

Introduction

I did not have the pleasure of meeting Ralph Trimble. Ralph faded from the philatelic scene before I developed an interest in constant plate varieties. Then he passed away last year. And yet, he and I have a connection. A shared passion for re-entries.

Forever linked by his legacy: Ralph's many journal articles and the fabulous re-entries.com website he created years ago. Resources I find myself returning to. Again, and again. As I cross-reference my collection against the many observations and insights of this Canadian philatelic icon. Bringing an occasional smile to my face when pondering his reaction to a new re-entry discovery.

We all walk in the footsteps of those that come before us. Building on the work of our predecessors. And so, I thought I would mark the 2024 passing of this giant of our hobby. By reporting on five remarkable Second Issue Bill Stamp constant plate variety discoveries. Stamps that I would have relished discussing with Ralph Trimble. But instead, I share with the Dots and Scratches community with whom I have no doubt he held in the greatest esteem.

1. FB21: 4 Cents "Dots & Scratches" Variety



Let's first look at the 4 Cents denomination. Here we have an interesting new variety. It's not a Trimble-preferred re-entry. But it is nevertheless appropriate for the Dots and Scratches newsletter. Since it is, quite literally, comprised of a significant number of curiously located dots and a prominent scratch.

I have two copies. Both on trial colour plate proofs. The position is not known.
Although I can confirm that it is not found in column 10 as one of my copies is the left position proof of a plate proof pair.


2. FB23: 6 Cents "Dash in S of Cents" Variety



Next, we have a flaw (or dash) in the letter S of CENTS on the 6 Cents denomination. I have two copies of this variety. The first on a trial colour plate proof block of four. The second on a used stamp dated March 12, 1868.

The position is not known. However, the block of four position suggests the variety is neither a column 1 nor a row 10 stamp.

3. FB27: 10 Cents "Upper Right Re-entry"





This third new variety is one I think Ralph Trimble would appreciate.

It's a clean re-entry in the upper right corner of the 10 Cents denomination. The re-entry consists of doubling in each of the scroll work, frame line and circular feature surrounding the Roman numeral X. There are also some prominent extensions of

the blue horizontal shading lines adjacent to the queen's hair into the inner frame white space. I have two copies of this re-entry. One on a single plate proof. The second – the bottom proof – of a vertical plate proof pair. The position is not known. However, the vertical plate proof pair eliminates row 1. And the wide left margins suggest the re-entry may be found in column 1. Meaning the re-entry could be a Position 11, 21, 31, 41, 51, 61, 71, 81, or 91 variety.

4. FB29: 30 Cents "Major Re-entry"

This spectacular major re-entry discovery on the 30 Cents denomination exhibits prolific doubling throughout the image: among many of the letters, in the horizontal cross-hatching and the numeral tablets, along the frame lines and throughout much of the ornamentation. I have a single copy from a plate proof pair. The position is not known. However, because my copy is the right position of a plate proof pair, we know this re-entry is not from column 1.




5. FB32: 50 Cents "Upper Right Re-entry"

Finally, we have a lovely re-entry on the 50 Cents denomination.



This impressive re-entry is located on the upper right side of the image. It includes extensions of many of the horizontal shading lines



adjacent to the Queen's hair into the white space interior of the inner frame. There is also a prominent vertical line in the white space between the inner and outer frame. And in the right margin, we find two parallel vertical lines adjacent to the outer frame lines. I have one copy of this re-entry. On a single trial colour plate proof. Yet again, the position is not known.

A 6 Cent Small Queen Two Dot Variant by Bill Radcliffe

I bought the first stamp pictured (Fio. 1) on Ebay. It is a major plate scratch going all the way through the right 6. It was the two dot state. I sent a picture of the stamp to Jim. McCormick, who has plated the six cent Small Queens Jim looked at his plate records for the 2 dot state and determined it was plate position 100. His only had a weak scratches (Figs. 2, 3a,b), and when he checked Jim Watt's scanned collection Jim found one with a stronger plate scratch. Mine must an early state of the 2 dot plate, which comes in perf 11.5x12 The light scratch is on perf 11.75x12, which Jim defines as state 2A. He could not find a scratch in the 1 dot state or the 3 dot state position 100s or on the perf 12x12 examples in the 2 dot state, defined as 2B, which show the plate scratch has worn away by that point. So, the stamp I found is state 2A, Jim Watt's stamp is 2A, and Jim McCormick's stamps would be 2A. There is no plate scratch in state 2B as far as we know. You might get lucky and find one on a perf 12x12. You never know what you find in group of random stamps so happy hunting

38c Parliament Re-entry by Arnie Janson







Arnie Janson sent in this nice re-entry found on a booklet stamp of the 38c Parliament, Scott 1188. Clearly, there is doubling in the letter on the left side of the stamp as well as in the fine background lines on the left side of the design.

When compared with other versions of the same stamp, the reason for the re-entry is apparent as the lettering is not well defined

















A long while ago, a bunch of us noticed that there are alot of plate cracks on the 5c Small Queen stamp. These are not plate scratches and look like crooked jagged lines across a small part of the design. Here are some of the ones we found starting with this one smaller one that is listed as R&S 5-20, plate position unknown. It is clearly a plate crack and the jagged line is in the strong olive green colour of the stamp.

Although I'm not sure exactly how long this plate crack existed on the plate, here is a dated copy from Earl Noss showing a date of JY ?? 85. The copies we have seen are all on Scott 38 as opposed to 42. They have shades from a very greenish Olive to a more Grayish Green. The British American Bank Note Co moved their operations from Ottawa to Montreal in September of 1874 and stayed there until 1887. The plates used for the Montreal printings continued to be used afterwards as well. This plate crack comes from a plate of 200 subjects in one pane. In the Montreal period, the imprint was changed and stamps appeared in a different shade. A new plate was made for the 5c in the period of 1888-92. These were different and came in two 10 x 10 panes of 100.

This is a very general description of the printing of the Small Queen stamps. For more details, it is advised to get a copy of a specialist book on the Small Queen issue. It is such a large subject in itself.



Here is one more that is much smaller and appearing in the upper right margin near the corner of the design. It's just a short diagonal but slightly jagged line.



Here is an extensive plate crack sent in by Jim McCormick. It features a large crack at the top right margin and a second crack at the bottom right across the lower framelines.
