WITH THE SEASON'S GOOD WISHES AND GREETINGS:

By the time most of you receive this I expect that Christmas will not be very far away, or will have just past, following quickly on its heels there is the coming of a new year and so I preface this issue with my personal best wishes to all of you for a happy holiday season and a joyous new year.

A while back, while going through the stock of a dealer in stamps and antiques, I found a modest lot of postcards, in mint condition, with a view of the Aylmer, Quebec Post Office taken about the time of the Squared Circle. It seemed such a perfect little gift for each of you that I picked them up, at an extremely reasonable price. I hope you will be able to find a place for yours as collateral material in your collection. Sometime last summer I bought some filter material to help me identify strikes on the 3 Cent Small Queens and the other stamps of basically red tones. Because I had to buy the stuff a foot at a time I have been able to cut up a number of useful little filters which sure can be useful at times. Hope you will find yours useful.

The First Shall Be Last:

This page, the first in the Annex, is being written last for various reasons, and so there are a number of items that I would like to mention more or less out of order.

A. D. Hanes has sent me an interesting copy of a Map Stamp with what appears to be a Nude Strike. Hanes is of the opinion that this is a forgery, although he says that some who have viewed it think it could be a York Street strike. A bit of art work is needed to bring up the strike for xerox copying and it will be illustrated in the next issue. In the meantime, did York Street ever use a nude? And has a nude ever been found on a Map Stamp?

B. C. Plain mentioned that he was hot on the trail of a St. Hilarion, on cover. I wonder if this is the one that Jim Miller had a few weeks ago and sent on to Barney Shapiro? This is illustrated in this issue. I must say the illustration could have been better but I wanted to make the strike as dark as possible and the original sent me by Jim Miller (copy that is) was quite gray.

I have to thank a number of readers who sent me information on their R.P.O. Squared Circles. As soon as I have a bit more information I will quite likely write more about them in the annex.

Bill Moffatt on Winnipeg:

Included with this issue of the Round Up Annex are several pages on Winnipeg's four hammers sent to me a year or two ago for inclusion in a "Post West" series I was doing at the time. Pressure of business and a feeling of some uncertainty about "Post West" caused me to allow the series to lapse and what Bill wrote then is now included to start a few members working on their Winnipeg holdings. Any comments you may have on Winnipeg can either be sent in to me or to Bill. Those of us who are familiar with Winnipeg and its four hammers know that their story has not been completely told yet, even with the work that Bill has put into them.

Perhaps, with answers from you readers, we can start a dialogue and serious study going right here in the pages of the annex. Any reader like to take on the subject and submit further comments?

Because I made a promise that this edition of the annex^{would get} to you some time before Christmas I have simply xeroxed Bill's actual letter to me, there would have been no changes made by me in what he had to say.

We Get Letters and Comments:

A number of you have sent in letters and notes of comment since the first edition reached you. Naturally, most comments were received about that attempt to give some sort of dollar value to squared circles using the rarity factors as a point of departure.

There were just as many saying that the scale I used resulted in a too high set of prices as said that the scale created prices which were low.. and only one of those who thought the prices were too low was a dealer. As I said in the notes that accompanied the scale this was just a personal survey, made during the early fall of this year, using dealers I have had some happy experiences with.

One collector wrote in to say that he thought there should be a bit bigger spread between the figures shown for strikes on stamp, on piece and on cover. This was based on the idea that, after all, strikes on cover are much scarcer than those on piece or just on stamp. This is true, of course, just as it is also true that there are many collectors who just don't really think that the average cover of eighty years ago adds all that much to the value or appearance of a nicely struck cancellation on stamp. My own preference is to build up my collection with stamp and strike on piece and I must confess that I will sometimes take a tatty cover and reduce it to just a nice piece which includes the fully struck cancellation and the stamp.

DEAR GLENN :

YOUR LETTER ENCLOSING MANUSCRIPT FOR 'POST WEST' REC'D YESTERDAY. HAVE JUST FINISHED THE WINNIPEG MATERIAL WHICH TURNED OUT TO BE MUCH MORE OF A CHORE THAN I HAD ANTICIPATED - AND STILL HAS SOME GAPS IN IT. IN ANY EVENT, THE DATA IS ENCLOSED WHICH YOU CAN REARRANGE TO SUIT YOUR NEEDS.

