CONVENTION REPORT - Your editor withstood the polite barbs and arrows on his editorial performance from the convention goers, and besides a guilt trip and a bit of ego deflation, survived and will carry on as editor for at least another year. Notwithstanding, we all had another fine BNAPS convention with many RPOers in attendance.

First and foremost, this year we had an exhibit of RPOs to study put together by bill Robinson from out in Vancouver. Bill's exhibit featured the Ornaments of British Columbia, and was awarded a Silver. Quite an award for an RPO exhibit. Now, if I can get Bill to send me a copy, we can let others not in attendance view some of his material and perhaps encourage more exhibiting. It did show that we can pick a small area, cover it well, display it properly and expect recognition.

Secondly, our very own Sheriff was awarded the Order of the Beaver for his many, outstanding and dedicated services to BNAPS and Canadian philately. Lew well deserves this high philatelic honor, and we are sure that you all join in a hearty congradulations!

Thirdly, the study group meeting was a success with 25 in attendance. Made more enjoyable were the comments and questions of Lew's self proclaimed needler, Frank Waite, who put forth the following points on the catalog, which I will summarize:

1. Should colored strikes be so identified. Lew ask that we canvass the membership in the newsletter and try and determine how many of such strikes exist and whether it would be worthwhile. So, let's hear from you on this point.
2. Should scarce denominations by identified, for example if a strike usually only appears on certain high value stamps.
3. Should 1st and last dates by shown for different types. I'm really not sure what Frank meant by this point but he can write and explain. Could he have meant different types such as found in RR-28? Since I forget, he will have to help out here.
4. Should a column be included for the number of hammers for each run? I think it was generally felt tha this would be a good idea, space permitting.
5. Should terminus identification by made? I think by this Frank meant a separate listing of the ending terminus.
6. Frank suggested the the identification of reporters be dropped in favor of leaving more space for additional information. At this point he suggested that those of us that favored leaving this item in the catalog were being a bit high-shoolish - now really Frank!
7. Should identification be made as to whether the hammer was rubber or steel - he didn't mention cork?

All in all his points generated an interesting discussion and I am sure they will be given due consideration in the next edition.

Lew took some time to discuss a new report - and circulated a picture of same - Q-188, clearly showing in large letters similar to the "OT" and " 13 " the letters "DB". He made the point first as to how this little gem went undected in all these years. He forgot to give me the picture but believe me it was quite striking and we will give a report on his interesting hammer analysis of $Q-188$ in a later issue - showing where these
initials fit in to the history of these hammers.
Lew also reported that there had been 24 new run reports since the catalog was published - with new information on other elements coming in daily.

If you missed this one - you missed a good one - maybe next time!
FROM HORACE HARRISON - Our registry expert - a copy of a cover with a new backstamp of an RPO clerk strike with the name "L. Marshatt" showing half the run "QUEBEC" with no terminus. Horace would like an $\phi$ information you might have which might help figure out the name of the run - anybody have partials of other parts of this hammer?

CORK CANCELS - Have made headway on this project. Have gotten reports on at least 105 different runs where the clerk used a cork or some other means of cancelling the stamp or cover, in addition to his regular hammer. Most are in the Railroad section but there are numerous ones also reported in the other sections. I am in the process of documenting and redrawing each as they will not recopy well enough for distribution. In all we have 175 different corks to work with, which is certainly more than the four D\&S identified. However, all are not "fancy" - in fact some are pretty poor and not at all in keeping with the high standards that we should have expected from our railway clerks - but then, again, we didn't have much choice in the matter at the time - did we! Will have this material ready next month. Still waiting for more reports - I hope Burchill, Noble, Robinson and a few others still hiding their gems heard that. We'll be patient!

CHASTISING THE SHERIFF - It isn't of ten that one gets a chance to really get one on the Sheriff, but this time he is cornered. Reference is made to Volume X, No. l, March issue of the RPO Newsletter, page 3, in which a post card acquired by your editor was illustrated with a note to the Sheriff to take note. Now I admit tha $t$ in reproduction, this was not the clearest strike around, but one would certainly expect some note to be made of such a new find. But yet, not a word! Now, I recei.ve the May-June issue of Topics, and there illustrated is the very same strike of S.S. Princess Sophia as the first reported strike - and not a mention - nary a word - of my report of a year earlier. Murphy's law I guess, And one doesn't have to be a student of Norman V. Peale to make a derect point from a published and as authroatative a source as the RPO Newsletter. And then Frank thinks we act a bit highschoolish now and then and what's wrong with that! Thats not all, though! To make matters worse, Lew goes on to illustrate Jim Lehr's copy of $0-367 \mathrm{~B}$ as the only second strike he had seen (the other his own). In the very same newsletter referenced above, directly below the Princess Sophia strike, is 0-367B on a strip of $3 \phi$ small queens. Believe me, I showed that strip to Lew in Japan - made a special trip for the purpose. Now what! Apologies will be expected by return mail from the Sheriff to this ignominious offense, ignoring these "truly rare and historical markings".

FROM ROSS GRAY - a copy of a cover with a strike needing an idendical twin, so that it can be confirmed as to proper clerk name (if such), and as to whether the clerk name is fastened to the hammer. Anyone seen this apparent unique item who can help Ross out? It does appear from positioning to be fastened to the hammer, but it would take two identical strikes for proof - for you know whom. Do we have any leads.?

INTERESTING - Enclosed is a strike tha $t$ I picked up in my early days of searching out RPOs. Was in Palm Beach for the BNAPS convention, going through a dealers stock, when what we all want to happen happened! Out jumped a beautiful strike, in blue, of a new RPO find or at least I thought so - of MONT \& BROCK/MONTREAL, dated 12/16/75. Our unconquerable and usually unstoppable fewwow member and dealer, Allan Stainhart, was standing next to me on the occasion. I turned to hime with delight and showed him the pie ce. His comment was "where did you find that, I just went through that box (it wasn't his box) and didn't catch that gem. I promptly paid the dealer the $\$ 2.00$ asked, and went on to mark down that day as a great day in my RPO search. As you can see, it is a beautifull strike showing the "NT \& BROCK". However, sad, it isn't MONT at all, but HUNT, which showed faintly when I got home and gave it carefull scrutiny in good light, not available in hotels. While it lasted, it was a fantastic feeling! One good part of the story was that I caught it before rushing it off to the Sheriff for you know what kind of comments. Anyone having stories like the above ought to send them along. We have a 11 had the se kind of experiances, and when shared with the rest of the membership, they can be shared. The more you send, the less you will have to hear of mine!
