## A Wallaceburg Oddity:

A few months ago Harold Wilding sent along the photo shown to the right. The mark after SP 1 is very obviously not an indicia marking but is a solidly inked square. If the date is SP 1 / 94 then is this an early date? The handbook shows a proof date of AU 23 /94 and an early date of SP 5 / 94. There is plenty of room even between SP 1 and AU 23 for an earlier date. In any event if the date is SP 1 what is the purpose of the square? A extremely interesting little item that is just one example of the many reasons Squared Circles are so fascina -ting.

Somehow I have lost the identity of the member so can't give credit where credit is due. st "To District Director of Postal Ser. Att: Mr. H. R. McKnight, Tornto 1 (sic) Dear Sir: This is in regard to your communication of Feb. 8th (file HRMck:lw) in which you asked how often we used the early cancelling hammer that made the above impression. This : of Postal Ser "broken or squared circle" hammer was pressed into service for a few days about five years ago when we were waiting for a new canceller to replace a broken one. It was used last spring for one day while the regular cancelling hammer was being welded and again, for a few days, during the 1960 Christmas rush for the same reason. The broken circle canceller is not in its original form. The head from this hammer was fitted, at some time, to the style of hammer in use today and it is necessary to file old cancelling type to fir. Yours truly, T. A. 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Known - AU 26/93 to DE 12/99 (Blank; single example, 1/JA 23/96)

The "8" of 98 is badly bent and twisted JA 11/98 to JA 28/98; from AU 30/9 to DE 21/9, the '8' is missing from the year date 98. It is believed that the '8' may still have been in the Hammer, but not picking up ink, because the twisted '8' is back in the year date, '98' on NO9/98. (Dr Moffatt has provided this information)

I have in my collection the following dates: JA 27/99; FE 2/99; FE 9/99; AP 19/99; AP 30/99; NO 3/99; NO 14/99; NO 15/99; and NO 16/9. All of these cancels are found on the MAP stamp.

From JA/99 until AP/99, the first '9' in the year date is broken. Also the '9' used as the day in AP 19/99.

Some time between AP/99 and NO/99, the broken '9' has been moved to the second '9' of the year date, and on the 16th of NO/99, the second '9' is miss-ing altogether



Therefore, it is evident that all '9' only year dates are not necessarily '98' in which the damaged '8' was removed, but could be late '99', in which the damaged '9' was removed.


If possible, could other collectors check their holding of BRANDON squared circles on the MAP stamp to try and determine when the broken '9' was moved from the first to the second position in the year date. It would also be interesting to know if the '9' is missing until the last known day of use. ( DE 12/99). Here again, the MAP stamp would be the best stamp to prove it was '99' not '98'.








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

Originally founded in 1972 as the Postal History Society of Ontario, its name was changed to the present one in June 1977, to reflect the nature and scope of the Society. The Society promotes the study of the postal history of British North America only.

It is a non-profit society composed of students of postal history at all levels of expertise, and promotes the communication of members through the society's Journal or direct.

Currently the Society publishes its quarterly Journal (The PHSC Journal) and plans are in the offing to expand either the size or frequency of it. Contents of the Journal vary from fully researched feature articles to current newsy shorts. Articles cover the full spectrum of BNA postal history - from the pre-stamp era, the various cancellation specialties, meters, local and regional histories to the modern postal coding. Each issue carries a balance of material of interest to members. Articles are not usually interrupted by advertisements which are kept to a separate throw-away section where possible.

Members may avail themselves of the inexpensive advertising in the Journal, and for their local clubs, the Society makes available its CERTIFICATE OR MERIT for competitive exhibitions (request data sheet on availability from the Secretary). The Society also presents its CITATION OF MERIT at its discretion to such individuals that have shown extraordinary promotion of BNA postal history, furthering the field of postal history studies.

Membership is available to all collectors - presently only one class of membership is open - annual full member. The dues schedule is noted on the application form and it will be noted that dues are pro-rated to time of joining.

Although the Society's Journal is available only to members, ONE sample copy may be purchased for \$1 postpaid (mint U.S. and Canadian stamps accepted). This amount is credited towards membership on joining only. Those who do not purchase a sample copy, prior to joining, will receive their extra free copy at time of joining - the issue being supplied would normally be the current one.