SEVERAL COMMENTS ARE IN ORDER: (1) IT IS ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO CONSIDER THE HAMMERS SEPARATELY BECAUSE TWO HAMMERS WERE IN USE MOST OF THE TIME AND THREE AT SOME TIMES. (2) THE PICTURE IS CONFUSED BECAUSE IT SEEMS THAT WHEN TWO OR THREE HAMMERS WERE IN USE SIMULTANEOUSLY, ONE WAS USED FOR NORMAL OUT-OF-TOWN MAIL, THE OTHER - OR OTHER TWO - FOR CITY DROP MAIL. BUT DIFFERENT HAMMERS TOOK OVER THE DROP MAIL AT VARIOUS TIMES. IN THE ANALYSIS WHICH IS ENCLOSED, I REFER TO DROP-MAIL USE AS 'MINOR' AND OUT-OF-TOWN MAIL AS 'MAJOR' USE, SOLELY TO CONSERVE SPACE, AND 'MAJOR' OR 'MINOR' CARRIES NO CONNOTATION AS TO WHETHER 'MUCH' OR 'LITTLE' MAIL WAS HANDLED. (3) QUESTIONS PERIODICALLY ARISE - AS YOU KNOW - ABOUT WHETHER HAMMER IV IS A 'MODIFIED' VERSION OF HAMMER I OR HAMMER II. MEASUREMENT OF LETTERING SHOWS THIS CANNOT BE SO WITHOUT HAVING RE-WORKED NOT ONLY ALL OF THE LETTERING, BUT ALSO WIDTH AND THICKNESS OF ALL OF THE SIDE PIECES. BUT I HAVE PREVIOUSLY INDICATED THAT

THE MOST TELLING ARGUMENT AGAINST SUCH A MODIFICATION, AND THAT IS THE FACT THAT ALL FOUR HAMMERS ARE INCLUDED IN THE PROOF BOOK WITH THE FOLLOWING DATES OF PROOFING: I - AU 23/93; II - DE 28/93, III - JA 9/95; IV AU 28/93. THUS, HAMMER IV PROOF DATE FOLLOWS BY ONLY TWO DAYS THE EARLIEST RECORDED USE OF HAMMER I (AU 26/93) AND PRECEDES THE PROOF DATE OF HAMMERS II AND III. (I ~~USE~~ GUESS FROM POINT OF VIEW OF PRIORITY OF PROOFING, HAMMER IV IS ACTUALLY THE SECOND HAMMER, HAMMER II IS THE THIRD HAMMER AND HAMMER III IS THE FOURTH HAMMER, BUT THE PRESENT TERMINOLOGY IS TOO WELL ESTABLISHED TO CONSIDER TRYING TO CHANGE).

THUS, HAMMER IV WAS PROOFED JUST ABOUT AS EARLY AS HAMMER I, BUT HAMMERS I AND II ARE KNOWN WITH HEAVY, CONTINUOUS USE FOR LONG STRETCHES AS MUCH AS 5 YEARS AFTER THE PROOF STRIKE OF HAMMER IV.

WITH REGARD TO 'MAJOR' - 'MINOR' USE:

I HAVE GONE THROUGH A GREAT DEAL OF ANALYSIS WHICH SEEMS TO SHOW THAT WHEN HAMMER II WAS IN 'NORMAL' USE (i.e. IS COMMONLY FOUND ON 3¢ SMALL QUEENS, 3¢ JUBILEES, ETC), AND HAMMER I IS REPUTED TO HAVE BEEN ONLY MINOR, 'OCCASIONAL' USE, HAMMER I IS FOUND ON 1¢ AND 2¢ SMALL QUEENS, 1¢ AND 2¢ JUBILEES,

ARE FOUND BEARING HAMMER I DURING THE 'NORMAL' HAMMER II PERIOD, THEY ARE MOST OFTEN A 1¢ RATE ADDRESSED TO 'CITY'. I THINK THAT HAMMER I SAW 'NORMAL' USE AT THAT TIME, TOO - FOR DROP MAIL!

