred images and actually 'erase', pixel by pixel, many smudges and cancel markings that might also be mistaken for part of the re-entry, as well as 'cleaning up' the image! I even 'whitened' the margins!

The biggest 'drawback' to all of this, is, of course, the tremendous amount of time involved in doing the actual scanning and image manipulation. BUT, I think the results are worth it!

What do YOU think??? §

ADDITIONAL INFO ON THE HALF CENT NUMERALS — RIGHT PANE by R. Trimble

Member Don Blair of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan recently wrote to tell me that he had examined a full Right Pane of the HALF CENT NUMERAL, Scott #74. The first thing he wanted to tell me was that he had identified Photo #5 at the top of page 6 of Newsletter #28 as Position #4. While I had also acquired a full Right Pane several years ago, I neglected to up-date the info in my previous article, so, the feather goes to Don for bringing this to my attention.

Don also enclosed some diagrams of a few other positions that were not examined in that earlier article and these diagrams are reproduced for you on the following two pages. Don's markings were originally in red ink and when I photocopied his pages, these markings did not come out very clearly. As they are going to be copied yet again when the Newsletter is printed, I have darkened his lines somewhat so that you can see them clearly.



My thanks go out to Don for reminding me of these stamps and for submitting his report.





A STRONG RE-ENTRY ON THE 1¢ ADMIRAL



It's been awhile since I showed a re-entry on the 1¢ Admiral, so here's a nice one that I came across in my photo file. Note the doubling of both 1's; both the left and right framelines; and the marks in the lower portions of the letters of 'CENT'.

Way back in Issues #38 & 42 I showed you the various re-entries on the 14¢ Newfoundland Dog of the Long Coronation Issue, Scott #238, that were known at that time. Since then a few more have turned up, including the lovely one you see above.

I discovered this one in the upper left of a mint block of four with full selvedge on the left side. Note the exceptionally strong doubling of the left frameline. There is also doubling in the bottom of the 'S' of POSTAGE, and of the inner frameline to the right of that letter. The backside and the tail of the dog also show doubling of lines.

Having examined Don Wilson's partial sheet of 83 some time ago, which was missing positions 71, 81 & 91, and having also examined a L.L. corner block of four, which eliminates #'s 81 & 91, (with another re-entry I'll show at a later time), I've narrowed this re-entry's position down to #71 on the sheet. However, my notes seem to indicate that this position is not correct, but I seem to have neglected to note the reason. If any member has any information on the left column of this sheet and can confirm or deny the above conclusions, I'd appreciate hearing from you.
