In this issue we have several new important Western discoveries, a new St. John station postmark, a unique new Ontario private clerk handstamp used as a cancelling device, a second date for a very rare Toronto & Kingston early split ring cancellation and a new Quebec hammer study, as well as other updates, thanks to contributions from Morris Beattie, Richard Cromwell, Ross Gray, Hank Narbonne, Murray Smith, Brian Stalker, Sean Weatherup, and Firmin Wyndels.

Most of this new information was received in time to be included in the new edition of the catalogue but a few items arrived too late for the mid January deadline.

Our Secretary-Treasurer, Sean Weatherup, also presents his report for 2021.

The third edition of the catalogue is now being printed and will soon be available. It has 38 more pages than the 2015 edition, including many more postmark illustrations, as well as additional separate hammer data not previously included and has all updates received before the mid-January cut off date.

The book has been entered in the literature class of CAPEX 22 exhibits and will be one of three official launching presentations of BNAPS books on successive days of the exhibition.





Sean Weatherup discovered this late use of **WT-879**, C.P.R. WINNIPEG & GLENBORO / 1, E, FE 16, 9(9). In the 2015 catalogue, the editor noted his doubt about the February 14, 1899 late date found in the Ludlow/Robinson records but this new example now supports that date as being correct. We will now designate this example as the **latest date** for a **second period use of the hammer**. (Was this a brief revival of the earlier run because the Souris & Winnipeg R.P.O. trip could not be completed due to severe winter weather or an accident?)





A New Discovery from Brian Stalker



This registered cover, addressed to Newport, N.S., originated from Army Post Office S.22 on December 20, 1917 and travelled via the UK to St. John, N.B., where it arrived on January 14, 1918. At St. John Union Station, it received a transit backstamp, now newly listed as, SN-49.55, RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE / ST. JOHN, N.B., JAN 13, 1918.

This rubber stamp, which was likely intended just for use on internal post office documents, had only previously been known from its proof strike dated November 11, 1916.



Army Post Office S.22 was used by the Canadian Base Depot. Between 1916 and 1919, that was at Etaples in France, the large military camp where the vast majority of Canadians arriving in France or departing France were in transit to and from the front.

(A Post Office Department notice of February 22, 1897 advised that St. John, N.B. was one of nine locations where "the Chief Railway Clerks, who will in future be called Superintendents, and the Clerks who check the Postal Car Returns ... will be embraced in the Railway Mail Service Branch.")

Murray Smith reports a new early date for hammer WT-852.06, WPG. & BINS \cdot R.P.O. / N $^{\circ}$ 6, 106, DE 15, 25.

Found as a transit backstamp on a registered cover from Waterford, Ontario to Hamilton, is **ON-48.02**, BRIDGEBURG & SI THOMAS R.P.O. / . , W, JY 15, 24 , a new **late date** for the hammer.

This transit backstamp on a registered cover from Bealton, Ontario to Guelph, **ON-247.03**, LONDON & NIAGARA FALLS / \cdot R $^{\!\!\!\perp}$.P.O. \cdot , E, AP 29, 98, is a new late date for the hammer.




A Second Date for ON-629 from Ross Gray



The originating postmark on this registered cover is illegible. There is a straight line REGISTERED and a lightly struck RY-69, REGISTERED / G.W.R. on the front and back. There is also a TORONTO transit stamp on the back, suggesting that the cover originated somewhere west of its destination and was transferred to the Toronto & Kingston R.P.O. on the Grand Trunk Railway in Toronto. It received what is


only the **second reported example and new early date** of **ON-629**, G.T.R - T. & K / _ , JA 28, 70 . Arrival in Manilla was the following day, after travelling north by road, probably from Oshawa.

A New Toronto & London R.P.O. Clerk Handstamp



ON-643.55, TOR. & LON. / N. M. MOYSE / TORONTO , 9, AUG 19, 1924 , is a new, previously unreported clerk handstamp, used on the C.N.R.

A New ERD for WT-351 from Morris Beattie





This registered cover was mailed in Victoria on February 29, 1912 and travelled to Kaslo, arriving on March 4. After not being called for, it was redirected to Frank, travelling on the eastbound Medicine Hat & Nelson R.P.O. on March 6 and was postmarked,

WT-351, Med. Hat & Nel. R.P.O. / T. D. BULGER., 1912, MAR 6, Tr. 514. A receiving Frank backstamp is dated 9 days later, on March 15. It was sent back to Victoria via the westbound Medicine Hat & Nelson R.P.O. on April 2, and was stamped with WT-344.02, MED. & HAT. & NEL. R.P.O. / Nº 2, W, AP 2, 12.




A New Hammer for WT-346



We are grateful to **Firmin Wyndels** for reporting these two very similar registered covers, which originated at Eburne, BC on May 31, 1919 and were addressed to Bellevue, Alberta. They travelled eastward via Vancouver, as closed bag mail to Medicine Hat, arriving there on June 2, where they were transferred to westbound train 511 and postmarked with **WT-344.07**, MED. HAT. & NEL. R.P.O. / N^{Ω} 7, 11, JUN 2, 19. At Lethbridge, they were transferred to westbound train 67 and postmarked with a previously unreported hammer, **WT-346.01**, Med. Hat & Nel. R.P.O. No. 1, 67, JUN 3, 1919. Arrival at Bellevue was the morning of June 3.

Both letters were not called for and on July 3 or 4, they were returned on westbound train 67 to Nelson, again being postmarked with **WT-346.01**. From Nelson, they travelled back to Vancouver as closed bag mail, and arrived there on July 6.

Found as a transit backstamp on a registered cover from Wallacetown to London, is a new late date for hammer ON-506.02, ST. THOMAS & WINDSOR R.P.O. / . , 365, NO 27, 47 .





This **ON-506.03**, SI THOMAS & WINDSOR \cdot R.P.O , W, OC 1, 20 , transit backstamp on a registered cover from Fingal, ON to Hamilton via Rodney, is a new **early date** for the hammer.

ON-716.04, TOR. & MONT. G.T.R $^{\Upsilon}$ / 4 , 9, SP 12, 25 , is a new late date for the hammer.





Used as a transit backstamp on a registered cover from Fredericton to Hamilton, is the first report of **train 7** for hammer **ON-719.03**, TOR. & MONT. R.P.O / 3, 7, FE 19, 20, as well as the listing.



ON-827.03, TOR. STRAT. & GODERICH · R.P.O. / . , 36, III 28, 51, is a new **early date** for the hammer.
