**Precursor Montreal Hmr. I -** Joe Smith reports an off-cover 10c Jubilee struck in purple dated JY 24 A9/00, later than Handbook. This gotta be philatelic in origin.

Ottawa - Dave Kelly reports FE15 6P/92 on 3c s.q. and 15c, previously unreported TM.

**St. John's NF** - what appears to be a favor strike ? ?P 63 on a 6 pence imperforate, with 2 other partial impressions of the hammer. Makes one wonder what other stamps were on the hand-back envelope. I thought clerks were fired for this sort of thing. Your comments please (this item submitted by Bill Radcliffe).

Type I Beeton - at Vernon, Bill was sold a very nice 8c Numeral cover with DE 98 date.

Type II Rothesay - Bill also found an inverted month on -/ON 8/93 on one cent.

St. John III - a backwards year on PM/AU21/89, on 10c small queen, also from Bill.

Type II Ripley - an early example of the 1907 revival on SP30, from Joe Smith.

Tavistock - Bill Radcliffe also acquired the first reported Map cover, a -/DE17/98 strike with one cent added.

Windsor - an inverted PM on FE14/94, on 1 cent, sent by Jim Miller.

**Victoria III** - an inverted time mark on TN/NO24/98 provided by Jim Miller, and an inverted PM on DE10/98, seen in a dealer's stock at Vernon.

### THE ORBS By Jim Miller Discussion 20: WINNIPEG Hammers Hammer 3-W1


Winnipeg represents the most difficult of the orb hammer studies. I have identified 14 different hammers, most of which have overlapping usages within the 1909 to 1972 period. Some of the hammers are very common, while others are quite rare or unknown.

The Lee/Hughes Proof Strikes of Canada, Vol. VIII illustrate 11 examples on page 145. An overlay of the two hammers dated 20/NO 2/25 shows them to be exactly the same. With only a few examples, it is difficult to identify if there are two different NO 2/25 hammers. For now, I'll treat this date as one hammer; thus, I can say 10 different hammers are shown in the Lee/Hughes book, and 4 more are not illustrated.

The first Winnipeg orb is proof dated 24/MR 16/09. The Pritchard and Andrews microfilm records show two identical strikes. I have only 8 examples of 3-W1, and all show similar characteristics, however, we will have to leave the possibility open that a second similar hammer may exist. My 8 examples are all backstamps on registered covers, which is quite common with many of the hammers. I have 3-W1 usages in 1909, 1910, 1911, and 1921.

Three other Winnipeg orb hammers are in use from 1911 to 1913, but all three of these are smaller diameters, ranging from 27 mm to 28 mm for the outer ring. 3-W1 has an outer ring diameter of 31 mm. Attached is the spread sheet for 3-W1, to be followed with 3-W2 to 3-W4 in the next newsletter. As we work through the Winnipeg orb spread sheets in upcoming newsletters, I would welcome your feedback so we can have a more definitive study when this is all done.