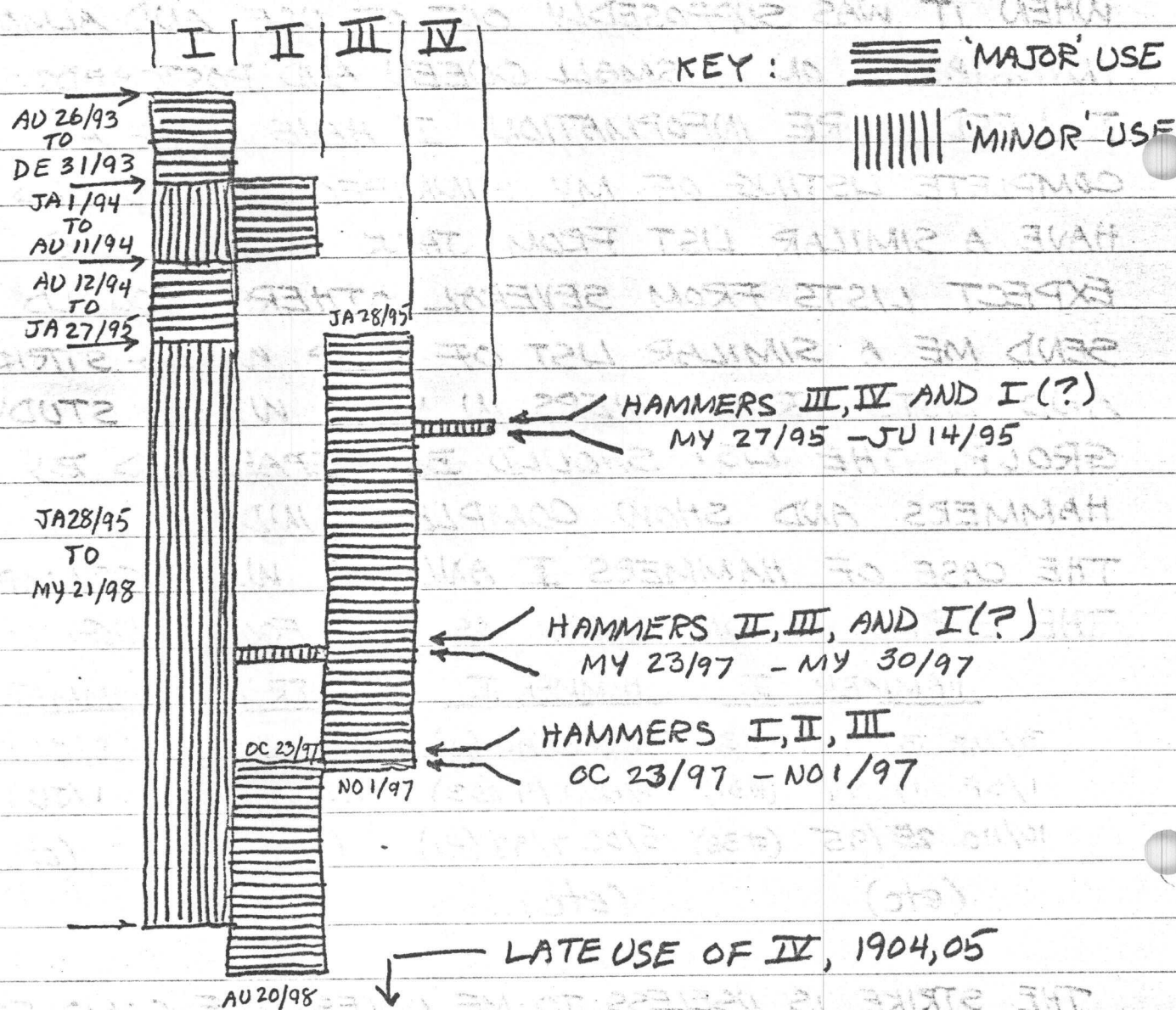
BEFORE GETTING INTO THE 'WINNIPEG' STORY, THERE ARE A COUPLE OF ITEMS I SHOULD TAKE CARE OF FIRST. I THINK THERE WERE AT LEAST TWO HAMMERS IN USE ALL THE TIME. I HAVE ALREADY FOUND EXAMPLES OF HAMMER I DURING PERIODS WHEN IT WAS SUPPOSEDLY OUT OF USE, AND ALMOST INVARIABLY ON 1¢ SMALL QUEEN AND POSTCARDS. BUT I NEED MORE INFORMATION. I HAVE MADE A COMPLETE LISTING OF MY WINNIPEG STRIKES AND HAVE A SIMILAR LIST FROM JACK GORDON AND EXPECT LISTS FROM SEVERAL OTHERS. COULD YOU SEND ME A SIMILAR LIST OF YOUR W'PEG STRIKES AND LISTS FROM OTHERS IN YOUR W'PEG STUDY GROUP. THE LIST SHOULD BE SEPARATED BY HAMMERS AND SHOW COMPLETE INDICIA, AND IN THE CASE OF HAMMERS I AND II, WHAT STAMP THE STRIKE IS ON, SUCH AS THE FOLLOWING:

THE STRIKE IS USELESS TO ME UNLESS THE

DATE (MONTH, DAY, YEAR) SHOWS AND THE HAMMER IS DEFINITELY KNOWN. HOWEVER, IF THE TIME MARK IS NOT CLEAR, THE STRIKE IS STILL USEFUL IF THE DATE IS COMPLETE; SHOW AS ?/JA 4/94 (41)(II) FOR EXAMPLE.

I HAVE LAID OUT THE APPROXIMATE SKELETON OF THE MULTIPLE HAMMER USE OF W'PEG, WITH THE ASSUMPTION WHICH I BELIEVE TO BE CORRECT THAT HAMMER I SAW CONTINUOUS USE, BUT ON DROP MAIL FOR MUCH OF THE TIME.



WITH THE PRECEDING INFORMATION, MY DATA IS AS FOLLOWS:

HAMMER I PERIOD OF USE: AU 26/93 - MY 21/98

I BELIEVE THIS HAMMER WAS USED CONTINUOUSLY IN THIS PERIOD, BUT ON DROP MAIL, MOSTLY, IN THE TWO PERIODS

JA 1/94 - AU 11/94 AND JA 28/95 - MY 21/98. THE CHRONOLOGY OF THIS HAMMER, WITH RESPECT TO CONCURRENT USE OF OTHER HAMMERS SEEMS TO BE:
